

WOMEN OF WOODCRAFT.

Tenth District Convention Meets in Pendieton to Elect Delegates to Salt Lake

Pendleton has as guests today delegates from Eastern Oregon counties and Klickitat county, Wash., comprising the tenth district of the Women of Woodcraft. They met in Odd Fellows' hall at ten o'clock. The convention has as object election of delegates to Salt Lake in August, to the grand session, and the adoption of resolutions regarding action of their representatives on the subjects now before the tives on the subjects now before the order, which are:

The payment of a per capita tax, nominal in amount, to the Woodmen Circle, the older order which is consected with Woodcraft, and from which at St. Louis several years ago western delegates bolted to form the Women of Woodcraft; also the recognition of the older body as the "parent order," of which the younger is to be regarded as an offshoot,

These issues have arisen since the right of the contract of affiliation last January, by the grand guardian of the Women of Woodcraft, Mrs. C. C. Van Orsdall, residing here, and Emma Manchester, supreme guardian of the Woodmen Circle, residing in Omaha. Subsequent to the draft and signing of the contract, the latter addressed a letter to Grand Guardian Van Orsdall, asking that the younger body recognize the older order as the parent body, and that, merely for technically legal considerations, the younger order pay annually a per capita to the older order, the amount to be only nominal, and the two to be regarded as affording the essential considerations necessary make a contract binding.

Mrs. VanOrsdall Opposed the Demands. Against the position, Mrs. Van Orsdall assumed a position of antagonism, and declared that only when or-dered so to do by the grand session, would she accede to the demands of the other order. She notified the various districts of the rasing of the issue and appealed to them to make known clearly their desires in the premises, y the adoption of unequivocal resoluions in their conventions.
