UMATILLA'S HARVEST BEGINS.

Northwest of Pendleton Crops Are in Shape for the Big Harvesting.

Today, began the harvesting of the big crop of Umatilla county. Alex Drysdale, agent for the Scottish Mortgage companies, and also just appointed for Girvin & Eyre, shipping and commission and grain experts, of Portland and San Francisco, started the harvesters at work on his fields to the north of and west of Pendleton.

Others who are at work or will be harvesting within the next few days in that part of the county are: Wick Walker, John Duncan, M. J. Foster, A. Hevel and Lee Beam.

Mr. Drysdale, in speaking of the condition of the grain, stated to the East Oregonian that in his opinion there is no reason to fear that it has been injured. Reports are coming in every day to the effect that crops are hurt, but these reports are the result of too great timidity on the part of the farmers, or lack of careful examination.

Mr. Drysdale has been appointed to represent the marketing house of Girvin & Eyre, and will buy for them in this county during the season, and permanently thereafter. William C. Ripley, of Portland, of the Girvin & Eyre house, has been here for some time making the arrangements for Mr. Drysdale's agency.

The buyers will be plentiful in Pendleton this year. Besides Mr. Drysdale, there will be Fred W. Hendley, of the Puget Sound Warehouse company; Frank Carl, Western Warehouse company; E. E. McComas, for G. W. McNear; Will Moore, of the Pacific Coast Elevator company.

There will be plenty of wheat for all, with the big crop now to be cut from the fields of this county.

HAS A BIGGER NAME.

Poo of the Umatillas Had Better Enlarge His Cognomen.

Poo, chief of the Umatillas, has allowed a Nez Perce Poo to get a bigger name than he of the Umatillas has. The Nez Perce Indian uses up two Poo's and two H's in making his name complete, for he calls himself Poo Poo H H. He led a war dance recently in Lewiston, and money was thus secured for the Indians' Fourth of July celebration on the Nez Perce reservation. The Spokesman-Review says 500 or 600 members of the tribe assembled in Lewiston and that they were led by Poo Poo H H, accompanied by Jack Allen, one of the young bucks of the tribe, but notorious throughout this valley as a renegade of the worst sort, having been more than once before Judge Beatty, in the federal court, for whiskey disturbances.

Other noted Indians were Poo Poo Taliki and George Moses. Moses is one of the most intelligent and thrifty Indians on the reservation, and his word carries more weight in councils than any other man's among the Nez Perces. Prominent among the lookers-on were David McFarland and Frank Shively. McFarland was a member of the Carlisle football team of 1898 and Shively belongs to the Lewiston baseball team. The procession marched up Main street with Felix Warren and the big red stage coach crowded with about 20 of Lewiston's most prominent citizens bringing up the rear.

They were greeted on their arrival at the park by about 300 people. Jack Allen opened the ball by explaining the nature and purposes of the entertainment. He said the dance had been given many times during the war times, but now only in a friendly spirit and for the purpose of promoting good feeling among both races. Then followed the dance, which lasted about two hours and netted the Indians \$42 to aid them in their Fourth of July exercises.

Joe H. Voltas, a Spaniard who was found in the Philippines and brought from there a year ago by the Second Oregon Regiment of Volunteers, came up from Portland this morning, and will remain here for a time, perhaps permanently. All that depends upon whether he finds a good job, which every Oregon man will assist him in doing. Joe was a member of the Spanish army, serving in the signal corps. He welcomed the advent of

American troops, and served under General Sumner as a guide, performing his service in a voluntary manner. The boys pronounce him a manly fellow, who deserves good treatment at the hands of all American citizens.

Mr. Voltas was a native of the Farragosa province, Spain, and went to the Philippines to fight the Filipino, and was there when the Second Oregon helped capture the Spaniards. "I like America, all right, and will remain for a time, anyway. Later I may go to Manila again, to enter the service of your Uncle Sam."
