DALLIES SCOURING MILL ABOUT READY.

D. D. Phelps Returns There to Complete Putting in Machinery.

Darr Phelps, of this city, for a number of years connected with the Pendleton wool scouring and packing mills, has returned to The Dallis to complete putting in the machinery for the new scouring mills of that place. Mr. Phelps states that a very fine plant is going in there, the machinery being of the latest and most approved patterns. He expects that the mills will be in operation in about three weeks.

The Pendleton mills have also started up, and will be busy until the end of the scouring season.

Permit to Graze on Reserve.

Sheepmen who desire to graze lands on the forest reserved now only make application to the department of the interior, which provides that a grower must be a citizen of the United States, or one who has declared his intentions, a resident of the state; that the permit cannot be sold or transferred, and that it is the belief of the grower that the pasturing of sheep will not injure the permanency of the timber or stop the continuous flow of water and springs.

Further provisions are as follows:

"I do hereby agree that the pasturing shall not begin earlier than—, and shall end not later than—, 1900, and that the sheep shall not be carried within 500 yards of any running stream or living spring, and that they shall not intrude on any of the said excepted areas, or on any well known places of public resort or reservoir supply."

"I hereby bind myself, my herders and rustlers and other employees engaged in caring for the sheep while on the reserve, to extinguish all fires started by any of said employees before leaving the vicinity thereof, and to aid in extinguishing all any and forest fires within the territory occupied by me or my said employees, and to co-operate generally with the forest reserve officers and rangers in protecting the ranges from fires and depredations, if within my power to do so, and to give timely information thereof to the said forest officers and rangers."

"I also further agree that as soon as my sheep enter the reserve, and thereafter, I will notify the forest supervisor in charge of the reserve of their specific location, and will give a description of the range occupied, to the end that the exact location of the sheep at all times, while in the reserve, may be known to the forest officers."

"I also agree to forfeit the permit for a violation of any of its terms or of the terms hereof, or whenever an injury is being done, the reserve by reason of the presence of the sheep therein."

WALLOWA SHEEPMEN SOLD WOOL.

During Flurry Last Winter They Accepted High Prices and Many Got 10c.

Albert Wurzweller, of Joseph, formerly of Pendleton and who is visiting in Pendleton today, said that Wallowa county sheepmen have the laugh on the sheepmen of all other counties of Oregon.

"During the past winter," said Mr. Wurzweller to the East Oregonian, "buyers offered from fifteen to sixteen cents a pound for the wool of that county, and the majority of the growers accepted. Some few refused, but the great bulk took the offer, and made contracts to deliver the wool this spring at the high prices then offering."

"Now that the season has come on and sheepmen everywhere are unable to secure such prices as they could then have secured, and the buyers even are holding off a little, the Wallowa county sheepmen think they have a laugh coming, and feel rather good that they took the winter offers and did not have too radical a view as to the value of wool in the future."

"Sheepmen are feeling good also for the reason that the increase in lambs has been very large, as it has been in other parts of the country, and the grass is in the very finest shape for the summer's feeding. Nature is doing her duty this year, beyond a doubt, for the wool grower."

EXAMINING EIGHTH GRADE PAPERS.

Names of Those Who Have Passed to be Ready Late in the Week.

Charles McIntosh, L. T. Link, Miss Rozee Epple and Norval Bradley have been named as the board to examine the papers of the eighth grade pupils who stood for the examination which

Oregon Federation to Assemble Here for Three Days Session.

The first meeting of the Oregon Federation of Women's clubs to be held in Pendleton this week, beginning Thursday morning, at 10 o'clock, at the Thompson street M. E. church, is something that the club women, and their friends have long been looking forward to.

We had hoped, through the courtesy of our local papers to have had some outline of the work of the convention published in good season, that, not only our club women but others, might be informed concerning our objects and purposes. Friday afternoon the convention will adjourn in season to drive to the Indian school, where Miss Gaither will show them the industrial work of the children.

A picnic lunch will be taken, and the Indian children will serve coffee. The party will return to town in season for the evening meeting, at 8:30, when Mrs. Dunaway will give an address on "Eminent Women." To this meeting, the general public is most cordially invited. There will be several musical numbers before the address. We specially request that our friends and visitors be promptly on the hour, 8:30 Friday evening, at the Thompson street M. E. church.

No invitations have been issued either for the Thursday evening reception, or Friday afternoon drive and picnic. Our club women will entertain our visitors in their homes, and each hostess will make it her business and pleasure to look after the comfort and pleasure of her guests.

The complete program will be printed tomorrow.

WOMEN OF WOODCRAFT.

Grand Guardian Van Orsdall Returns from Visit to Denver and Leadville.

Mrs. C. C. Van Orsdall, grand guardian of the Women of Woodcraft, is at home again, having been in Denver and Leadville, attending to business for the order of which she is the executive head. Mrs. Van Orsdall attended the meeting of the grand board of management in Leadville, at which was appointed the representation of the various districts in the coming grand session at Salt Lake. There will be 63 delegates, coming from the thirteen districts, the total votes to be cast being 250. The votes of the districts delegates are apportioned according to the membership in the various districts, representation thus being thoroughly democratic.

Pendleton district, No. 10, will have 23 delegates, and the convention of that district is to meet in Pendleton on June 20. Then will be elected the delegates to the grand session. The delegates to the district are already elected from Daphne Circle, No. 2, are Mrs. Joseph Boltemann, Mrs. Belle Watson, Mrs. N. J. Sloan, Mrs. A. D. Stillman and Mrs. Lelia Krause. The Pendleton district includes the Eastern Oregon counties and Kilkitt county, Washington.

Mrs. Van Orsdall also visited Denver to attend to business connected with the order.

"The record which has been made during the past two years," said the grand guardian to the East Oregonian, "is one which will make every member proud to have the world learn of the affairs of the order. The report to be made at the Salt Lake grand session will probably show a net increase of ten thousand members for the two years. Two years ago, we had six thousand members, but the membership will be no less than sixteen thousand by the time the June session meets at Salt Lake. This showing we are willing to compare with that of any other fraternal order in existence in the United States."

"Colorado has now the largest membership in the order, Oregon comes next."

At the Salt Lake session, officers are to be elected for the ensuing two years. It is understood that Mrs. Van Orsdall will be a candidate for re-election. The fine administration she has given during the years of her incumbency certainly should insure her being again chosen for the coming term.
