BRINGHAM PERFORMED HIS PROMISES.

Susanville Bridge Question Brought Up. Compliments Exchanged.

The Susanville road and bridge question has much the same characteristics as had the one which refused persistently to down, but bubbled up again or otherwise whenever there was an opportunity to do so.

S. M. BRINGHAM WRITES.

"Dale, Oregon, June 18.—To the Editor.—I notice in your valuable paper an article copied from the Ukiah Sentinel, a communication from Sam Reynolds, in reference to the Susanville bridge and road. In fairness to all parties, I ask the publication of the reply following.

"The bridge was built on the location selected by J. B. McDill, as I had no right to change it, and it is built according to his plan. In justice to Mr. McDill, I ask that the good people of Pendleton send Mr. McDill to inspect it, and if he finds that I have failed to do my duty, I am ready to make everything good. I framed, raised and completed the bridge without charge, never received one dollar for anything that I did, excepting having the timber. The road was paid for, teaming, labor and material. Pendleton never agreed to build the road, but the citizens here were to do that.

"If everyone of them would do as much as I did, it would have been completed before this time. I worked eight days on the road, and if Sam Reynolds would put in as much time on the road as I have done in giving him music as to what others have not done, the road would be in better condition for travel.

"I should not notice what he says, if everybody knew him as his neighbors do, for he is not worth much notice. Here follow some radical remarks regarding the opinion of Mr. Bringham on the subject of the letter.

"Now, I ask you again, to have Mr. McDill sent out to inspect the bridge, so as to shut Sam's babble.

Mr. McDill Makes a Statement.

The letter was shown to J. B. McDill, superintendent of roads for the county. Commenting upon the matter at issue, Mr. McDill said:

"Mr. Bringham has stated the facts in the case, as I understand them. Pendleton never promised to make a road out there, but, at the request of the citizens of Susanville and surrounding country, agreed to build the bridge, the citizens promising to build the road themselves at no expense to the business men of Pendleton. I went to the place, at the instance of the Commercial Association of Pendleton, and inspected the ground, selecting, according to my instructions, the cheapest and best location for the bridge.

"Mr. Reynolds himself stated after the bridge had been built that it was well built and where it could be constructed the cheapest. It certainly costs with the citizens of that section of county to make the road, according to the original agreement. This view is vouched for by the business men who were attending to the details of the arrangement at the time the bridge and road matter came up.
