STATE FAIR ENTRIES.

Several Pendleton Horses to Go in the 218 Pacing Race.

M. D. Wisdom, secretary of the State Fair Association, sends the East Oregonian information regarding entries for the big pacing race and livestock competition.

Following are entries in the Salem

Chamber of Commerce stake of \$1000 for 218 paces to be raced for at the Oregon state fair in September. This is the largest stake ever offered at the state fair, and has the largest number of entries ever received in any race in Oregon. The horses entered are what we term local horses, all being owned in Oregon, Washington, Idaho and British Columbia, not a single entry from California or Montana. This will make the race of more local interest.

Pendleton has three entries, and, if pools were sold today, they would be first choice.

Racing will not be the only drawing card at the state fair this year, for there is quite as much interest being taken in the various livestock departments. We are offering \$1000 in premiums to Shorthorn cattle alone.

The sharp competition that has existed between Chas. E. Ladd's Oak Hill herd and W. O. Minor's mountain valley herd will be renewed this fall stronger than ever, and stockmen will have an opportunity of seeing at least two of the finest show herds of Shorthorns ever exhibited on the coast. Mr. Ladd has been making some recent importation from Canada to strengthen his show herd, and his selections are from the best herds in that province. Each animal has a show record of considerable fame over there. Mr. Minor has been keeping close watch of these importations, and brought out from the east a carload some time ago, purchased at a big figure, one cow costing him \$800. Not being satisfied with this shipment, he sent his agent to the eastern herds again, and last week bought a Shorthorn cow for which he paid \$1700, another for \$450. The hot fight between these two rival breeders is in a friendly spirit, and will be of great benefit to the breeding industries of this state.

It has been the custom to notify the prosecuting attorney of the district from which the prisoner was sent, but in this case no such notification was given. The state through the prosecuting attorney has always had opportunity to be heard for or against the pardoning of any penitentiary criminal.

FORTY-ONE HUNDRED REGISTERED.

More Voters Yet to Be Placed on the Rolls.

Registrar C. A. Frazier has 4100 voters registered up to this evening. This is as many as was expected would be registered when the rolls were opened several months ago. Monday and Tuesday remain yet in which voters may register. According to the law, registration closes at 5 o'clock on Tuesday, after which in the June and November elections one may vote if registered only by filing a certificate signed by six freeholders. Quite a number of registrations are expected during the two days remaining, the total coming up at least to 4200.

FIGHT WITH COWBOYS.

They First Attack a Ranchman—One Cowboy Captured.

Walla Walla, May 12.—The Walla Walla Union of today says: There were exciting times at a ranch about one mile north of Fred Thiel's, which is nine miles north of Walla Walla, at 11 o'clock last night. Two cowboys appeared at the ranch house, awakened the ranchman and his wife and drove them out in their night dress at the point of guns.

The couple made their way to Thiel's and asked for assistance. He immediately organized a posse and hurried to the ranch. A battle between the posse and the cowboys followed. A number of shots were exchanged and one of the cowboys was captured.

He was tied hand and foot and placed under guard while a messenger was sent on horseback to Walla Walla to ask the sheriff for aid. Deputy Sheriff Painter left for the scene of the trouble at 3:30 this morning.

The names of the ranch people who were disturbed by the cowboys are not known.

Deputy Sheriff Made No Arrests.

Late this afternoon the Walla Walla Statesman wired the East Oregonian as follows: When the deputy sheriff reached the scene the men had escaped and have not since been seen or heard of.

BIG FIRE AT SUMPTER.

A Number of Business Houses Destroyed. Loss \$19,000.

Sumpter, Ore., May 12.—A fire last night destroyed the Bellevue lodging house, the Board of Trade saloon, the Holson mercantile company's general store, Alder's saloon, and the office of Hammond and Chance, lawyers. The total loss is about \$19,000 with some insurance.
