Weston, Or., June 22.—Commencement exercises of the Eastern Oregon State normal school are joyfully and anxiously looked forward to for months by the graduating class and their relatives and friends, the faculty of course included. Commencement exercises proper were held in the opera house on Thursday evening, June 21. The stage had been elaborately and tastefully set, the class colors, pink and cream, being conspicuous, together with a wealth of potted plants and cut flowers. Across the rear of the stage in large letters the class motto was conspicuous, "Thus ends our first lesson." A splendid audience was present, and evidence of the high place which the institution holds in the hearts of the residents of this charming village and surrounding country, and in addition, many were present from abroad. Of this latter class many were alumni who have made it a rule annually at the commencement season to hasten back to their alma mater to renew the pleasant acquaintanceships of former years and to assist the new graduating class to successfully launch its bark. The graduates were seated in a semicircle at the back of the stage.

The exercises were commenced with an invocation by Dr. Gilman Parker, of Portland, followed by a piano solo by Mr. S. H. Lovewell, of the Whitman college conservatory of music, of Walla Walla, Wash.

Graduates appear before the audience. The salutatory, "Reminiscences," was by Miss Lenna L. Reid. Miss Callie B. Shelton delivered an oration, "The Earth Aspires Her Queen." Miss Fannie J. Scott had "We Have Crossed the Ocean Line Before Us," as the subject of her oration. Mr. John R. English delivered the valedictory. Owing to the size of the class it was impossible to give all a place upon the program. Those who were chosen to represent their class performed in a very worthy manner, pleasing to their friends.

Miss Harkleroad, teacher of vocal music, sang a solo in a pleasing manner. Mr. Lovewell again favored the audience with a piano solo.

Dr. Frank Strong, president of the State University at Ephraim, delivered a brief, delightful address to the graduates. He pointed out the tendencies of the age in educational and other matters, and was both humorous and earnest. He paid a solid tribute to women and placed the profession of teaching high in comparison with other professions. His remarks had the true ring and were greatly enjoyed.

President D. V. S. Reid conferred the diplomas and with them gave some advice and warning. He told the graduates how they had been taught and admonished them to keep up their schooling at the normal, and now, as they were about to go forth into the world, many of them to teach, that he wished to give them the final admonition to be true to themselves and their calling and to stand firm for truth and a higher plane of morality; that when fighting for the right they might, when least expected, be left standing by themselves, deserted by their quondam friends of whom they had a right to expect hearty support. President Reid then formally declared the above mentioned 13 graduates of the Eastern Oregon State Normal school.

A large number of the junior and middle year pupils, led by Miss Harkleroad, gave a chorus song which was enjoyable. Thereupon the graduates upon the stage held a reception, nearly all of the audience grasping the hands in friendship, extending congratulations upon their completing the normal course, and wishing them true success in their future lives. "Thus ends our first lesson."
