A WATER COMMISSION.

Council Planning to Revise the Charter.

Committee is Appointed.
Messrs. Hartman, Clifton and Roosevelt, councilmen, have been appointed a committee to revise the city charter. The idea is to inaugurate an important change in the plans for handling the water system, having a water commission similar to the commission in Portland.

Mavor Vincent and T. F. Howard have visited the pumping station and taken measurements preparatory to putting in the new Deane pump which has been bought from the factory.

It is confidently predicted by his friends that he will be an efficient officer, and add to the many friends he now has, as proven by the vote of Monday.

Mr. Chamberlain returns home today, to Athens. He will go to Portland next week, to attend the Oregon grand lodge of Free Masons, of which he is a member, holding the office of custodian of the work, for the district comprised by the Eastern Oregon counties.

In two weeks, he will remove to Pendleton, to remain until taking charge of the clerk's office on the first of July.
Regarding the men who will serve as Mr. Chamberlain's deputies, he preferred not to say anything at this time.

HARRY RITNER TO BE MARRIED.

Cards Announce His Wedding to Take Place June 13 in Victoria, B. C.
Cards were received in Pendleton today by numerous friends which announce that on June 13, Wednesday, in Victoria, B. C., Mr. Harry Ritner will be married to Miss Lillian, daughter of Mrs. Phebe Kate Turner, of that city. The wedding is to be in St. Barnabas Church.

Mr. Ritner is the eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. Ritner, of Pendleton. He went from Pendleton to Victoria, several years ago, and has been engaged

in civil engineering work since locating there. Mr. Ritner was formerly assistant county surveyor of this county, and was later employed in the office of the superintendent of bridges and buildings, at this point.

YATES IS COUNTY TREASURER.

According to Official Canvass in Part His Plurality is Shown to Be Nine.
Total vote on county treasurer: Yates, 1348, republican; Peebler, 1339, democratic; Kern, 939, independent; Talbert, 187, prohibitionist. Yates' plurality, 9.

These are the figures obtained on the county treasurer's election, with official canvass of the precincts which were doubtful, according to figures of both republican and democratic county committees, and the remaining precincts given according to the figures received from each by the two committees directly from the polling places.

It is believed these figures are correct, although, of course, the completion of the official canvass may make changes in the totals.
The matter is really in doubt, and will be until canvass is complete.

Mountain precinct voted: Kern, 15; Peebler, 25; Talbert, 2; Yates, 39.
Hogue—Kern, 15; Peebler, 4; Talbert, 2; Yates, 7.
Vinson—Kern, 10; Peebler, 7; Talbert, 2; Yates, 9.

Yonkum—Kern, 9; Peebler, 10; Talbert, 0; Yates, 9.
Canvassing the Vote.
Shortly after 1 o'clock this afternoon, the canvassing board, Deputies County Clerk J. T. Lambirth, Justice Rosenberg and Justice Parkes, began the official canvass of the voters of the county. This consists of going over the tally sheets of the various precincts, and comparing all the totals, to see that they correspond in each instance. So soon as the official canvassing has been completed, the exact figures will be obtainable on all candidates.

Owing to the keen interest in the outcome as to treasurer, the election board first took the precincts from which no returns had been brought in outside the sealed boxes. Hogue, Meason, Vinson, and Yonkum, the latter having been in in part.

The canvassing will be completed this afternoon, and the final figures will therefore be given in the election table by the East Oregonian tomorrow evening.

Keenest interest is felt in the canvassing, and inquiries are innumerable from all parts of the county, for the final figures on the treasurer's fight. The late casting and recasting of the figures had shown the matter to hinge upon a few votes, at the best, and no one was sure of the outcome until the vote had been officially canvassed.

A feature of the election, is that while Mealy had about 574 plurality, yet he has only one majority over all candidates in the county. Simmons, independent democrat, and Butler, prohibitionist, had a total of over 300 votes for congress in the county.

Stillman Carried Umattila County.

Correction of the election figures has established that A. D. Stillman carried Umattila county, by a plurality of about 150, instead of Ellis carrying it by over a hundred plurality. The figures have given out were incorrect, but have been gone over today, with the result that Mr. Stillman is shown to have had a plurality in this county. This alters materially the circuit judge election returns. Ellis carried Morrow county by about 300, leaving him a plurality over Stillman of only about 150.

REMARKABLY SHORT TERM.

Circuit Court Will Have Only One Jury Trial, and no Criminal Business.

When Judge Lowell reopened the circuit court Tuesday, only one case appeared on the docket ready for trial, and therefore that will be the only case tried at the present term. Not a man is in jail for trial, and hence there will be no criminal business, not a case. Probable cases are without precedent in this county, and are tried at the regular term, sometimes more than that. As many or more criminal cases ordinarily occupy the attention of the court.

The case before the court was that of the First National bank of Walla Walla against B. McDonald, John Sharpstein appears for the bank, and T. G. Bailey for the defendant. It involves the boundary line of a piece of land owned by the bank, claiming that the line should be farther east. If the bank wins out in its contention 12 acres more would be the bank's than at the present time.

The jury was out all night, and this morning came into court saying they could not agree.
