L. B. COX IN LINE.

Presides at a Democratic Meeting in
Portland and Speaks His Sentiments.

People throughout Oregon will be in-
terested in the following from the Port-
land Oregonian, regarding one of the
most respected democrats in the state,
who was not in sympathy with the
regular organization in the 1896 cam-
paign:

"Hon. William Smith, of Baker
City, fusion nominee, delivered
from the second district, delivered
one of his inimitable campaign
speeches, as he termed it, at the
Metropolitan theater last evening.

The speaker was introduced by L. B.
Cox, who said that he had been waited
upon in the morning by a somewhat
miscellaneous committee with the
statement that they were in search
of a pure and unadorned democrat to
preside over the meeting, and that he
had been complimented by their
choice. In accepting the position Mr.
Cox did not want to be understood
as endorsing all the vagaries which
the room contained, but that he was
led to act from the double motive of
presenting a warm personal friend
for whom he had the highest regard,
and because he would thereby be
afforded an opportunity of stating the
position of himself and those democ-
rats who had acted with him politi-
cally for the past few years. He spoke
of the pain and regret with which
they had felt compelled to sever the
ties of association with other mem-
bers of their party, but said they had
been actuated by a high sense of duty,
and if a like condition of affairs should
be again presented the same sense of
duty would impel like action on their
part.

But in his opinion circumstances
were not now the same. The time for
temporizing had passed, a broad line
of demarcation had been drawn and
any man who was conscious of the
duties of citizenship was compelled to
take a stand on one side or the other
of this line. He could not believe
that the men or the measures which
now gave character to the republican
party were calculated to serve the best
interests of the country, and while re-
fraining from any discussion of pend-
ing issues, he would simply announce
that he would take his stand on the
side of democracy. Three times in the
history of the government had the
democratic party been called upon to
meet great political issues. It had
first given Thomas Jefferson, a genera-
tion later it gave Andrew Jackson, and
now when these issues seemed even
graver than ever before, destiny seemed
to point to William J. Bryan as the
man to meet the emergency."

THE MARKETS.

Wheat Continues Dull—Livestock and

Wool.

Portland, May 31.—The Commercial

Review in its issue today says that the

wheat market here continues ex-

ceedingly dull, the small business done

being of a dragging character. Offer-

ings have been light. Prices are weak

and against sellers, being nominal at

50 to 52c for Walla Walla club, the

latter an extreme figure, and above its

export value at current freight rates.

Valley is quoted 51c, and bluestem 53

to 54c per bushel. The principal factor

influencing the local situation is the

comparatively strong tone of tonnage,

which is not plentifully offered except

at extreme figures. Exporters have

plenty of wheat on hand to finish ton-

nage in port, and for the two vessels

yet due for this season's loading; and

what buying they are doing is for new

crop loading. It is very evident that it

is their intention to provide necessary

tonnage first, and meet the wheat

market when the season opens at its

export value. The carry-over July 1

will be fully 7,500,000 to 8,000,000

bushels of wheat.

Wheat in San Francisco.

San Francisco, May 31.—Wheat has

ruled here steady. Advice, both public

and private, indicate that California

farmers are offering wheat quite freely,

realizing existing conditions, while

operating against them, and beyond

control, and that, low as prices are,

they can do better by selling than to

pay storage and interest charges. Ex-

porters show no disposition to work

actively, and the curtailed export de-

mand, together with large stocks of

wheat in rail-head warehouses, causes

an easier feeling as to values, and have

made no changes during the week. No

1 shipping is quoted at 90c per cental.

Exporters have only a limited supply

of tonnage on hand, and have grain

sufficient to cover wants, and not much

excess is shown to work forward,

their policy being to let the future take

care of itself.

Wheat in Pendleton.

Pendleton, May 31.—Wheat talk is

nearly all confined to the prospects for

the crop this fall, and the attention

that is paid to the Chicago and foreign

market operations. Messrs. McComas

& Lay, the local brokers, report that

today's market abroad elsewhere in

this issue, the residue of former crops

continues to dribble out in occasional

quiet sales, but transactions are not

frequent. It is said that the bulk of

sales for many weeks are solely to

supply millers' demands for current grind-

ing. In fact, the market for a long

time has been made by the millers of

the coast. Charters continue to rule

high, with no immediate prospect for

reduction in ocean freights. Local

wheat quotation is 40c for No. 1 club,

standard grade.

Wool in Boston.

Boston, May 31.—The wool market is

inactive. The demand consists of only

immediate wants. Territory wools are

meeting with slow sale. Fleece wools

are dead on the market. There is

some demand for quarter blood grades.

Quotations are: Territory wools—Mon-

tana and Dakota, fine medium and

fine, 19 to 20c; secured 55c; staple, 50c.

Utah and Wyoming, fine medium

and fine, 17 to 18c; secured, 54 to 55c;

staple, 57 to 58c. Idaho, fine medium

and fine, 16 to 17c; secured, 53 to 55c;

medium, 20 to 21c; secured, 46 to 48c.
