IMPROVE THE CITY CEMETERY.

Mr. Fell Offers Fifty Dollars, if Citizens and Council Take Matter in Hand.

"I will give fifty dollars towards a fund for the improvement of the city cemetery, if the citizens and the council will take up the matter and carry out plans to the proper beautifying of the burial ground."

This was said by T. E. Fell, this morning, in conversation with the East Oregonian, regarding the condition of the city cemetery, which condition is universally admitted to be disgraceful in the extreme. Mr. Fell's interest in the subject has led him to do some figuring, and the result is an approximate estimate made by him and a prominent contractor in piping. Their approximate estimate is \$4000 to make all the improvements necessary to rendering the cemetery a place in which people may bury the bodies of their friends, without feeling that they are guilty of heartlessness in so doing.

It is thought that many citizens would add their names to the subscription list, until the offer of Mr. Fell is augmented to \$2000. The council will then be asked to supply the balance. The argument used in favor of the plan is as follows:

The city must soon extend the city water mains from the present terminus at the end of Webb street. Many homes are being built in the district now without water, and in west Pendleton, and already very many people are living there, without any water from the city system, and no protection in the event of fire. To extend a three-inch pipe to the highest point in the cemetery would require about 4500 feet of piping. A reservoir could be built at the cemetery, large enough to hold water for the watering of the grounds, and it could be filled during the hours when the system could best spare it.

Several of the lodges of the town have frequent occasion to bury bodies of deceased members, and they doubtless would contribute towards the fund to be raised. The people living in the part of the city now not supplied with water think they should have the main extended, and have water in common with the remainder of the city.

It is proposed to take the matter up at once and ascertain the cost of the improvements, and then to circulate a list for private subscriptions, which is to be presented to the council, with the request that that body appropriate it with enough to carry out the plan. Local pride will certainly insure success for the project.

SOLDIERS' GRAVES DECORATED.

Garlands of Flowers for Those Who Sleep in Olney Cemetery. Although Decoration Day was not formally observed in Pendleton, the memories of the old soldiers were revived today by a faithful few. In the absence of set ceremonies, and with other apparently negligent and forgetting the services performed by the men who fought in the wars, Members of the local camp of the Grand Army of the Republic and its sister organization among the grand army women visited the Olney cemetery, quite early in the morning, and decorated the graves. The grand army officers carried their post flag, and the women the banner of their organization.

Numbers of others remembered the friends and relatives whose bodies are interred in the Olney cemetery, quite a great many citizens visiting the burial ground during the day. Some of the graves were decorated during the afternoon, and throughout the entire day from time to time carriages traveled towards the cemetery.

The only formal recognition of the advent of Memorial Day was had last Sunday, when the annual sermon was preached at the Thompson street Methodist Episcopal church by the Rev. John Uren, pastor of the church. The services were conducted in the afternoon, and were attended by members of the various churches and old soldiers and their families.

In other towns of Oregon today the occasion was rather elaborately observed, extensive programs being rendered. This was the case in Portland, where in addition to the usual ceremonies, exercises were held in the public schools throughout the city. Speakers were appointed for each school building.

TRACK TEAM TO GO TO WESTON.

Roy Conklin Will Take Several School Athletes to Compete in the Sports. Saturday morning, the track team of the Pendleton public schools under the charge of Assistant Principal Roy Conklin, will leave for Weston, where on the same day they will compete against the Weston normal school in field day events. The team will be composed of these: Sprinters—Wyrtick and McCarty. Bicycle events—Adams and Ray Robbins. Broad jump—Wells. All-round—Cronin and Hawks.

The committee in charge of the field day sports at Weston has taken up the matter of avoiding the competition for cash prizes, and will substitute medals or other prizes instead. The boys are not training for the event, and will try to be in good condition on Saturday. Ray Robbins belongs to the junior team, being substituted for Taylor, who cannot go on that day.

The sports are in connection with the annual picnic of the Unatilla County Pioneer Association, which begins tomorrow, and lasts until the end of the week. Mrs. Duniway's Address. Distinguished Oregon Woman to Speak at Thompson St. Church Friday Evening.

IMPROVED ROADS AT LAWTON.

Liberal Subscription Raised to Effect that Desirable End. "Lawton and neighboring camps are to have better roads in the immediate future," said Frank Fossati, partner of Gus Lafontaine in business there. Mr. Fossati, returned to Pendleton this morning, and speaks very encouragingly of that place. He says business is booming, and that there are 1000 people within a mile radius of Lawton. He reports \$15,000 as being already raised to put the road from Sumpter to Lawton on a fine shape. The money was raised by popular subscription. Lawton gave \$500, Granite and Alamo a like amount, and Sumpter \$2500. The balance was given by the mining companies surrounding Lawton and Granite. Mr. Fossati will return to Lawton in a few days.
