IMPORTANT WATER RIGHT SUIT.

Involves Interest at Foster on the Umatilla River.

An important suit involving water rights on the Umatilla river near Foster has been filed in the circuit court here, wherein the Oregon Land & Construction company, of which G. W. Hunt is manager, seeks permanently to enjoin the Allen Ditch company from taking water from the river.

Williams, Wood & Linticum, of Portland, are attorneys for the plaintiff, Carter & Riley, of this city, have been retained as counsel for the Allen Ditch company.

In the complaint, the Oregon Land & Construction company set forth that they own all of section 35 tp 4 n r 28 e; w 1/2 sec 36 tp 4 n r 28 e; w 1/2 sec 26 tp 4 n r 28 e; w 1/2 sec 27 tp 4 n r 28 e; w 1/2 sec 34 tp 4 n r 28 e; w 1/2 sec 31 tp 4 n r 28 e; that since they became possessed of the land, the defendant have constructed a ditch which diverts water from the Umatilla river through and across the country south of the river; that the water so diverted would otherwise flow across the land owned by the plaintiff; and that before the ditch was built the water irrigated the land by sub-irrigation or otherwise. The plaintiff asks for an injunction pending the final adjudication of the rights of the parties to the litigation, claiming that the water diverted by the Allen Ditch company is necessary to the raising of crops on the lands of the Oregon Land & Construction company.

A bond in the sum of \$250 is furnished, with T. J. Kirk as surety. The defendant company has secured temporary relief from the restraining order issued by the court. The case will be tried at the June term of circuit court.

The subject will be "Eminent Women," one that Mrs. Dunaway is well qualified to handle, having herself a well-earned position as one of the eminent women of our country.

Programs of the convention have been sent to all of the club presidents in the state that the delegates and all club women may be able intelligently to discuss the various subjects coming before the members.

John Fleming, well known here as the representative of that house, attended to the loading of the train, coming from Heppner on the train as far as Pendleton. He stopped off here and was at the Hotel Pendleton. Mr. Fleming stated that the sheep were of extra good quality, and are expected to bring a good price on the Chicago market.
