VALUABLE HORSE DROPS DEAD.

"W. Dicken's Chehalis Roadster Dies of Heart Failure Thursday Evening."

At about 8 o'clock Thursday evening, the fine road animal owned by J. Dicken, named "Jap," after his

fall dead while standing at the gate of Frank Moulton's place in north

hailstorm across the river. The horse

was a valuable one, sired by the famous

Alamout stallion Chehalis, and

was a fine mare sired by Bellfounder.

Jap was one of the favorite driving

animals of Pendleton, and was almost

entirely black of color, and was

about 2 1/2 years old, and was good for the

distance in three or better when hitched

to a buggy with two riding in it. He

was a great favorite of the family, and

did much by his fine road record to

popularize the stock from the black

and white Chehalis. Jap was six years old,

and was bred here.

STEUNENBERG'S BROTHER TALKS.

IDAHO NOW FACES A VITAL QUESTION.

Shall Law and Order be Upheld in the

Coming Election in November?

C. B. Steunenberg, of the Idaho state

land board, brother of Governor

Steunenberg, was in Pendleton over

Thursday night, on his way from

Northern Idaho to Boise. Mr. Steunen-

berg was an interesting talker on the

subject of Idaho politics, and seemed

to be very well posted on the situation

in that state. In a conversation with

the East Oregonian, at the St. George

hotel, where he was stopping, Mr.

Steunenberg said:

"Probably, no one will deny that

the question of the endorsement of the

Steunenberg administration in Idaho

is the main issue in the politics of the

coming campaign. At this time, all

over the state, the campaign may be

said to be in full blast, although the

election will not occur until Novem-

ber. Delegates are now being chosen,

and the lines are being formed for the

approaching contest. The prominence

given to the Coeur d'Alene riots by the

investigation at Washington, before

the congressional committee, and the

fact that the eyes of the people of the

whole United States are looking to-

wards Idaho to see what is to be the

administration subsequent to the riots,

makes the coming election rather

peculiar, different from those of former

years. Stated briefly, as I view it, and

I am sure that the governor would en-

dorse it fully, the greatest desire of

the Steunenberg people is that the position

assumed by the state officials after

the riots be vindicated, and that the

governor be exonerated from the

charges which have been made by his

opponents during the congressional in-

vestigation.

"The political fate of any indi-

vidual, whether Governor Steunenberg or

anyone else, is not the point at issue.

The people of Idaho are to be on trial

as to their position on the subject of

law and order, and the cleansing of

the state from the element that has

fouled the reputation of the common-

wealth throughout the country.

"Whether the present chief execu-

tive be again made the governor or a

United States senator, or whether he

be removed from office, is a matter of

small moment. At this time, the one

thing for which Governor Steunenberg

is striving, and for which he will

strive to the end of the fight now be-

ginning, is the endorsement of the

administration of the state. If this be

done at the Pocatello convention, he

will be content with whatever else may

be done.

"The democratic party of Idaho may

as well face this issue, and the central

one in the campaign—if the adminis-

tration be not endorsed, then the party

will go down to the most ignominious

defeat at every point in any

election. The sentiment of the people of

Idaho is unequivocally in support of

Governor Steunenberg, on the question

of the Wardner riots. Wherever I have

been, I have found this to be true of

democrat, republican and silver re-

publicans alike. It is the determina-

tion of the people of the state, and

that no doubt the issue is sounded on

this important question.

Question of the Senatorship.

"At the Pocatello convention in

July will come up the matter of the

open nomination of a candidate for the

United States senate. The prospect is

good for a coalition of forces between

the democrats, the populists and the

republicans. The latter named want to

secure the election of Fred Dubois to

the position. This will be their effort

at Pocatello. But the trend of senti-

ment appears to be against the nomi-

nation of a candidate for the senate at

that time. It is good politics not to

do so. The reason is this: If any one

man is placed in nomination then

Senator Shoup, present incumbent, can

go out and fight him alone, and prob-

ably defeat him. Shoup has plenty of

his own money, and this year, as al-

most anyone will concede, he can get

all the money help he wants from the

republicans of the east. On the other

hand, if no one be nominated at Po-

catello in July, and the question be

left open as to who will be the nom-

inee, until the legislature has assem-

bled, then Shoup can be beaten in the

various counties by the senatorial

candidates who are strongest against him,

and when the legislature meets, the

battle can be fought out by the

lowering list of new rates compared with
