MUST'N DYNAMITE FISH.

Must Will See That Fishermen Are Not Allowed on the Reservation.

Agent Charles Wilkins, who came in from the reservation today, announced that he will be compelled to stop some of the fishermen on the reservation. The fishermen have been punished for an order he issued stopping everyone from fishing any more on Sundays. If more dynamiting occurs, the order will be extended to cover all the days of the week. Lovers of the fishing sport who are thus stopping the law of the land.

Mr. Wilkins states that the people have been allowed privileges on the reservation, which having been abused, he will comply with the Indians' request, and see that there is no more of the law breaking. He has also received complaint from the Indians regarding the stealing of various articles from their tepees, and this also will receive attention. It will be a lesson in the majority of the law for the one detained in the act of pilfering from the Indians, whose rights of property are as sacred as are those of other people.

Sunday evening, James Maloney, Lee Hold and J. F. Nowlin returned from a one day trip to Meadow creek, which is nine miles due north from Lehman Springs, over the line in Union county. They went on Thursday of last week. The party caught about 600 fish, and enjoyed the trip immensely. Meadow creek they pronounce prime fishing ground, and when such pleasant weather prevails as that during the past few days, it is as fine a section as can be found in the Blue Mountains.

Retreat of Sisters of Charity at the Catholic Academy.

Curl Takes the Western Warehouse and Bendley the Puget Sound.

Frank Curl was formally installed in the Pendleton agency of the Western Warehouse company this morning, and took charge of the business permanently, which was resigned by Fred W. Bendley, who will represent the Puget Sound Warehouse company hereafter. The agents are both busy attending the duties of installation, and will soon have the system of county buying agencies organized. Each will have a number of men under them, and will enter the field actively. Alex. Drysdale, who will buy for Curl & Eyre, has also taken charge of the business of the firm here and for the territory.
