THE CASE OF MARY GREGORY.

For Fifty-six Days Her Temperature Has Averaged 112 Degrees.

Mary Gregory, aged 24 years, has been ill at her home in Penn Yan, New York, for nearly two months. Her temperature has passed all previous records in medical practice. For fifty-six days she has lived with an average temperature of 112 degrees, and on one occasion it reached 119 degrees, almost the limit of register of the thermometer.

Dr. Frank Sampson, the physician in charge, gives this statement of the case:

"On September 18 last I was called in attendance in the case. On November 21 I took her to the Homeopathic hospital, in Rochester, and a surgical operation was made. The pain that had existed stopped and has never returned in the locality of the incision made.

"Following this sensitiveness began that gave us reason to suspect there was trouble in the appendix, but in her weakened condition we thought it best not to operate at that time, but wait for her to recuperate. The patient returned to her home in Penn Yan and continued to improve until February 15, when fever was found to have developed, 102 degrees, and a pronounced case of appendicitis developed. I advised an operation, but her previous experience seemed to discourage her, and she refused to allow it. The inflammation continued and an abscess formed, with distress over a large area of the abdomen. I found that the temperature had risen still higher and was then 112 degrees, being as high as my instrument would register. I tried it several times, thinking my thermometer must be wrong. I sent for counsel, and his instrument recorded the same result. I have had four physicians of this village to see the patient, and seven different thermometers have been used, the result being the same in each instance. The temperature has been up to 112 degrees every day since March 24, and fever is preceded by a hard chill.

"The patient with the exception of a few days, has not been above 120, and the tongue has been clean. The mind has been clear except when opiates have been used.

"The patient is emaciated, but her strength is remarkable, as she is now able to turn herself in the bed without assistance. The case is without parallel in my experience, and I doubt if such a temperature, 112 degrees, for so long a time, fifty-six days, has ever been known.

"The previous theory of the blood being changed at a temperature of 102 degrees must necessarily be exploded."

On Thursday last a thermometer was procured which registered 120 degrees. It was applied and Miss Gregory's temperature rose to the 119 point. She was in great pain at the time and accidentally hit the glass tube in her bed, so that no further test could be made with it. A thermometer with a registry of 123 has been sent for.

Five out-of-town physicians visited the patient when the last test was taken, and Dr. Sampson is receiving letters daily from every part of the United States.
