And these are some of the "salary" schedules in Rathbone's department for the same period, showing the "graft" of Hanna's pet; salaries department post, \$219,087.00; "Miscellaneous," not accounted for in any other way, \$49,544.86; salaries, post office, \$35,072.90; salaries, postmasters, \$87,364.39; salaries, railway postal clerks, \$24,279.49; salaries, letter carriers, \$17,927.24; star route contractors, \$14,406.53; mail transportation, \$14,251.19; printing and stationery, \$31,190.48; "carriages, etc.," \$3,105.29. Rathbone even paid his laundry bills out of the government receipts.

Of course "Colonel" Frank Hecker is in it! There could be written no laudible account of an exhumed scandal of the administration's Cuban regime without some mention of General Russell A. Alger's chief of staff, closest friend and personal representative in the notorious days of rotten beef, transport scandals, syndicate robberies, corporation thievery and what not. "Colonel" Hecker built for the war department six miles of railroad in Cuba while he was in charge of the quartermasters' department for the island. Hecker was a civilian who had suddenly been made a colonel over the heads of regular officers. This honest gentleman constructed the six miles of road at an estimated cost to the government of \$100,000 a mile—which could be duplicated today, it is said, for \$15,000 a mile—and the war department has received claims against the government for the lands, houses, etc., which were obtained for the right of way for the road, aggregating another \$400,000. Alger and Hecker are now private citizens, enjoying their liberty and the pursuit of happiness. But this little Cuban railroad entitles them to honorable mention in any discussion of American occupation of Cuba!
