ASSESSMENT COMPLETED.

Mr. Buzan Says the 1900 Work of Enrolling Property is Done.

George Buzan, the present assessor and who was re-elected last week for another term of two years, stated today that the work of the 1900 assessment has been completed, and that it is believed that all or as near to all as possible to find of the property of Umatilla county has been placed upon the assessment rolls. Speaking of the matter of assessments and collection of taxes, Mr. Buzan said: 'Yes, I believe the taxes should be collected in the fall. This is especially necessary in this county, where for the majority of people money is more easily obtainable in the fall than in the spring. One feature I will cite as bearing on the subject. There are many persons who rent lands in this county, and who, once assessed, for personal property, harvest their crops in the fall and pack up and leave the country, going either to other states. This requires the county to put up to the state the state taxes on their assessments, and the county receives nothing in return. This would be remedied in part at least, if taxes were collectible in the fall instead of in the spring. It is a matter that should be taken up by the legislature and the change made as indicated.'

RESULT OF DOMESTIC TROUBLES.

Case in Court Between Marshal Heathman and George Haigh.

George Haigh, formerly a resident of this city, came back to Pendleton on Tuesday, and was at once arrested by City Marshal Heathman on a charge of assault and battery. It is alleged that the offense was committed last fall, before Haigh left Pendleton, at his house then occupied on Bluff street, and the case will be tried tomorrow morning in the city recorder's office at nine o'clock.

Haigh in reply alleges that his arrest was due to personal grievances on the part of the officer, and he proposes to fight it in the courts. He has retained counsel for the case.
