GENERAL NEWS.

The British losses in the South African war have been 40,000 men.
Congressman C. F. Cochran of St. Joseph was renominated without opposition by the democrats of the fourth district of Missouri.

A big drop in the price of structural steel was announced at Cleveland, Ohio, Wednesday. The price of beams and channel was cut \$7 a ton, of angle \$3 a ton and of bars \$10 a ton. There has also been a decline in the price of steel plates of \$4 a ton within the past four or five weeks. No big sales have yet been reported at the reduced price.

In the opinion of Senator Davis, of Minnesota, chairman of the senate committee on foreign affairs, the situation in China is even more grave than published dispatches would indicate and may develop into an international problem such as the powers have not had to deal with in many years.

Ex-Congressman J. W. Ware shot Rev. W. F. Hiner, pastor of the Methodist church, while the latter was making a pastoral call on Mrs. Ware at the residence of the former in Hopkinsville, Kentucky. Ware entered the parlor and fired at the minister without warning. Dr. Hiner threw him to the floor and disarmed him. Ware was arrested and released on \$1000 bonds.

In its current issue the Northwestern Miller says: Serious and irreparable damage has been done the wheat crop; just how serious is the question upon which interested men differ. The most conservative view, based on conditions as they are today, does not give hope of a crop exceeding 60 per cent of that raised in Minnesota and the Dakotas last year. The greatest damage has been done since June 1. North Dakota and northern Minnesota have been the heaviest sufferers. There are really few localities in the three states where an average crop is now in prospect. It is now said that North Dakota will raise little more than enough wheat for seed. Conditions are worse in Manitoba.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

Coking coal has been discovered near Prairie City, Grant county.

George H. Ench, aged 29 years, died at his parents' home at The Dalles, Wednesday, of heart troubles.

Mrs. Elizabeth M. Freeman, aged 64 years, died at her home in Forest Grove, Wednesday. She came to Oregon from Minnesota in 1885.

Warren Cozens, had his right leg broken between the knee and the thigh by falling from a cherry tree in Portland.

Nathaniel Holman died at the Good Samaritan hospital, Portland, from the effects of a surgical operation. He came to Oregon in 1847.

After July 1 the office of Indian agent at Warm Springs, Or., will be dispensed with, at which time Agent James L. Cowan will be dropped.

There are about 25 men employed in The Dalles scumming mill at present, and the number will be doubled when the mill is started running on full time.

M. W. Howard, of Alabama, who recently was showing in Oregon, may move his family to the state to reside permanently. He "fell in love" with Oregon.

Walter Macmillan, of Chicago, assistant general freight agent of the Michigan Central railroad, died at the Hotel Portland, Portland, of pneumonia on Wednesday.

Mrs. Skibbe, wife of Captain Max Skibbe, died at Astoria, Wednesday from the result of a stroke of paralysis. She was formerly a Miss Daltry. She leaves a husband and two children.

The Hiestand-Warner warehouses in the Inland Empire practically assure their sale as follows: Seven to the Pacific Coast Elevator company, four to the Puget Sound Elevator company, seven to Balfour, Guthrie & Co., and two to a Genesee man.

A railroad disaster was narrowly averted at Brownsville Tuesday. A farmer walking across the railroad bridge over the Callapooia river discovered that the beams on the upper side of the bridge had broken and let the bridge drop down about five inches, and it hung merely suspended in the air.

Robert Jackson, 18 years of age, brother of J. M. Jackson, of Riddle, Douglas county, accidentally killed himself Wednesday. He was hunting in company with Lloyd Mynatt. He shot a deer and started up the mountain where it lay. He evidently attempted to crawl under a log, when the gun was discharged, the ball entering his stomach.

The total number of prisoners confined in the Oregon state penitentiary is 295, all men except one. This is 130 less than the number of convicts in the early '90s, when the enrollment reached 425. There are 31 life-term prisoners, one of whom is a United States prisoner convicted of robbing the mails. The other 30 were convicted of murder.

MASSACRE AT TIEN TSIN

It is Reported That 1500 Foreigners
Have Been Murdered.

AMERICAN CONSULATE IS DESTROYED

President McKinley and Cabinet Discuss the
Situation; American Missionaries
Murdered at Tien Tsin.

London, June 22.—A special from Shanghai says: It is reported from Japanese source that 1500 foreigners have been massacred at Tien Tsin by the Chinese.

Fighting at Tien Tsin.

Che Foo, June 22.—It is officially reported that the bombardment of Tien Tsin with large guns continues incessantly. The foreign concessions are nearly all burned, and the American consulate is razed to the ground. The Russians are occupying the railroad station but are hard pressed. Reinforcements are urgently needed. Casualties to the foreign foe are heavy.

Washington Has No News

Washington, June 22.—The only news from China laid before the cabinet meeting here today was a telegram giving the movement of vessels in Chinese waters. The text of the message was not made public. That the president and the members of the cabinet regard the situation in China as extremely critical is shown by the fact that preliminary preparations are being made to send forward additional troops in case they are needed. It is said that it is not the purpose of the president to despatch these additional troops at once, except in the event that the situation becomes even more grave than at present.

Chinese Regulars Do It

Berlin, June 22.—According to a dispatch from Shanghai, Tien Tsin is being bombarded by Chinese regulars and not by the boxers as has been supposed.

Saved From the Boxers.

Sahngshai, June 22.—A despatch announces that all the members of the foreign community at Pei Tai Ho, including 33 Americans, have arrived at Che Foo on board the gunboat Nashville.

Apprehension Sharpened.

London, June 22.—Apprehensions as to the fate of Europeans cut off at Tien Tsin have been sharpened, but in spite of the statement that 1500 foreigners have been massacred, there is no reason to conclude that the foreign colony has been unable to protect itself.

No News in London.

London, June 22.—In the house of commons today the under secretary of state for foreign affairs said: The foreign office had no news from Pekin or from Vice Admiral Seymour.

News From Che Foo.

New York, June 22.—Rev. Dr. Leonard, secretary of the Methodist foreign missionary society, received the following cablegram today: "Che Foo, June 15.—Tien Tsin is being bombarded. Pekin is in a very serious state. Hopkins, Brown and King are saved." The three mentioned are missionaries. Dr. Leonard infers that the remaining 24 missionaries at Tien Tsin have been murdered. Among them are many women.

Troops to Hurry Forward.

Washington, June 22.—The administration is endeavoring to stimulate the dispatch of troops and naval reinforcements to China, to meet the emergency at Tien Tsin. It is understood that low water in the Pei Ho river is preventing naval vessels from going to the assistance of the force at Tien Tsin. In this case the only recourse is the use of troops and naval battalions to go on foot.

Logan to Sail With Troops.

Washington, June 22.—It is supposed the transport Logan will be ready to start from Manila on the 24th inst. with the ninth infantry for Taku. It is understood the movement of the regiment to Manila from Tarlac, Conception and other stations was delayed by the severe storms which have prevailed in the Philippines.

The Monocacy Fired Upon.

London, June 22.—The United States gunboat Monocacy was two miles up the Pei Ho river when the international fleet began the bombardment of the Taku forts. According to the Shanghai correspondent of the Daily Express she was shot through the bows. The correspondent says the Chinese citizens on both banks of the river attacked her, but unsuccessfully.

Scantiness of authentic news with reference to the situation continues. Admiral Kempff's dispatch to the United States navy department announcing that Tien Tsin is being bombarded, was prominently used by the London papers and commented upon as indicating a change for the worse.

The British admiralty does not believe the report of the death of Admiral Seymour, commander of the international relief column, and semi-official assurances are given that there seems to be not the slightest evidence to back up such a report. It is pointed out that Admiral Seymour had sufficient supplies to enable him to get to Pekin or get back.

CUP FOR THE FIREMEN.

Silver Trophy to Be Won in the Championship Race.
Firemen and others have visited the drug stores of Brock & McDonalds to see the handsome silver cup which has been put up by the city council as a trophy to be won by the firemen in the Fourth of July local tournament. It is commonly remarked that the cup is one of the finest seen in Pendleton.

It has been offered for the championship race, and for it the companies will compete on the afternoon of the Fourth. There will also be cash prizes, and for all of them the firemen are training every day.

John Halley, chairman of the committee on day parade, is enlisting the attention of the business men, and will have a parade worthy seeing by the multitude. He is now arranging the characters to appear on the liberty car, and many of the merchants will have floats of more or less elaborate design.

MOVEMENTS OF ROOSEVELT.

He Called on Senator Platt and Wired President McKinley.

New York, June 22.—Governor Roosevelt left the city for Oyster Bay this afternoon. This morning he called on Senator Platt. There was nothing more than an exchange of courtesies between the senator and the vice-presidential nominee.

McKinley to Roosevelt.

Washington, June 22.—President McKinley wired the following congratulatory telegram to Governor Roosevelt: "Your unanimous nomination is a high and deserved honor. I extend my heartiest congratulations."

It is probable the notification committee will call upon the president at Canton, O., July 12.

Message to McKinley.

Washington, June 22.—The following is the text of Roosevelt's message to McKinley: "I appreciate deeply your congratulations, and am proud to be associated with you on the ticket, Theodore Roosevelt."

Meeting of National Committee.

Philadelphia, Pa., June 22.—Mark Hanna, chairman of the national committee, today held a conference with J. H. Manley, of Maine, (general governor, of Ohio, and other members of the executive committee. The meeting was said to be a general settling up of accounts and other matters before the committee finally adjourned.

Annual Meeting W. C. T. U.

Edinburg, June 22.—The world's Woman's Christian Temperance Union opened its annual meeting in this city this morning, under the presidency of Mrs. Stephens, of Maine.

Saloon Man Drowned.

Portland, June 22.—Reinhard Brook, a well known saloonkeeper in Portland, fell from the deck of the steamer Bailey Gatzert into the Columbia river this morning and was drowned.

WIND STORM IN INDIANA.

Four Cloudbursts Did Much Damage to Property.

Penn, Ind., June 22.—A terrific windstorm, with four distinct cloudbursts, did much damage throughout this section last night. A rainfall of four and a half inches followed it.

The Strike in St. Louis.

St. Louis, June 22.—Cars are being run on all the divisions of the Transit company's system in the day time. Aside from a light traffic, the only thing that would indicate a strike in the presence of armed men around the power houses and car sheds.

Hull Renominated.

Des Moines, Iowa, June 22.—Congressman Hull was renominated today by the republicans of the seventh district of Iowa.

HANNA ASKS A PARDON.

Petition Filed With the Governor. Didn't Know the Horses Were Stolen.

According to the Salem correspondent of the Portland Oregonian, a petition has been filed with Governor Willam Hanna, sent from this county to the state penitentiary. In January, 1899, under sentence for three years, he was convicted of receiving stolen horses, the case being fresh in the minds of the people here.

Mr. Hanna was purchasing agent of the Linton cannery, and bought horses which had been stolen by Zibe Morse and Jack Ogg. The petition states that Hanna did not know at the time he received them that the horses were stolen, and that he afterward tried to conceal the crime through a feeling of friendship for Morse and Ogg. The petition is signed by nine trial jurors. The other three were absent from the county.

A BIG FIRE IN PITTSBURG

Loss is Estimated at Several Hundred
Thousand Dollars.

FIFTY STUDENTS NARROWLY ESCAPE

Reported That a Number of Persons Lost
Their Lives in the Fire; Many Occu-
pants of Buildings Missing.

Pittsburg, June 22.—A fire in the heart of the business district of this city this afternoon caused an estimated loss of several hundred thousand dollars and for a time threatened to wipe out the entire square of buildings, bounded by Fifth Avenue, Diamond, Wood and Market streets. When the fire broke out fifty students of India's college were on the fifth floor of the Echbaum building and the flames spread so rapidly that they barely escaped with their lives. Great excitement was created by the report that a number of lives were lost, but this is thought to be untrue, although quite a number of occupants of the buildings burned are not yet accounted for.

Liberal Contributions.

Philadelphia, Pa., June 22.—Governor Wells, Thos. Kearns and Charles Lewis, three of the six delegates from Utah, today announced that they have each forwarded checks for \$50,000 to chairman Hanna as contributions to the republican campaign fund. Four years ago these three delegates were leaders in the Bryan cause in Utah. They are wealthy mining men.

Roundhouse Burned.

Bakersfield, Cal., June 22.—The Southern Pacific roundhouse at Kern City was burned this afternoon and the remains of Patrick K. Quinn and Byrd Gilmore, employees, were found in the debris. They were killed by the explosion of an oil tank which also started the fire. The loss to the railroad company will amount to \$400,000. Twelve engines were destroyed.

Lightning Struck a Church.

Richmond, Conn., June 22.—During a severe storm at Gillingham lightning struck a church during services. Louis Peckham was instantly killed. The entire congregation was badly shocked and the building was wrecked.

THOUGHT HE WAS JOSHING.

Tassey Stewart Told of Combines Cutting
75 Acres a Day.

Tassey Stewart, of Helix, came home from the Willamette valley today. He has been there for two weeks, after a visit to the Sound. He went in quest of a new location, and returned satisfied to remain here for the rest of his days. Mr. Stewart says they are rather slow down in that region.

"Why, I told them about our combined harvesters cutting seventy five acres a day, and they looked incredulous, and then acted as though they thought I was lying. I couldn't make those people believe that a combine harvester could cut and sack that much grain in a day, and yet everyone here knows that I was not exaggerating."

"And was everywhere. I had thought to find a new home to get away from the dust. But I now think the dust is no worse than the mud, and I guess I will remain in this county. The farmers down there seem to be in debt as much as ever they were, and to be getting in a little deeper all the time. I am not inclined to go there to live. Umatilla county is good enough for me."

"Crops there are poor this year, with lots of weeds and rust, and not a good outlook generally. We are better off here, by far, than they are in the Willamette valley."
