Reference to several Umatilla county

towns is made in the report on house-

to-house canvass. The report reads:

"At the last annual convention the

superintendent of the house-to-house

visitation made no report, and it may

be seen that it would have been better

for the present superintendent to have

followed in his predecessor's footsteps

in the matter of report, when you dis-

cover how very nearly nothing has

been done during the year. The work

in this department in the state has not

been very extensive, but there are

many signs to indicate that it has been

productive of good results. During the

year following towns have made a

house-to-house canvass: Salmon, Helix,

Foster, Pendleton, Echo, Athena,

Adams, Milton, Weston. The credit of

this work is due to the enterprise of

the local workers in these places, and

the several Sunday schools seem to

have followed up the canvass better

than was done in the city two years

ago. My observation is that a house-

to-house canvass which simply collects

the names of non-attendees upon the

Sunday school or church, which is not

promptly followed by a persistent as

well as cordial invitation to attend the

Sunday school or church, by the

denomination to whom the name is

given, is a disappointment in its re-

sults, particularly so in a city as large

as Portland. My own belief is that the

canvass ought to be nearly continuous

on the part of the various schools

rather than to depend on a periodic

or spasmodic effort to enroll the entire

community in the Sunday school, and

I believe that this is much more

needed in this city than in the small

communities where the Sunday school

officers know nearly every one in the

community."
