GENERAL NEWS.

The Chicago labor troubles in the
building line threatens to extend to all
parts of the country.Eddie Tobalt, the colored pugilist
injured during a boxing match Friday
night by William Foreth, died at
Bridgeport, Conn. Foreth is in jail.Returns received by the canvassing
board of the International Typographi-
cal Union at Indianapolis Indiana, in-
dicate that Donnelly is defeated by
Lynch for president.Three officers of the Turkish im-
perial guards have been placed under
arrest because found in possession of
plans of the Yildiz Kiosk and of the
sultan's private apartments.The illness of Mrs. Gladstone is now
reported to be more serious. Her
strength is gradually failing and the
members of the family have been sum-
moned to Hawarden castle.The situation, both from a military
and a political point of view, to the
Boers, has become very critical.
President Kruger admits for the first
time that matters are very grave.Governor Beckham's engagement to
Miss Jean Fagan of Owensville was
officially announced at Frankfort, Ken-
tucky, Monday. Miss Jean is the
daughter of a wealthy tobaccoist.The Cunard liner Carinthia, which
grounded May 15 at Point Gravois
Hayti will possibly be saved. She had
1400 miles on board for the British
government in South Africa 400 of
which were killed and drowned.Representative Joseph W. Babcock
of the Third district of Wisconsin,
chairman of the republican congress-
sional committee, says that in his
opinion the control of the next house
would be close. But he thinks Presi-
dent McKinley will be re-elected.On Sunday in Chicago during a
storm Lucy Hilden aged 13 was in-
stantly killed by lightning and her
sister Irene aged 10 stunned and fell
by the side of the dead girl in an un-
conscious condition. Irene will re-
cover. The clothes of both girls were
almost burned from their bodies.The Boer envoys will attend a recep-
tion at Boston on Thursday. From
Boston they proceed west for Chicago,
stopping en route at Cleveland or
Buffalo. They will later visit St.
Paul, returning to Philadelphia on the
15th, after stopping at intermediate
cities. The delegates may or may not
finally return to Washington.James Fitzharris alias "Skin the
Goat" and Joseph Mullett the Irish
inveinables who were recently released
from prison in Ireland where they were
sentenced for complicity in the
Phoenix park murders of 1882 were
ordered excluded by the board of
special inquiry at the immigration
station in New York and ordered de-
ported.

BRITISH ANNEX FREE STATE

Lord Roberts Makes the Announcement
to His Troops.

BOMBARDING THE BOER POSITION

English Hopes Are at a High Pitch.—It is
Predicted in London Roberts Will
Reach Pretoria in Ten Days.Cape Town, May 29.—Lord Roberts
has announced to his troops the an-
nexation of the Free State, which here-
after will be called the Orange River
state.British Bombarding Boers.
New Castle, Natal, May 29.—The
British guns at Ingogo have been
heavily bombarding the Boer position
since daylight. The Boer guns have
replied intermittently.Some English Speculation.
London, May 29.—The remarkable
rapidity of Lord Roberts' movements,
and the unbroken mobility of the
whole British army under him, have
aroused the calculations of the home ob-
servers as much as they appear to have
demoralized Roberts' federal op-
ponents. Possibly even now, he is at
the Gates of Johannesburg and it is
believed in ten days from date, or
less, he will be demanding admittance
to the Transvaal capital itself. If the
federals ever really intended to
"stagger humanity" by blowing up the
gold reef city and the mines, which is
doubtful, Lord Roberts may be too
quick for them, by arriving before they
have time to do any wrecking.British Near Johannesburg.
London, May 29.—Lord Roberts is
now within a day's march of Johan-
nesburg and General French and General
Hamilton have fought the Boers from
noon Monday until the evening, with
what result is not known here. H. J.
Wigan, in a dispatch to the Daily
Mail, dated May 28, says:"The demoralization of the Trans-
vaal is remarkable. Panic and con-
fusion prevail everywhere. Everyone
is weary of war and full of fear as to
the coming of the British. Operations
were being carried on for encircling
Pretoria with telegraphic communica-
tions.Gold All Gone.
"Not much gold is likely to be
found in the treasury at Pretoria. Salaries
of officials and judges have not been
paid or have been paid only in
national bank notes which will be
worthless when Lord Roberts arrives.
The seat of government will be re-
moved to Waterfall, a small
station on the Delagoa bay railway
line and then, if necessary to Lyden-
burg.Roberts Unfair Tactics.
"Both President Steyn and President
Kruger complain bitterly of Lord
Roberts' unfair tactics in refusing to
meet the Boers in positions chosen by
them and in eternally turning them by
flank movements. Around Johan-
nesburg a few trenches have been dug, but
no other steps have been taken for the
defense.The Public Frightened.
The Boer government is now en-
deavoring to reassure the public by
telling them that the British will not
outrage and plunder them, but it is
too late. Previous misstatements are
bringing their rewards. Fool is very
scarce and prices rule high.BRITISH KILLED.
An Attack on a Small Force Under Com-
mand of Lieutenant Slater.
London, May 29.—The colonial officer
received advices today, via Acraal, on
the British gold coast, saying that a
small force of Hausas, from Trahuu,
commanded by Lieutenant Slater, had
been attacked and Slater and several
others were killed.Peel Charged With Libel.
London, May 29.—At the Marl-
borough street police court today Sir
Robert Peel was committed for trial on
the charge of libelling Daniel Von Der
Heit.Mrs. Hall on Trial.
Walla Walla, May 29.—The trial of
Mrs. Susan Hall on a charge of setting
fire to her lodging house on the corner
of East Main and Colville streets on
the morning of April 29 last, was con-
cluded here today. The fire started at
the head of a narrow stairway and by
the time the fire department arrived
had shut off all means of exit except
by the windows.Northern Pacific Taxes.
Tacoma, Wash., May 29.—County
Treasurer Judson, this morning, ap-
pealed to the United States court to
prevent the county commissioners
annulling \$48,000 of tax arrearages due
from the Northern Pacific Railway.Wheat Markets.
Chicago, May 29.—July wheat, 67

000,000 to the widow and three chil-
dren.The Conference Closes.
Chicago, May 29.—The Methodist
general conference, which has been in
session in this city for the past week,
closed its labors today.

THE STRIKE SITUATION.

It is Not Improved in St. Louis Where
Fire Arms Are Being Used.St. Louis, May 29.—There is very
little change in the street railway
strike situation in this city. This morn-
ing a car on the Sixth street line was
stopped at Broadway and Miller
street, where a crowd assembled and
jeered the non-union men. The motor-
man and conductor fired at least
twenty-five shots into the crowd. Wil-
liam Brennan was shot in the knee and
probably will lose a leg. Dolly Mitch-
ell, a little girl, shot in the wrist. The
motorman and conductor were ar-
rested.Shots were fired from a moving car
into a crowd on South Broadway, to-
day, wounding Herman Teleke,
George Laeston and Albert Wakwith.
The first named is probably fatally
injured.Right to Quarantine.
San Francisco, May 29.—The board
of supervisors today passed a resolu-
tion empowering the board of health
of this city to quarantine any section,
place, house, district or persons. This
means that Chinatown will be quaran-
tined and no person will be allowed to
pass in or out without the proper cer-
tificate.The Cruiser Albany.
New Castle, on the Tyne, May 29.—
The United States cruiser Albany was
commissioned here today and becomes
one of the ships of the American navy.

THE LATEST CONGRESSIONAL NEWS

BOER RESOLUTION REFERRED TO COM-
MITTEE ON FOREIGN RELATIONS.Pension Legislation: To Take War Tax
Off Small Packages of Beer.Washington, May 29.—In the senate
Hale reported the last of the general
appropriations of the general delivery
bill and gave notice that he would call
it up at the earliest moment. The
Teller resolution, expressing sympathy
for the Boers, was laid before the
senate and Bacon addressed the senate.
The resolution was referred to the com-
mittee on foreign relations by a vote of
40 to 20.The senate agreed to the notified
amendment in the appropriation bill
relating to Chinese immigration, which
directs that the enforcement of the ex-
clusion laws be under control of the
secretary of the treasury.Pension Legislation.
Washington, May 29.—In the house
Grosvener presented a special rule,
ordering the previous question on the
pension bills, 190 in number, which
were favorably acted upon in the com-
mittee of the whole last Friday. The
special rule was adopted, but was im-
mediately displaced by the conference
report on the naval appropriation bill.Regarding the Tax on Beer.
Washington, May 29.—The senate
committee on finance authorized a
favorable report on the bill amending
the law concerning taxation on beer, to
eliminate packages of less than a quar-
ter barrel.Attorney General After Gaynor.
Washington, May 29.—An effort as
made today in the judiciary committee
of the house to take up the Gaynor
legislation, proposed by the attorney
general, to secure the removal of
Gaynor from New York to Georgia, but
it proved unsuccessful. Gaynor is
wanted in Georgia in connection with
the case of Captain Carter. Gaynor
being an accomplice of Carter.Aids the St. Louis Exposition.
Washington, May 29.—The senate
committee on appropriations agreed to
Senator Cockrell's amendment to the
sundry bill, appropriating \$5,000,000
for the Louisiana Purchase exposition
at St. Louis.Cabinet Meeting Today.
Washington, May 29.—At the cabinet
meeting today nothing of importance
developed. The president and several
members of his cabinet will go to
Annapolis tomorrow, to witness the
dedication of the Maryland monument.President Returns Home.
Washington, May 29.—President Mc-
Kinley and party reached Washington
this morning from a trip down the

TROUBLE BREWING IN CHINA

The "Boxers" Are Threatening the Pres-
ent Order There.

RUSSIAN MINISTER WANTS GUNBOATS

One Hundred American Marines Are Tien
Tsin. Belgians Are Besieged
and in Danger.Shang Hai, May 29.—The Russian
minister at Peking has telegraphed his
government asking that all available
gunboats be sent to Taku at once.American Marines at Tien Tsin.
Tien Tsin, May 29.—One hundred
American marines, from the cruiser
Newark, are expected here tonight. An
armed rescue party of Frenchmen and
Germans started this afternoon to try
to relieve the besieged Belgians. The
Chinese viceroy, under pressure of the
French consul, has permitted the res-
cues to travel by the railroad to Feng
Tai, where all Chinese protection ends.The Situation More Quiet.
Tien Tsin, May 29.—A detachment
of two hundred Chinese soldiers have
cleared the railway between here and
Pekin and ordinary service is resumed.
No news has been received from the
Belgian engineers who are engaged in
the construction of the Lohan line. In
other respects the situation is more
quiet. Thirty Japanese have arrived
here from a gunboat at Agokan. The
French flagship Dromedaireaux and the
gunboat Surprise have left Taku.Russia About to Land Troops.
London, May 29.—A dispatch received
here from Shanghai says: It is be-
lieved that Russia is about to land
troops at Taku. The Chinese are re-
ported to be sending large masses of
troops overland from Hu Nanad,
Kiang, but General Iseum refuses to
assume command on the plea of sick-
ness. The "Boxers" assert that they
are confident of receiving support from
the Dowager Empress, Princess Kiang
Yi, Chang Tzu and the entire Man-
churi army. Throughout the north of
China "Boxers" are enlisting in
hordes of desperadoes. They are in-
tent upon expelling everything foreign
from China.General Hernandez Captured.
Caracas, Venezuela, May 29.—Gen-
eral Hernandez, revolutionary leader,
has been captured by the government
troops. The revolution is now con-
sidered ended.BIG SHOOT IN WALLA WALLA.
