NEWS OF ATHENA.

Milt Swaggart Drugged Over the Drab-

hoose by a Runaway Team.

Athena, June 25.—Mr. and Mrs. Charles Ferguson removed today to Cayuse station where the former will be agent during the wheat season for the Pacific Coast Elevator company.

Dan May spent Sunday in Athena discussing the brick situation. Nick Springer, who is managing the brickyard for him and is now burning the second kiln of brick of the season.

Jacob Lamb, of Pendleton, was a visitor to Weston and Athena today.

S. B. Elder, who resides in Despain Gulch, 19 miles northwest of Pendleton, was in Athena today accompanied by J. D. Brown of Pendleton.

Mr. Elder purchased a separator in Athena, which he will take out to his farm next Monday or Tuesday and immediately thereafter commence threshing.

He commenced heading on Wednesday of last week. Mr. Elder and his two boys, E. O. and W. L., have 600 acres of fall wheat, which promises to yield 20 bushels to the acre on an average.

The separator purchased is a 28-60 and it takes 14 horses to furnish the power. J. D. Brown will operate for Mr. Elder this season.

A runaway on Third street attracted considerable attention Monday evening. Milt Swaggart and Dell Stanton were driving toward the home of the first mentioned, when near the Methodist church the solo slipped from the neckyoke and fell to the ground.

They made a pretty run, but strange to say they did not break the harness and were themselves uninjured. Mr. Swaggart received a gash above the right eye, which was the principal damage.

SOME WHEAT WAS KNOCKED DOWN.

But the Percentage of Damage to the Whole Crop is Comparatively Small.

Extensive inquiry among the farmers has been made, with the result that it is learned that the rain storms did some damage to the standing wheat.

In many places, areas of wheat were knocked down, and cannot be cut excepting by running machines on one side of the field, and in some instances only a part of the grain can be thus secured.

But, so fine a crop and so large an acreage awaits the harvesters that any loss from the storms will not be relatively extensive. No one farmer loses very much, and on the whole the result is scarcely worthy attention.
