NORMAL COMMENCEMENT EXERCISES.

BACCALAUREATE SERMON WAS DELIVERED BY REV. AUSTIN RICE.

An Operetta, "The Sleeping Queen," Was Produced—An Address by Professor Strong.

Weston, Or., June 20.—Weston has many times been referred to as the "Boston of Eastern Oregon." It is certainly a cultured community, the credit of which is largely due to the location here of the Eastern Oregon State Normal school, the commencement exercises of which are being held this week. First on the week's program was the baccalaureate sermon delivered in the opera house at 11 o'clock a. m. on Sunday June 17, by the Rev. Austin Rice, pastor of the First Congregational church of Walla Walla. The auditorium and gallery were filled almost to suffocation and the address was of such a nature as to call for enunciations from all who had the pleasure of listening to it, and one which would bear fruit in the future.

Monday evening in the opera house the dainty operetta of "The Sleeping Queen" was produced with charming effect. A critical audience was present, which departed in a delightful state of mind. Both the singing and acting were of a high standard of excellence. The operetta was produced under the direction of Miss Maude Harkleroad, instructor in vocal music at the normal school. The principal characters were: "Philippe," J. Agular, Dr. J. A. Best; "Regent," Mr. Clark Wood; "Donna Agnes," Miss Lois Peables; "Queen," Miss Maude Harkleroad; Miss Clara Richmond was the faithful accompanist.

Tuesday evening the students held their annual social in the opera house. This was a function which was largely attended, thoroughly informal and very enjoyable. The students and their many friends passed several hours in social amusements, conversation, etc., the affair being of such a character as to more definitely cement the friendship which has bound them during their school life.

Wednesday evening was set apart for the undergraduate exercises, which were held in the McGraw opera house, and, like all other meetings and entertainments in which the normal school people are interested, was largely attended. The stage was prettily set and the program was carried out with a faithfulness that pleased, the opening and closing numbers being by the normal school orchestra. The rest of the program was as follows: "Address of Spartacus to the Gladiators," John A. Read; vocal solo, "A Little Boy for Sale," Ella A. Ranges; middle year class prophecy, Caroline E. Wasson; "Star of Descending Night," choral; recitation, "A Roman Legend," Bertha E. Long; solo, "The Arrow and the Song," Joseph N. Scott; oration, "The Triumph of Genius," Elmer D. Bryson; the witches' brew, drill, by 10 young ladies; solo, "The Voice of the Woods," Lois L. Peables; on recall, she sang "Answered," "The Battle of Lookout Mountain," Ida Ione Marsh; "Don't You Cry Ma Honey," chorus; selection from James Whitcomb Riley, Prof. H. W. Donald. The professor sang a really beautiful Hoosier poem and has the Indiana crowd down close to perfection. As the audience insisted upon it so strenuously, he came back and responded with a short poem from the same author.

Prof. F. Strong, president of the state university of Eugene, arrived this morning and will deliver the address to the graduating classes of 13 at the opera house this evening.

Considerable interest is being given to the subject of the election of the president of the normal faculty, which will be decided by the board of regents at a meeting to be held in Pendleton next Friday.

Elmer and Frank Graham, lads of 12 and 15 years, met with an accident Wednesday evening. They were riding a tandem bicycle, coming gently down the hill, and when in front of the Marshall House the wheel collapsed on the front part dropping to the ground. HURRY THE CENSUS WORK. Pendleton May Not Be Fully Enumerated Unless Vigorous Canvassing is Done.

So far, the taking of the census in Pendleton has not enlisted the attention of anyone but a few who, with the object in view of assisting the enumerators, have taken upon themselves to stir up the question. No concerted action has been taken here, and it now looks like Pendleton would be returned to the census bureau without a just showing as to population. It is an important matter. For ten years, Pendleton will be known as the population of the figures which are to be returned by the two enumerators. Nothing can change the record, when once

it has been made up, and therefore effort should be made right now to see that it is recorded correctly. Inquiry made by the East Oregonian in various parts of the first and third wards, comprising the district of Peter West, discover that large portions of the city have not been visited. It is possible to find people everywhere, on Main street, Webb street, and, in fact, in many places, who have not been visited, and who, unless some sharp, quick work be done in the short time remaining, will be left off the census rolls, and Pendleton be short of its real number of inhabitants.

It has been thought by many that the Commercial Association might take up the matter, and ascertain if anything could be done to insure a correct enumeration. Certainly, something should be done, and that something at once. There is no time to lose. In the second and fourth wards, it is believed the enumeration has been quite thorough. Some have been missed, inevitably, but not so many as now remain unenumerated in the other district.

Harold H. Horton, who has completed his work, had the second and fourth wards. It is desirable that names of any persons missed in these wards be found, and ascertained if they be left with this office. C. E. Bowles called Thursday evening, and stated that he and his three children had not been enumerated. They reside in the completed district. There may be others. If so, let the names be brought to the East Oregonian office. Others have called today.

Peter West has the first and third wards. It is there the complaints are made that large areas have not yet been visited. Let people there also bring names of all who have been missed, that it may be ascertained how many yet are to be taken. It is urged that no time be lost in bringing in the names. The census must be ended by July 1. Therefore, only nine days remain.

WILL SHANIKO BE A TERMINUS?

People Speculate as to Whether Columbia Southern Will Be Extended. Fred W. Waite, the representative of Baker, Hamilton & Company, San Francisco wholesale hardware dealers, is at his home in Pendleton again. He has been at Shaniko, the present terminus of the Columbia Southern road. Mr. Waite stated that there are now in Shaniko about 150 people, and a number of business houses. No one appears to know who will tell whether Shaniko will be the permanent terminus of the road, and therefore many hesitate to make permanent business locations.

Large quantities of wool and numbers of sheep have been shipped from that point. Shaniko drains a large area of producing country, and if permanently the terminus of the road, would have an immense traffic each year. The townspeople appear to be anxious to sell off the lots of the town, reserving none. This taken as a criterion to judge that the town will not be the permanent terminus of the road. But, it is all conjecture, of course, as no one who knows will say one way or the other.

WOOL SHIPPED TO PENDLETON. Sent From Heppner to Be Scoured— Curtis Sells His Clip.

The C. C. Curtis clip of wool, at Heppner, has been sold for nine cents a pound. It will be shipped to Pendleton to be scoured here. It is stated at the Pendleton scouring mills here, by the manager, T. E. Fell, that all of the wool purchased at Heppner has been sent to Pendleton for scouring, excepting those wools which were contracted last winter. Thus, many of the clips hauled from the territory naturally tributary to Pendleton will be brought here, the extra expense incurred being that added cost of hauling farther than was necessary, and the freight paid from Heppner to Pendleton on the railroad.

Boeing is constant, but in small amounts and with no apparent anxiety on the buyers' part to obtain wool. The market is rather quiet just now.
