## GENERAL NEWS.

Carter Harrison, mayor of Chicago, refuses to be a candidate for governor of Illinois on the democratic ticket.

A letter has been received by the Chattanooga News from Commissioner of Pension Evans, in which he denies the story published several days ago to the effect that he would resign as pension commissioner and run for congress.

In the case of Brigham H. Roberts, at Salt Lake City, found guilty of unlawful cohabitation, the judgment of the court was that he pay a fine in the sum of \$100, or in lieu thereof that he be imprisoned in the county jail for a period of 150 days.

Senator Hanna states for publication that his attention had been called to a story to the effect that three mine owners in Utah who supported Bryan in 1896 had each contributed \$30,000 to the McKinley campaign fund. "I want to say," said Senator Hanna, "that there is absolutely no foundation to this story. It is pure fabrication."

Now that the election is over in Cuba the people of the island are beginning to ask what they have gained by it and what is going to happen next. The business men of the island, also the agriculturists, are asking and begging General Wood for some specific declaration as to what America intends to do next.

Albert Roberts and Oscar Jeans have been rival suitors of Miss Jennie Russell, at Redford, Ind. While Roberts and Miss Russell were out driving they met Jeans, and a pistol duel ensued between them. Miss Russell leaped from the buggy and rushed between them, but they continued shooting and she was fatally wounded.

Charles McFord, a maniac at Cedar Rapids, Iowa, killed James Fitzsimmons, seriously and possibly fatally injured Mrs. James Fitzsimmons, slightly injured Miss Kate Fitzsimmons, and then ended his own life. He was 27 years old and two years ago was discharged from an asylum for the insane.

## PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

Mrs. Mary Moran, wife of Patrick Moran, of the O. R. & N. Co., died in Portland Friday, aged 47 years.

J. C. McAllister, while fooling with a revolver at North Yakima, shot himself in the leg. The wound is serious.

The Oregon Sugar Company, at La Grande, proposes to build a railroad from La Grande to the Cove, Union county.

Baker City is advertising for bids on material and the construction of a gravity water system. The contract will be let July 2.

James Riley, aged 52 years, died at Sumpter a few days ago from a complication of diseases. He went to Sumpter from Genesee, Idaho.

L. V. Mack fell from the porch of his home at Canby on his head and died from his injuries. His age was forty years. He leaves a wife, father and sister.

Joseph Shambaugh, an early pioneer of the Grande Ronde, died Saturday at his residence near Ladd Canyon. He was 70 years of age and one of the best known citizens of the valley.

The largest load of wool ever hauled from Wallawa county was unloaded in Elgin last week, and tipped the scales at 9061 pounds. The wool was brought in with six horses and two wagons.

The gold receipts of the Seattle government assay office up to Thursday were \$1,163,103.80, about one-half of which has come in since June 1. The greater part of the wealth is from the Klondike.

Henry Brand, a Southern Pacific brakeman, fell the track at Grant's Pass, while getting on a furniture car, under the wheels of the train, and lost an arm and leg. He died from the injuries.

Mrs. James Agee died at her home in Sodalville Friday, after an illness of over a year. Her home was formerly in Yamhill county, but the family moved to Sodalville about two years ago on account of Mrs. Agee's health.

General Wilson, chief of engineers has sent orders to Captain W. W. Harts to make an examination at the dam of the Columbia river, preparatory to the making of plans and estimates for the construction of a canal and locks to overcome the obstructions to navigation between The Dalles and Celilo.

## RELIEF FORCE AT TIEN TSIN

Second Relief Force From Pekin Surrounded  
By Chinese Ten Miles From Tien Tsin.

## VICEROYS ASKS TROOPS BE KEPT BACK

United States Government Declines to Grant the Request; Commander of the Yorktown Threatens to Begin Hostilities.  
The British Cruiser Terrible Arrives at Taku.

Washington, June 26.—The navy department has received the following dispatch from Admiral Kienpff: "Taku.—The relief force reached Tien Tsin on the 23rd inst. Their loss is very small. The Pekin relief force, which left for Tien Tsin on June 10, is reported ten miles from Tien Tsin and surrounded by Chinese. A force left Tien Tsin on the 24th inst. to render assistance to them."

## Declined the Request.

Washington, June 26.—Six viceroys of China, through the Chinese minister here, today rejected their efforts to have the foreign troops kept out of China until Li Hung Chang reaches Pekin. The request was a formal document signed by the six viceroys, including Li Hung Chang. The answer of the United States government was the same as to the informal request of Minister Wu yesterday, which amounted to a declination.

## Brooklyn Sails for Taku.

The navy department announces that the Cruiser Brooklyn, with Admiral Kienpff on board, will take 300 marines to the relief of Taku. The Cruiser Princeton has been ordered to Shanghai. The president has assigned Gen. Adna R. Chaffee to command the military forces operating in China. General Chaffee will sail from San Francisco the first of July, with the sixth cavalry. General MacArthur was directed to send Captain Russell, and a signal corps with a detachment, to Chefoo.

## From Chefoo.

Chefoo, June 26.—Foreigners everywhere are urging the concentration of an army of 100,000 men for an advance on Pekin. Many persons here think that the foreign ministers and Admiral Seymour are held as hostages for good terms of settlement.

Russia's conduct at Taku inflamed the natives. Russians are reported as shooting the Chinese indiscriminately and of looting the towns.

Masses of the Chinese people are becoming excited at the reports of their countrymen's successes against the powers. The boxers are drilling in the streets of New Chwang.

The arrival of the British cruiser Terrible, and two Japanese cruisers, at Chefoo today relieved the strained situation.

Two Chinese forts here are equipped with Krupp guns, commanding the foreign city. Commander Tausig, of the Yorktown requested the commander of the forts to discontinue the maneuvers with cannon and notified him that if the Chinese troops sent to the city ostensibly to suppress the "boxers" were not withdrawn the Americans would land and hostilities would begin.

## BETTER METHODS EMPLOYED.

Miners Mine in the Klondike Not as They Did at First.

W. F. Matlock says, in talking of the Klondike, that now miners use many devices and follow methods which at the beginning of the excitement there were not thought of. Now, steam thawing appliances are used, and ground at first thought to be good only for winter diggings, is worked as summer diggings with greater profit.

Louis J. Cook, formerly of the Hotel Pendleton, has done well in Dawson City, and will come out this fall with a good sized cleanup and a competency. Phil McBrien is working in Dawson, running a pack train. Owen McElhool he did not see there. William Beaulieu was with Mr. Matlock, and came out as far as Skaguay, going from there to the Altin mines, to look after some claims in which they are interested. Joe Matlock, a brother of W. F., has gone to Cape Nome country.

## France Will Borrow.

Paris, June 26.—The government will ask the chamber for a credit of 3,500,000 francs to cover the expenses of troops in China.

## Arkansas Democrats.

Little Rock, Ark., June 26.—The democratic state convention met today. Judge K. H. Evans was elected permanent chairman, after which a recess was taken.

## Illinois Prohibitionists.

Chicago, June 26.—The prohibition state convention today nominated a state ticket, besides selected delegates at large to the national convention and naming candidates for congress and legislature.

## Russian-American Force Worsted.

London, June 26.—Shanghai reports are to the effect that the American-Russian relief force was obliged to abandon several field guns and much ammunition. About 18 Russians and eleven Americans were killed or wounded. The German gunboat Tili and the Russian torpedo boat destroyer are patrolling the Pei Ho river and raking the native villages. A telegram from governor of Liao Chow, dated the 25th announces, that according to reports from Chinese sources, Admiral Seymour's force has reached Pekin.

## The Ninth Infantry Sails.

Washington, June 26.—The war department has received the following dispatch: "Manila.—The ninth infantry sails on the 27th, thoroughly equipped and well supplied with everything. (Signed.) MacArthur."

## Russians to Act Independently.

Chefoo, June 26.—The officers of the British cruiser Terrible assert that discord exists between the Russians and Anglo-Americans and say they believe that the Russians are planning to break the concert and take possession of Pekin independently.

## England is Willing.

London, June 26.—Replying to a question in the house of commons as to whether the British government will arrange with Japan to send an adequate land force to China, A. D. Balfour, the government leader, said it was undesirable to outline the nature of the negotiations, but added, that her majesty's government will welcome a dispatch of troops, by any power, which owing to the proximity of its troops, may be able to act at once for the suppression of the disturbances in China.

## News From Relief Force.

Washington, June 26.—Official information came today concerning the forces operating at Tien Tsin. Admiral Kienpff's dispatch confirmed the reports that the combined forces entered Tien Tsin on the 23rd. This is the relief column, including Major Waller and 130 United States marines, which suffered repulse on the first movement, beyond a brief statement of four killed and seven wounded, nothing has come as to the casualties of the first attack, but the result of the second movement is now cleared up by the admiral's report, that the force has fought through with small loss. It remains yet to be reported how the relief column fared at Tien Tsin where, according to unofficial reports of last week, anarchy prevailed and foreign quarters were destroyed.

## DISASTER TO ALASKAN BOATS.

Claim Jumping is All the Fashion in Nome.

Seattle, June 26.—Captain Jhonk, of the steamer Cleveland, which arrived from Nome last night, reports that the bark Alaska is a total wreck, having broken squarely in two. The crew got off in safety. The bark Catherine suddenly, which the cutter Corwin had as tow, was disabled and probably was badly crushed.

Claim jumping is still in vogue at Nome. As a result, there were scores of personal encounters almost daily, but nothing serious has occurred. The little sloop Gipsy has been wrecked and two of her crew were drowned.

Cloudburst in Alabama.  
Mobile, Ala., June 26.—A cloudburst occurred today, followed by a tremendous downpour of rain. Every street in this city was submerged and business was practically suspended. The rain fell was from 5 a. m. to noon, and measured 12.7 inches. A large amount of damage was done.

Illinois Democrats.  
Springfield, Ill., June 26.—The democratic state convention met today. After receiving the reports of the various committees of congressional delegations the convention took a recess.

## ANOTHER DEMAND ON TURKEY.

United States Government is Pressing for a Settlement.

Washington, June 26.—As to a report from Constantinople that United States Minister Griscom has presented another demand for a settlement of claims, it can be stated that the government is steadily pressing for a final settlement. It has been definitely determined what course will be adopted, if temporizing on the part of Turkish diplomats is carried to a point of practical failure to meet the American demands.

## Palmer Not Guilty.

Union, Or., June 26.—The jury in the case of the state of Oregon vs. James L. Palmer, charged with murder, brought in a verdict of not guilty. The prisoner was immediately discharged and left for Walla Walla where he will visit relatives before returning to his home in the east.

## Walla Walla's Census.

Walla Walla, June 26.—Today is the last day the census enumerator has in which to finish his labors of telling Uncle Sam the number of people he has. Walla Walla has done her best to reach the 10,000 mark so that she may be enrolled as a city of the second class and it is earnestly hoped that those figures will be exceeded.

## The Case of Captain Carter.

Leavenworth, Kan., June 26.—Another effort will be made to obtain a rehearing of the famous Capt. Carter case. The plan is to try to bring Carter before a civil court on a writ of habeas corpus, and have the writ tried on its merits.

## Lower Railroad Rates.

Portland, June 26.—The Oregon Railroad & Navigation company announces that beginning July 1 its passenger rate in Oregon and Washington will be 3 cents a mile.

## Thousands Die of Cholera.

London, June 26.—The governor of Bombay wires that there were 10,377 deaths from cholera out of 15,479 cases during the week ending June 16.

## WHY NOT BE AN ICE MAN?

Belief That an Ice Factory Would Do Well in Pendleton.

"I believe that an ice factory would do well here," said a prominent business man to the East Oregonian. "I learned today that artificially made ice is being shipped to Pendleton all the way from Tacoma, and that other towns near here are buying ice from the Tacoma plant. There is no reason why Pendleton and neighboring places should buy their ice from the Sound. It could as well as not be manufactured right here, and thus give this place an additional industry. I understand that there has been some talk of setting in an ice factory, and I would like to see it done."

"The manufacture of artificial ice has become general all over the United States, many towns being thus supplied that formerly procured their ice from the rivers and lakes. According to the methods now employed by the ice factories, ice made in that manner is free from all impurities, and is therefore more healthful than that taken from the rivers and lakes. Pendleton would afford a large home market for the product, and with the sales that could be made in nearby places, there should be a good business for the man who would install and operate an ice plant."

## JOSEPH MUST BE MORE MODEST.

Settlers in Wallawa County Not to Be Disturbed for the Old Chief.

It appears to be likely that Chief Joseph will be allowed to locate in the Wallawa country, according to his often expressed desire. A dispatch from Lewiston in the Spokesman-Review says:

"Chief Joseph, accompanied by Inspector McLaughlin and Ed. Reboin, a local interpreter, arrived here this afternoon on their return from the Wallawa valley, Oregon. This trip was made for the purpose of seeing if the long cherished wish of Joseph and his people could be granted by the government at Washington without interfering with the rights of the white settlers of this valley. It was learned from a member of the party that Joseph demanded the entire Wallawa valley, including the lake and river, a country some 25 miles long and 10 miles broad. He said the government could reserve the townsite in the valley."

Inspector McLaughlin gave out the impression that Joseph and his people would be granted homes in this valley, but his demands would have to be more modest, as no whites would be disturbed in the valley. They went and returned by the way of Grande Ronde and Paradise valley."
