GROUP INSURANCE MEN SCARCE.

Local Agent Sends Out Circular Urging Farmers to Insure.
Fully with the crop so near to harvest, there are here numerous agencies, going throughout the county, and writing policies on the many grains. This year, not so many of these insurance men are in the field, and many of the farmers are reluctant to work on the grain with a binder or binder. Perhaps they will come later, and perhaps they will leave work to the local agents.

One of the local agents has gotten out a circular to send to the farmers, in which it is urged upon them to insure their wheat and other grain in ripening and will soon be in danger of destruction by fire, from which so many have suffered in former years. You have devoted from one to two years of hard work in putting in, cultivating and harvesting your crop at such expense, and you cannot afford to incur the risk of losing it all. As a prudent man you will, without doubt, insure it while in the field, in transit and in warehouse, in order that you may receive compensation in case your crop is destroyed.

Many farmers have indicated their intention of insuring this year than ever before, on account of the larger amount of foliage with the straw, which renders it more liable to destruction by fire.

JOSEPH IN WALLOWA COUNTY.

Old Chief Looking Over the Country to Find a Location.

An impression has got out that Chief Joseph desires to come to the Umatilla county, for a permanent location during the remainder of his life. This is incorrect. It is to Wallowa county the old chief wants to go, and in fact, has gone, to look out a spot in which he can rest his weary Indian bones during the balance of his earthly career, and until he leaves this mundane sphere for the happy hunting grounds on the other side of the heavenly Columbia. The Wallowa county is Joseph's old stamping ground, and there would he return, to end an eventful career in peace and plenty, for that is a productive region, and fit for the very Indian gods themselves.

Col. William Parsons, of this city, informed the East Oregonian regarding the matter, stating that the petition by virtue of the allowance of which at Washington Joseph is making the present trip, was prepared by Col. Parsons recently, while in Washington. The latter was then legal representative of Chief Peo, of the Umatillas, and Chief Showaway, of the Cayuse tribe, of this reservation. Joseph was also in Washington, and secured the services of Col. Parsons to get the matter before the department. This he did, and furthermore, he granted the request of Joseph, that he be allowed to go to Wallowa county, and spy out a location for him and his people.

To Buy Lands.
The plan is to search for vacant lands, upon which to locate Joseph, if such vacant lands can be found. In the event they cannot be found, then an attempt will be made to purchase lands from the settlers now living in whatever section Joseph selects. Money for this purpose belongs to Joseph and his people and is now in the hands of the government at Washington.

For some time, Joseph has longed to return to the former hunting grounds in Wallowa county, having virtually been a prisoner on the Colville reservation during the years since he fought the wars against the whites.

Even although he desired to come to the Umatilla reservation, there are no lands here unallotted which could be set apart for such a purpose. The three tribes, Umatillas, Walla Wallas and Cayuses, have taken lands here in severalty, and the balance of the lands desirable were sold in 1891 to the highest bidder among the whites.

There is no room here for Joseph, or his people, and furthermore, Joseph does not care to come here, and has not intimated that he does.

PARIS, THE BEAUTIFUL.
An Able Lecture by Miss Sanford of the University of Minnesota.
A lecture as able as any ever before heard in Pendleton was that delivered in the Thompson street M. E. church on Monday evening, by Miss Sanford, of the University of English of the University of Minnesota. Her subject was "My observations in Paris," but this scarcely conveys to the mind the character of the lecture. For, it is rather a richly embellished historical survey of modern France, in which the pictures thrown upon the screen the picture the occasion for giving to the audience the ripe fruits of close study, together with the results of intelligent observation in the city of which she spoke. A life spent in the atmosphere of books, while all the practical of the teacher, Miss Sanford's career in the institution of which she is an honored professor, has fitted her especially to tell to an audience what she saw in Paris.

Had no pictures been shown the lecture would have been regarded as of very high order, and would have been intensely interesting. Indeed, contrary to the ordinary illustrated lecture, the pictures were mere incidents.

After introduction to the audience, Miss Sanford spoke for a few minutes on the subject of the principle of art in beautifying the homes and cities of a country.

"America is pre-eminent for the beauty and comfort of its homes, is famed the world over; but, while this is true, America may learn from foreign countries what means the

beautishment of the towns and cities, and perhaps from no city may so much be learned as from the beautiful city of Paris.

"It is one of the duties of the club women of the land to take up this subject, and devote to it their best energies, their best thought, their best endeavor, as well as our homes, and make them the more healthy, attractive and places in which it is a delight to live."

First showing the geography of the city of Paris, Miss Sanford took the audience through the streets and boulevards, stopped at the principal buildings, looked on the points of historical interest, and frequently threw in an apt quotation from the great authors and poets, illustrative of the thoughts suggested by the feature at the moment engaging the attention.

Especially valuable was the portion of her lecture which referred to the treasures of the art in the galleries of Paris. Beginning with the paintings of the earlier Italian artists, she showed the gradual development of the art until the masterpieces were reached of the later masters.

Another particularly effective was that in the lecture which treated of Napoleon, the Corsican, and his works of public character in the form of magnificent structures and arches, culminating with the reproduction of Napoleon's portrait, and fitting comment on the life and meaning of the great captain of men.
