O. R. & N. Buys Several Blocks of Land. Local Notes and Personals.

Last year he sowed about two square rods and his stock took to it so greedily that he determined to put in more this year. With seed saved from his last year's crop, he this season put in upwards of two acres and says that it is coming up remarkably thick. He has to watch his flocks closely to keep the stock out, "because," he says, to use his own words, "none they get a taste of it they are crazy for it."

Wm. Willaby, sr., Wednesday sold three blocks of land to the O. R. & N. Co. The real estate joins the block recently purchased from Willaby on the north, and the company now owns the entire four blocks of land running parallel with the track from Main street north to College street. EXACT REGISTRATION—4,807.

Umatilla County Registrar Completes Roll of Voters for Coming Elections.

Up to this afternoon, all figures on the registration of the county have been guesses. Registrar Frazer had a big pile of blanks from outside precincts come in the last two or three days of the registration period up to May 15, and he was kept busy with men registering for the Pendleton precincts, and the county roll placed the outside names on the rolls until registration had closed. He has been transferring these names since that time and has now the books complete. The final figures are, therefore, to be given, and they are 4,807 for the entire county. Of these, about 25 will be unable to vote in June, but can vote in November. They have not been in the county long enough or will not come of legal age in time to vote in June.

The number of cancellations from the original registrations was 75 for the entire county. The highest vote in 1898 was 3,021, and in 1899 was 4,007. The registration, therefore, this year is just 100 more than the highest vote in 1898, and 107 more than the highest vote in 1899.

Pendleton's four precincts show a total registration of 1,047.
