ENDORSED AFFILIATION CONTRACT.

Women of Woodcraft Earnestly Endorse Mrs. Van Orsdall's Administration.

The tenth district, Women of Woodcraft, in convention assembled, adopted resolutions here on Wednesday earnestly endorsing the administration of Grand Guardian Carrie C. Van Orsdall, and recommending that the contract of affiliation signed last January by Grand Guardian Van Orsdall and Supreme Guardian Manchester, stand without amendment.

These two points were the main ones before the convention. Delegates were elected during the afternoon, Mrs. A. B. Sherman, of Pendleton; Mrs. McCord, of Baker City; alternates, Mrs. Green, of Athena; Mrs. Maris, of Heppner. So far as the personal ambitions of the delegates were concerned, the election of delegates was quite an important matter. But the question as to the contract of affiliation was more important, and in the same measure the endorsement of the administration of Mrs. Van Orsdall, as grand guardian, and her relation to the order was to be determined by the manner in which the contract was treated by the convention.

There were fourteen conventions. On Wednesday, thirteen other district conventions were held by the Women of Woodcraft, in the Pacific coast states, there being fourteen districts. The districts and places of holding conventions are:

District No. 1, at Greeley, Colorado; No. 2, at Denver, Colorado; No. 3, at Viper, Colorado; No. 4, at Glenwood, Colorado; No. 5, at Durango, Colorado; No. 6, at Pocatello, Idaho; No. 7, at Gardfield, Wash.; No. 8, at Missoula, Mont.; No. 9, at Chehalis, Wash.; No. 10, at Pendleton, Or.; No. 11, at Roseburg, Or.; No. 12, at Salem, Or.; No. 13, at Sacramento, Calif.; No. 14, at Hanford, Calif.

Word has been received from the other districts, or enough of them to tell surely that was the trend of the resolutions adopted, and it is announced that the grand guardian's position was endorsed very generally and very heartily.

The resolutions adopted here were:

Resolved, That we heartily endorse the affiliation as it now stands, and also the general management of our gallant grand officer, and earnestly recommend her re-election.

Resolved, That section 139 be amended to read that one delegate be elected to every 500 beneficial members, in place of 250, as heretofore; and be it furthermore

Resolved, That the contract of affiliation be maintained as it now stands, and that it be not amended.

Reception in the Evening.

In the evening, at Hendricks' hall, the delegates were given a reception, by the members of Daphne Circle, and the occasion was a pleasant closing of the convention. Mrs. Van Orsdall gave an address of welcome to the delegates, and fittingly spoke of the work of the order. A short program was rendered, consisting of music and recitations, and cooling refreshments were served to the guests.

The delegates returned home today. The next convention will meet in La Grande.
