FEDERATION OF WOMEN'S CLUBS

IS IN SESSION AT THOMPSON STREET METHODIST CHURCH THREE DAYS.

Convention Began at Ten O'clock This Morning—Proceedings and Delegates.

The Oregon Federation of Women's Clubs met in biennial convention this morning at 10 o'clock at the Thompson street Methodist church. Prior to the calling to order, the credentials committee were in session in the lecture room, adjoining the audience room, and received from the delegates the certification of those that were entitled to vote during the proceedings. Upon the call to order by the president, Mrs. C. B. Wade, of this city, the church was filled with club women. Call to order was on time, something very unusual in conventions of any kind, as everyone well knows.

After the invocation by Mrs. N. E. Dospain, and the singing of America by the convention, the report of the credentials committee was read, and the address of welcome was given by Mrs. J. A. Fee, of the city, chairman of correspondence of the general federation. Mrs. Fee spoke without manuscript, gracefully welcoming the delegates to the homes of the Pendleton club women, and voicing the pleasure they and all the citizens felt at the honor of entertaining the first biennial convention of the state federation since its organization in Portland on October 24, 1899.

Mrs. Fee Welcomed Delegates.

"We pledge our best hospitality," said Mrs. Fee. "Early settlers looked not forward to staidness more eagerly than did the club women of Pendleton to the formation of the state federation, for in Pendleton was the mother club of the federation now assembled in convention."

"We are here that we may counsel together of things such as will redound to the elevation of womanhood. Every club should be represented. From the smaller ones, we may learn perseverance and fortitude for the difficulties they have to meet. Our mothers in the larger ones receive the contribution of power and numbers. Scholars tell us that Venice, once all-powerful, gained her greatness, not from the larger craft, but from the many smaller ones that plied in the trade she controlled."

Speaking of the club movement, Mrs. Fee said, in part: "Our mothers in the olden days performed tasks and drudgeries which have of later years been obviated by the inventions and improvements of the age. So that our daughters have time for either social frivolity or worthy work for their homes and higher social conditions. Properly directed, this work is the task of the clubs of today."

Mrs. Fee's welcome was warmly applauded by the convention, as was also the response by Mrs. J. B. Constock, of Portland. Mrs. Constock's remarks followed. She is president of the Portland Woman's Club.

Response to Address of Welcome.

The remarks of Mrs. J. B. Constock, in response to the address of welcome were as follows:

In behalf of the delegates and visiting club women who are here today, I thank you for the cordial reception you have given us. Your welcome is not alone in words, for the social atmosphere of your town teems with the whole-souled hospitality so beautifully expressed in the address of welcome. I speak also for the absent members, those who are just as much interested in the success of the federation as we are, but who are detained by duties they could not leave.

"We have travelled hither from all parts of our fair state to hold the first meeting of the Oregon Federation of Women's Clubs. We have come from homes of ample means and from homes of humble means, from city homes and from village homes; but we meet here as one sisterhood, all interested in the same cause and having the same object in view—to learn better how to live, so that we may enrich the soil within and do our duty to those around us."

"The great value of such gatherings as these, lies in the inspiration we receive from others interested in the same line of work. As a flower unfed and gives forth the beauty and fragrance of its nature under the genial rays of the sun, so does the human soul, under the influence of noble thoughts and inspiring words, awaken to the possibilities that lie dormant within. We seem for the time to live in a different atmosphere, to see with clearer eyes and to catch a brief glimpse of life on a higher plane; for no one can be thoroughly interested in a noble cause without imparting enthusiasm to others."

"A recent writer says: 'To be warped unconsciously under the magnetic influence of all around is the destiny to a certain extent of even the greatest souls.'"

"Never before have the women of the whole world been so alive to that which is progressive, ennobling and altruistic. No rose can return to the narrow confines of the bud, and no human being can again tolerate a narrow egotistical view of life after he has once experienced the pleasure of altruism—the panacea for discontent, the keynote of a happy, useful life—the ideal of the progressive woman's club."

"The Oregon Federation of Women's Clubs, which holds its first convention under such pleasant auspices, needs all the encouragement and support we can give it in its infancy. Its president and the ladies of Pendleton, whose fame for hospitality has gone abroad over the state, have so admirably arranged the details that it need but our hearty co-operation to make this, the first meeting, an event long to be remembered by the club women of Oregon. And when the Federation contains a hundred clubs and has grown in wisdom and wealth, let us take pride in the thought that it was our privilege to be present at the christening."

Dr. F. W. Vincent, mayor of Pendleton, was on the program to give the greeting to the convention, but when the president's call fell, and Dr. Vincent was not in the room, it was reported that he had been called away suddenly on urgent professional duties, much to the regret of all the ladies of the federation.

A BUSINESS SESSION.

Convention Hears Minutes of Portland Meeting and Reports of Officers.

During the morning of the forenoon session, the convention devoted itself to the listening of the minutes of the convention held in Portland last October, when the federation of the Oregon clubs was effected. Officers' reports were also submitted.

Mrs. Evans, recording secretary, read the minutes of the Portland convention, when the federation was organized, and Mrs. Spaulding, of La Grande, corresponding secretary, read a record of the work of her department.

Letters were read by Mrs. Spaulding from Mrs. Low, president of the general federation; Mrs. A. H. Stewart, of Olympia, who is called the mother of the club movement on the coast; Mrs. Cobb, state chairman of Idaho; Mrs. Sarah Decker, vice-president of the general federation.

The treasurer's report was read, but the items are contained in the report of the recording secretary, Mrs. Evans, which was as follows:

The first session of the O. F. W. C. convened at 5 p. m., October 25, 1899, at Portland and adjourned one hour later to meet in Pendleton during the month of June, 1900. The first meeting of the executive board was held immediately after, its first act being to elect Mrs. Wade, president of the federation, chairman of the board. Ways and means of procuring the necessary books and stationery was then considered. Mrs. Child, president of the '95 Mental Culture Club of Roseburg had the honor of paying the first dues to the federation. The Pendleton club of Pendleton and the Neighborhood of La Grande following, making \$9.70 for which a warrant was immediately drawn, enabling the officers to procure suitable books, with which to open the accounts of the federation.

The lateness of the hour of adjournment made it impossible for the secretary to get the clubs voting for federation to register and much work and embarrassment to the officers resulted therefrom. Several clubs voting at the convention to federate have not as yet sent their dues and upon a request to do so have declined membership, which has caused much confusion and misunderstanding. But the record being finally adjusted, shows a membership of eighteen clubs, with an individual membership of 619.

Dues received from clubs, \$61.00; disbursements per warrants signed by president and secretary, \$38.15; cash in treasury, \$23.75.

Since the meeting of the last convention there have been four meetings of the executive board, held in Portland, at none of which, except the first, was there a full board present, but a quorum which enabled the business of the federation to be promptly attended to and the record shows no unfinished business for the convention.

This Afternoon.

Shortly before noon, this convention adjourned to reassemble at 2 o'clock.

The federation song was sung at the opening this afternoon, after which were heard the reports of the various clubs, and the report of the committee on revision of the constitution and by-laws. Mrs. C. B. Wade spoke on the "Objects of Oregon Federation," and the subject of education was taken up next. A paper by Miss Edinger, of Portland, who is absent, was read by Mrs. Rogers, of the same city, on "Kindergarten Work," one of the subjects of the constitution.

At 4 o'clock, Mrs. L. A. Woolery, of Leno, also of Portland, read the report of the committee on Domestic Science, by the chairman, Mrs. Ralph Miller, of Portland, was read by Dr. Mae Gardwell, of Portland, who also spoke on the same subject. Discussion followed.

Reception This Evening.

This evening, the convention delegates and friends of the clubs will attend a reception at the home of Mrs. C. B. Wade on Locust Hill. The affair will doubtless be one of the most pleasant features of the meetings.
