GENERAL NEWS.

Pension appropriations for the present fiscal year are \$4,000,000 greater than ever.

C. A. Hawkins, a jeweler, committed suicide in San Francisco by taking morphine, after vainly trying to obtain employment in that city.

President Francisco, of Chili, has suffered the third paralytic stroke and his death is expected at any time. The executive functions of the country have been transferred.

Two detectives at Kansas City undertook to stop a street fight between a crowd of negro men and women Wednesday, and as a result of an exchange of shots, Rufus Bennett, an Ore. Childs, the latter a woman, were killed.

President Hill of the Great Northern, on returning from Europe, predicts a quiet year for business throughout the country in general, but forecasts an exception for the northwest. His reasons are the presidential election, which always affects business and industry to some extent.

Frank Smith, miner, made a large winning in a Mexican gambling house at Helvetia mining camp, Arizona, and was killed by Mexicans, who provoked a row before he could leave a saloon with the money. He was stabbed and killed with bullets, but in falling mortally wounded two Mexicans.

The postmaster-general has issued an order amending a previous regulation in regard to postage rates between the United States and its island possessions. The order says that the island of Porto Rico and the territory of Hawaii are included in the term "United States" and the island of Guam, the Philippine archipelago and Tutuila are included in the term "island possessions of the United States." And two cents takes a letter to any of them.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

Salem raised the necessary funds and will secure the annual encampment of the Oregon National Guard July 7 to 15.

James G. Blaine died at Eugene Tuesday, after a lingering illness. He was born in Keweenaw county, Indiana, January 4, 1838. He crossed the plains to Oregon in 1852 with his parents.

The deposits reach \$15,000 and the depositories number 7,000 in the Tacoma public schools savings bank. The system has been in vogue two years, and in this time the pupils have withdrawn but a trifle over \$3000.

A log on Morse Bros' logway, 13 miles below Hood river, got off the ways and knocked a bent out of a bridge on the O. R. & N. track, causing a delay of one and one-half hours to the east bound overland train.

Mrs. C. E. Bailey, of Seattle, was burned to death Sunday evening by the explosion of a coal oil lamp, by which she was reading. Her maiden name was Florence A. Finley, and she was the youngest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. R. Finley of Portland.

Representative Moody will remain in Washington until the last of the week looking after unfinished matters in the departments. He then leaves for Philadelphia, to attend the National convention, returning to Oregon after adjournment.

Senator Joseph Simon is on his way to Oregon. He is a delegate to the National republican convention at Philadelphia, which assembles on the 19th inst., but he is coming to Oregon instead of attending the convention, which is causing much comment.

Large quantities of Yakima wool are being shipped by boat from Portland to The Dalles for scouring. The peculiar turn of freight business is well illustrated in the Yakima wool shipment. From North Yakima it goes over the Northern Pacific to Puget Sound, thence to Portland, where a transfer is made to the steamer which take it to The Dalles to be scoured.

Twenty-five years ago Very Rev. Emile Katten, pastor of the Church of Our Lady of Lourdes at Spokane, was ordained to the Catholic priesthood and shortly thereafter came to Spokane as a missionary among the Indian tribes and to minister to the few white men who were here as traders. This event was made the occasion of the celebration of the beloved pastor's silver jubilee on Tuesday evening.

AT MUZZLE OF CHINESE GUNS

Foreign Legations in Danger of Attack From 30,000 Chinese.

COURIERS WERE SENT FOR TROOPS

International Troops Will Not Be Able to Reach Peking Before Sunday; 2,500 Men Are on the Road.

London, June 14.—A special from Shanghai says: The position of the legations at Peking is most critical. There are 30,000 Chinese troops drawn up outside of the gates of the city to oppose the relief force and guns are trained on the American, Japanese and British legations. The American, Russian and Japanese ministers have sent courier to Tien Tsin asking for troops. The United States gunboats Yorktown and Castine left yesterday for Tong Ku.

The "Boxers" Determined.
Tien Tsin, June 14.—Railroad communications between this place and Admiral Seymour's international force have been cut three miles beyond Yang Tai San. Two bridges have been destroyed. It is rumored the "Boxers" are determined to burn Tien Tsin railroad station tonight. It is feared the international troops cannot reach Peking before Sunday. The Japanese cruiser Sumi has arrived at Taku.

Russians Are Favored.
Washington, June 14.—The navy department has received the following dispatch: "Twenty-five hundred men are on the road to Peking for the relief of the legations. There are one hundred Americans among them. The English and Russians are in a large majority. All the nations are represented. The viceroy at Tien Tsin gave permission to the Russians for sending soldiers from Port Arthur with artillery."

Catholic Missions Destroyed.
Shanghai, June 14.—A dispatch from Chang Kiang says a riot has taken place at Yuen Na Fu. The buildings of the Roman Catholic missions are utterly demolished. All the missionaries are safe. The Russian troops passed up the Yang Tze river June 13.

British Troops Start.
Hong Kong, June 14.—Four companies of Hong Kong British regiment mountain battery and field battalion Asiatic artillery start for Tien Tsin tonight.

Japan to Send Troops.
Yokohama, June 14.—Japan is about to send a mixed regiment to China.

News From Admiral Kempf.
Washington, June 14.—Admiral Kempf's dispatch, received by the department this morning, makes no mention of any undue delay in the movement of foreign forces upon Peking, and as he is in position to secure the most accurate news from the relief column, the officials here believe there has been no untoward happenings. Some surprise is expressed at the strength of the column. There is sincere regret at the navy department at the comparative small representation of the United States in the movement. Intimation is very clear that if any further reinforcements are needed for the Chinese service, recourse must be had to the United States army.

The American Asiatic association is circulating a petition for signatures, addressed to the president, asking that the government take energetic steps to protect the American lives and interests in China.

Do Not Want Office.
Tien Tsin, June 14.—It is reported that Prince Tuan, the new head of the Chinese foreign office, and general Tung Fah Siang have resigned. Three Russian warships have arrived at Taku.

On Marriage and Divorce.
San Francisco, June 14.—Judge Belcher today filed an opinion in which he holds that marriages of divorced persons in this state, consummated within twelve months after the decree of divorce is granted, are invalid and that in the eyes of the law all such persons are married.

A Fatal Train Accident.
Atlanta, Ga., June 14.—The passenger train and an accommodation train on the Southern railway collided today, ten miles from Atlanta. Engineer Mayfield and flagman Davis were killed and eight trainmen injured.

Anti-Imperialists Meet.
New York, June 14.—The executive committee of the anti-imperialist league will meet here June 25 to consider whether or not to call a general convention to meet shortly after the close of the democratic convention.

Philadelphia, Pa., June 14.—The republican national committee assembled here this morning. The contest from the first Georgia district was taken up. The committee decided in favor of the Doveaux delegation. The District Columbia contest was settled in favor of the Jones and Chase delegation.

Kentucky Democrats Together.
Louisville, June 14.—The democratic state convention met here today. The selection of Ollie James as temporary chairman showed that the fight between him and Judge Longierty, anti-Beckham and Beckham candidates respectively, has been settled.

Missouri Democrats.
Jefferson City, Mo., June 14.—The democratic state convention met here today. The committee on resolutions, credentials and permanent organization was appointed and a recess was taken.

California Democrats.
Sacramento, June 14.—The democratic state convention convened here today. E. C. Farnsworth, of Tulare, was elected temporary chairman.

Vermont for Bryan.
Montpelier, Vt., June 14.—The democratic state convention nominated a state ticket by acclamation and declared for W. J. Bryan for president.

MODEL COOK HOUSE.

Wick Walker's Crew to Be Made Comfortable During Harvest.

A number of men were sitting on the sidewalk in front of the Hotel Pendleton Wednesday evening, when a team came down the street with a vehicle attached which called for inquiries from all of the group who were not residents of this place, where cook wagons are familiar sights to all. Here, when one sees a house on wheels passing through the streets, he knows that it is a cook house, for some thrashing or heading or combined harvesting crew. But, for these strangers in Pendleton, the sight was a novel one.

The cook house belonged to Wick Walker, who lives northwest from Pendleton, and it was about as fine an affair of that kind as anyone ever saw even here, where the getting up of cook houses is a fine art. Mr. Walker has evidently determined that his men shall have the maximum of comfort during the hot days when they are gathering the grain and pouring it into the big new threshing machine which Mr. Walker has bought.

In the rear end of the cook house is a fine new range, not an ordinary cook stove, rusty and worn, but a sure-enough range, on which the cook and cookess may prepare as good meals as possible for the workers. The sides of the house are covered with wire screens, so that any flies attempting to get into the house will have to go through the wire of which the screens are made. There is an abundance of room in the house, and there will be wide curtains on the sides, which may be raised and propped up like an awning on a building.

The commissary will be supplied with everything that goes to make up the model outfit of that kind, and it is apparent that the fare of the men of the Walker crew will be well treated.

all this is appreciated by the workers who intend to go into Umatilla county's harvest fields this summer, is proven by the applications Mr. Walker has had for positions, by the men, notwithstanding that men are scarce here.

It is claimed that such a cook house, even on hot days of midsummer, will be cool enough to be really comfortable in comparison with the outside atmosphere.

GENERAL BOTHA RETIRED

The British Accomplished Nothing From the Last Battle With the Boers.

NEWS OF CASUALTIES IS HELD BACK

Clearly Meets With No Opposition From Ingogo to Laing's Nek; Sir John Gordon Spriggs Forming a Cabinet.

London, June 14.—Lord Roberts' engagement with General Botha terminated as expected, by the Boer commander retiring from his position. Beyond driving Botha's forces further from the capital, little seems to have been accomplished, as Lord Roberts does not mention the capture of any prisoners or guns, or the infliction of any loss. The important feature of today's official dispatches is the announcement that the army in Natal is now in touch with Roberts' troops. The accomplishment of this arrangement should considerably accelerate the pacification of the Transvaal. That it is already bearing fruit is evident by the submission of the Wakerstoom district to General Littleton.

A dispatch from Buller says: "General Cleary encountered no opposition in his march from Ingogo to Laing's Nek, the latter place he now occupies. It is announced from Cape Town that Minar has sent for Sir John Gordon Spriggs, the former premier, who is now trying to form a cabinet."

MILLION POUNDS OF WOOL SOLD.

About That Amount Has Gone From Growers in Pendleton.

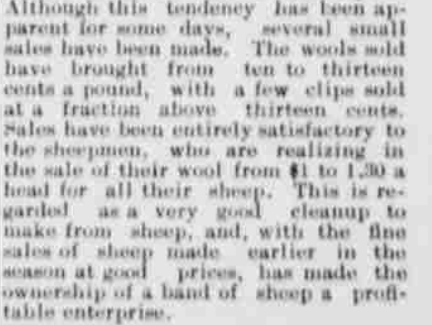
A million pounds of wool have been sold in this county up to this time, with a temporary tendency to wait manifested on the part of the buyers. Although this tendency has been apparent for some days, several small sales have been made. The wools sold have brought from ten to thirteen cents a pound, with a few clips sold at a fraction above thirteen cents. Sales have been entirely satisfactory to the sheepmen, who are realizing in the sale of their wool from \$1 to 1.30 a head for all their sheep. This is regarded as a very good cleanup to make from sheep, and with the fine sales of sheep made earlier in the season at good prices, has made the ownership of a band of sheep a profitable enterprise.
