HARVEST NEXT WEEK.

Drysdale Will Begin on Cox Variety.
Other Varieties Almost Ready.

Alexander Drysdale, agent for the Scotch variety in this county, states that he will begin wheat harvest next week on the land which he has in crop, amounting to several hundred acres to the northwest of Pendleton. He has several hundred acres also in other parts of the county, which will be ready for cutting soon afterward, some of it the following week. In the region northwest from Pendleton, on the famous Prospect farm, barley harvest is now in progress. George Pfeiffer, of the same locality, states that he will be at the harvest work within a few days.

The wheat which will first be cut there is the Cox variety, always earlier than any other grown in this county. The samples brought in today by Mr. Drysdale show that the wheat is in a remarkably fine condition. The berry is larger than has been seen here for many years, and there are thousands of acres just as good as the samples shown by Mr. Drysdale.

Interviews with a number of farmers from all parts of the county establish the fact that nothing has occurred in weather conditions to accomplish the least injury to the wheat or other grains. Ever since the spring opened, the grain has had ideal conditions in temperature and moisture. Nearly all the farmers agree that it is scarcely possible for the weather to be such as to work any considerable damage now, even though no more rain comes. In fact, the absence of rain will be an advantage, allowing the grain to mature better than it is now doing. The rain fall has been so great for the past winter and spring that the grain has attained a very rank growth, and needs only warm dry weather to mature the biggest yield ever taken from the ground in this county. With an abnormally large acreage, and such a large yield as seems now to be certain, the farmers of this county are likely to have nothing in the world over which to worry, excepting the price. Dearth reports from the Middle West received here today encourage the belief that the price may be better than otherwise anticipated.

EARLIEST HARVEST YET.

Louis Haggen States That Farmers Will Be at Cutting During Coming Week.
Louis Haggen was one of the farmers who were in town today, and who were asked regarding the condition of the wheat crop. Mr. Haggen stated that harvest will begin next week, and that this will be the earliest he has ever known. Cox wheat will be the first cut, as usual, and the other varieties will be ready within a few days hereafter.

The yield will be a big one, notwithstanding the grain was slightly injured some time ago when a frost came early in the season.

"In ten days," said Mr. Haggen, "the wheat will be out of danger from the hot winds."

NEW BRICK KILN OUTPUT.

Dan Mays Burns Brick at Athens for Selbert Roesch Building in Pendleton.

The bricklayers are at work on the superstructure of the Selbert-Roesch building being erected on the lots opposite the French restaurant, of which Millard White is the architect. Dan Mays, who has the contract for the brick has brought down from Athens the first lot of the brick to be used in the walls. Mr. Mays burned them at Athens, and this is the first kiln of brick ever burned there. Competent judges pronounce them first-class brick, and Mr. Mays is quite well pleased with the venture of establishing a brickyard in Athens.

For the construction of the Selbert-Roesch building, 220,000 common brick will be required, with 10,000 pressed brick for the trimmings of the front.

Frank Duprat, one of the best known and most reliable masons of this place, who will have charge of the work of laying the brick, states that the Athens brick will make a fine wall, and that he regards them as all right.

Mr. Mays expects to improve on the next kiln burned, the ground upon

which they are placed while burning being more solidly packed, and therefore less likely to settle and thus break the brick during the burning. The work on the building here will be rushed to completion as rapidly as possible.
