SUPREME COURT OPINIONS RECEIVED.

Judge Lowell Sustained in the Cora McBean vs. Jane McBean et al Case.

A batch of opinions was received this morning by Lee Moorhouse, deputy clerk of the Oregon supreme court. Five cases have been decided at Salem, one only being an appeal from this county.

This one is that of Cora McBean, by J. Howard Howe, guardian and litigant, appellant, vs. Jane McBean et al, respondents, H. J. Bean and J. H. Lawry appearing for the appellants, and T. G. Bailey for the respondents. The opinion is by Chief Justice Wolverton, who affirms the judgment of the lower court.

The opinion is rather important to this county, and settles the question of the validity of the marriages among the Indians according to their native customs. The supreme court takes the ground that such marriages are valid, anywhere, but in this particular case deduces from the evidence that John McBean was never married to Jane McBean, grandmother of the plaintiff, and that therefore plaintiff cannot inherit the property of John McBean, who died intestate on the reservation here. Cora McBean had sued to obtain title to lands left by the intestate McBean, claiming them as an inheritance from him as her grandchild.

The opinion also reviews the evidence at length, and arrives at the first conclusion through the citation of authorities, that any marriage according to Indian customs is valid, and then, proceeding with the discussion of the case, concludes that John McBean was never married to Jane McBean in the manner common to the Indians.
