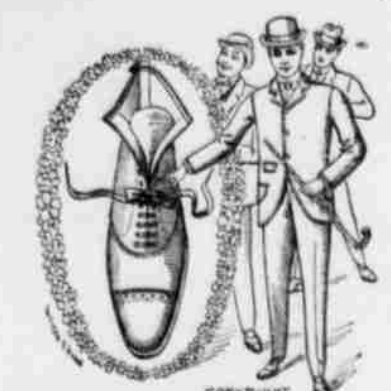

SENATOR SMITH'S CAREER.

Nominee for Congress Now Serving from Baker and Malheur Counties.

The following brief sketch of Senator Wm. Smith, nominee for congress, will interest his followers throughout the Second district:

William Smith, Union nominee for congress in the Second congressional district, was born in Brooklyn, N. Y., April 22, 1834. In 1856, his father moved to Minnesota, and there the youth grew into manhood's estate. He attended school until he was sixteen years of age, when like so many of the young men of the West, he became the architect of his own fortunes. He continued his studies after leaving Shattuck's school, at Faribault, Minnesota, and before coming of age, was principal of the school in the town where he was raised.

Thereafter he was on the faculty of the Shattuck military school for four years, after which he embarked in the mercantile line, but found it unprofitable, and, reading law, was admitted to the Minnesota bar in 1860, coming to Oregon district thirteen years ago.

For the past eleven years he has practiced his profession in Baker City with success. He was the first president of the Chamber of Commerce in Baker City, and was urged to continue in that position, but declined, owing to want of time. He was appointed regent of the state university by Gov. Geer in 1888, confirmed by the senate, and has taken a very active interest in that institution and its progress. Mr. Smith is what is commonly known as a "schoolman." He has served three years as a member of the school board of Baker City, and took a very active interest in making that institution what it is—the pride of that city.

Mr. Smith is now serving the state as joint senator from Baker and Malheur counties, and has been conspicuous in his opposition to every measure that did not have a good motive behind it. It is fortunate for the state that such men as he can be found when needed.

SUPREME COURT ADJOURNS.

Justices Will Leave for Home Tonight. Docket Cleared Today.

This evening, the supreme court justices will leave for their homes in Salem, having adjourned the May Pendleton term. A number of cases

which were on the docket were transferred to Salem, thus lessening the amount of work at the term and bringing it to a close sooner than would have been the case had all the cases been heard here. The court heard argument this morning in the case of Breeding against Williams, an appeal from this county which involves matters in a school district near Pendleton with which the public have been acquainted from time to time; the case of Roler against Barr was also argued and submitted.

Opinions, under the present plan, will be handed down from Salem. Formerly, it was the custom to come to Pendleton in May for the hearing of all Eastern Oregon cases, return to Salem to write opinions, and then come again to Pendleton during July to hand down the opinions. Now, the returning in July is done away. A number of important cases are now before the supreme court opinions which will be rather anxiously awaited by clients and lawyers. One especially, an appeal from Union county, involves the constitutionality of the law of 1890 relating to district attorneys' information in criminal cases interests all the counties in Oregon. The decision of the state's highest court will have important bearing on the circuit and justice court proceedings everywhere.

The visit of Oregon's supreme court to Pendleton is one of the pleasant things in the year for this city. The events of the year for this city. The three justices are held individually in the highest esteem by the people of Pendleton, their valuable public services adding to the high estimation. Should the present chief justice, Charles E. Wolverson, again visit Pendleton, as a member of the supreme court, having been re-elected in June, it will be pleasing to the majority of people in Pendleton, as well as in Eastern Oregon.
