Pendleton, Or., May 14.—Examinations for graduation from the eighth grade of the public schools will be held on the 24th and 25th of May at the following places: Pendleton, Adams, Athena, Milton, Weston, Holix, Echo, Unatilla, Pilot Rock, Ukiah, District No. 9, Weston Mountain.

Any public school pupils living in Unatilla county are eligible to take this examination at any of the above mentioned places, provided that they have finished the common school course.

Teachers who have pupils to graduate living in localities not convenient to the above places can secure questions for examination by applying to the county school superintendent, J. F. Nowlin.

This is No News.

After months of laboring and painstaking investigation, an industrial commission, created under act of congress, has made a preliminary report to congress. Out of the vast mass of testimony, the commission draws two important conclusions: First, "In view of the quite general acknowledgment among railway men that discrimination in favor of large shippers is still conspicuous, the commission concludes that the railways still make discriminations between individuals, and perhaps to as great an extent as ever before. Second, the conclusion is reached with reference to the powers of the interstate commerce commission that they are more limited than was intended by the framers of the interstate commerce law."

Gage on Loans.

Secretary Gage, before the house committee on banking and currency, on the bill restricting National bank officers and directors in making loans of the banks with which they are connected, approved the general provisions as to officers, but suggested modifications as to directors, which the committee will make.

The secretary also pointed out that the provision limiting loans to 10 per cent of the capital was practically obsolete and suggested that the limitation be fixed at 2 per cent of the assets with a provision for collateral security when this limitation was also 10 per cent of the capital stock. The suggestion met with favor and probably will be recommended by the committee.

W. & C. R. R. REDUCED RATES.

With Northern Pacific Places Fares at Three Cents a Mile.

Taking effect July 1, the Washington & Columbia river railway will reduce its passenger to a basis of 3 cents per mile. This action is entirely voluntary and has been in contemplation since the reduction to 4 cents per mile in 1898, but has been delayed by complications arising on through tickets.

The Northern Pacific Railway company will on the same date, reduce their passenger tariff in the states of Oregon and Washington to a basis of three cents per mile. This is the second reduction in about a year's time.

This place passenger rates in this territory on the same basis as the rates made by railway lines in the densely populated states of the east. This practically puts the United States on a three cent basis.

Placard Placed by Author of "Ben Hur" on Mantel in His Study.

General Lew Wallace, author of "Ben Hur" and a distinguished politician on the republican side, has lately taken issue with President McKinley on some of the measures of his administration. He has objected most forcibly to the president's reversal of policy regarding Puerto Rico, but it now appears that he was just as strongly opposed, by conviction, to the acquisition of territory by the treaty of Paris. He thus at the ratification of that treaty with Spain a traitor. This is made certain by a placard that he had placed on a mantel in his study in his house at Crawfordville, Ind. A recent visitor at his house was allowed to copy off this placard. It is as follows: "The Republic of George Washington was slain in the United States senate at 3:30 o'clock p. m., February 6, 1899. Present condition: waiting for Caesar."
