ARE FIGHTING FOR THEIR VERY LIVES.

Communication With Seymour Has Been Opened.

SEYMOUR'S FORCES MUCH HARRASSED

Legations Probably Reach a Place of Safety; All Foreigners at Peking Are Reported as Safe.

SITUATION IS SERIOUS AT NEW CHWANG

The People in Southern Provincial Counties are Just Beginning to Get Excited and There are Symptoms of a General Uprising.

Nearly all the bees in Salt Lake City have been destroyed by smoke from the smelters in that region.

New York City, June 27.—Bonds sold Monday for \$110.54 in New York. An issue of \$3,135,000 was sold at this figure.

One hundred thousand tons of California wheat have been recently shipped from San Francisco to Callao and Peru.

Of 1,800,000 acres of wheat, 1,000,000 acres will never be cut in Manitoba. More optimistic hope for seed and feed, but this is doubtful. Sunday was the hottest day of the year in that section.

Martin J. Russell, one of the proprietors and editors of the Chicago Chronicle and for many years identified with the management of Chicago newspaper, died Sunday night at Mackinac Island from a complication of diseases.

Governor Theodore Roosevelt will leave New York City next Friday for Chicago, arriving there Saturday and leaving the same evening for Oklahoma City, where he will attend the reunion of his old regiment, the Rough Riders.

In the house of commons at Ottawa, Canada a bill was reported raising the poll tax on the Chinese from \$50 to \$100 and also providing that foreign countries would not send to Canada more immigrants than the regulations of these countries provided.

It is officially announced that Archduke Francis Ferdinand, the Austrian heir apparent, will formally renounce the right of succession of the imperial throne this week and he will wed the Countess Sophie Chotek, his morganatic marriage being the reason for which he will withdraw from the succession.

The troubles in China are beginning to affect the remote districts of the Kentucky mountains in the ginseng trade, by which hundreds of people make a living. Ever since the Boxers began their outrages the price of ginseng has been dropping. A month ago it was quoted at \$3.75; now it is down to \$2.35, the lowest in four years.

The Boer envoys, who have been in this country for the past two months, on Monday in New York issued an address to the people of the United States. After expressing regret at their inability to accept many of the invitations extended to them, they expressed their thanks to the American public for the deep sympathy they have shown for the cause of the two struggling republics.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

Marshallfield, Cow county, will put in its own electric light plant at a cost of \$10,000.

Samuel K. Stanley, for 28 years a resident of Seaside, Clatsop county, died in a Portland hospital Monday, aged 57 years.

The annual session of the State Medical society commenced in Portland on Tuesday. This is the 27th gathering of the society.

Earl Mendell, aged 21 years, was struck on the head with a ball but while playing ball at Salem and may die from compression of the brain.

Mrs. Mary Robertson, an Oregon pioneer of 1847, died in Salem Sunday night at the age of 78 years. She left one daughter, Mrs. Frank Morrison of Salem.

The Oregon delegates of the democratic national convention at Kansas City will leave Portland Friday evening. It is stated, unofficially, that the first choice of the delegation for the vice-presidential nomination is James Hamilton Lewis of the state of Washington.

Diphtheria has broken out in the Indian camp two miles from Bonner's Ferry, Idaho. At a special meeting of the town trustees it was decided to establish a quarantine and all precautions will be used to keep the swiftness out of town. The Indians are receiving medical aid.

Twenty Oregon counties have already paid their state tax for the year, as follows: Baker, Benton, Clackamas, Columbia, Coos, Douglas, Gilliam, Harney, Jackson, Josephine, Klamath, Lake, Lane, Morrow, Sherman, Umatilla, Wasco, Washington and Wheeler. There are four that have not paid any portion of their 1899 tax, as follows: Cook, Linn, Malheur and Tillamook. The remaining nine have paid in part.

RUHLIN DEFEATS SHARKEY.

The Sailor Was Knocked Clear Out in the Fifteenth Round.

New York, June 27.—For the first time in his pugilistic career, Tom Sharkey went down to a decisive defeat last night in his historic arena of the Seaside Athletic club at Coney Island and big Gus Ruhlman, the Ohio pugilist, was his victor. It was a clean knockout after 15 rounds of fighting that made a memorable ring battle.

Save in the matter of aggressiveness, Ruhlman led from the face off in every feature of the game and at all times the fight well in hand. Sharkey did not give up his place in the line of first class heavy weights without a desperate struggle. Even at the end, when blinded by the blows of his powerful opponent and dulled mentally by the battering of his foe, he clung instinctively to the massive frame of the man who was his master.

The decisive battle and its unexpected result were truly a surprise for the sporting public. No line of form that could be figured gave the Ohioan more than one or two chances.

Dragged to Death.
Roseburg, Or., June 27.—Allen Cochran, a young man of Myrtle creek, met a terrible death there last evening. Cochran was leading a horse to water when it took fright and the rope being fastened to his hand he was terribly mangled. The rope was just long enough to reach the horse's heels and at every jump its hoofs struck Cochran's head.

Lee Company Investigation.
Albany, N. Y., June 27.—Justice Chester today handed down a decision in the American Lee company case which was against the company on all points. Under the decision, Referee Newsum can go on with the investigation of the company's affairs.

Michigan Republicans.
Grand Rapids, Mich., June 27.—The republican state convention assembled here this morning. It is improbable that the nominations will be reached today.

ARE FIGHTING FOR THEIR VERY LIVES.

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Legations Probably Reach a Place of Safety; All Foreigners at Peking Are Reported as Safe.

SITUATION IS SERIOUS AT NEW CHWANG

The People in Southern Provincial Counties are Just Beginning to Get Excited and There are Symptoms of a General Uprising.

London, June 27.—A dispatch from the Foo says: "The fight of the allied forces against the combined Boxers and Chinese soldiers, who are barring the road to Tien Tsin, opened at daybreak. One hundred and fifty Americans were among the second force of international troops. The Chinese soon broke under the heavy shelling and then the arsenal was attacked and the guns wounded while only a few had been killed. His forces were short of provisions and were returning without having rescued the legations."

Communication With Seymour.
London, June 27.—A special from Shanghai says communication with Admiral Seymour was opened by the Tien Tsin relief force Sunday. Admiral Seymour is said to be only 10 miles from Tien Tsin. Three hundred of his party are reported sick and wounded while only a few had been killed. His forces were short of provisions and were returning without having rescued the legations."

Messages Are Conflicting.
London, June 27.—Cable messages from the far east today are so conflicting that almost any described view of the situation is delusive therefrom. On the whole, it is safe to assume that Admiral Seymour and the legations there will ultimately reach a place of safety.

Admiral Seymour, it is asserted, sent a message to Tien Tsin Monday, according to which he was eight miles west, terribly harassed; could only hold out for two days longer; had killed and over 200 wounded. He did mention the ministers or others from Peking. It is thought at Shanghai that now Tien Tsin is relieved, the combined international force will have no difficulty in reaching Peking, though it is expected that all foreigners have already left there. According to a dispatch from New Chwang, the Russians there are barely able to cope with the situation.

Europeans Are Safe.
London, June 27, 3:38 p. m.—The British consul at Amoy telegraphs that all Europeans at Peking are reported safe.

News From Admiral Kempff.
Washington, June 27.—The following dispatch was received at the navy department late this afternoon: "The Foo.—The Peking force and the ministers reported with the Peking relief expedition are entrenched ten miles from Tien Tsin. Kempff."

The Trouble Is Spreading.
London, June 27.—The fresh phase of the rebellion in China is the probability of immediate outbreaks in the great southern provincial counties.

The populace there is daily assuming a more hostile attitude toward foreigners and the latter perceive symptoms of a general rising, especially at Nan King, where, according to a dispatch to the Daily Express, dated yesterday, Kang Wu, one of the most truculent enemies of foreigners, has arrived by way of the Grand canal, armed with full powers from the emperor to deal with the southern provinces. The friendly attitude of Viceroy Liu Kun Yih toward foreigners has brought him into disrepute with Prince Tuan, president of the Tungli yamen.

Missionaries Warned to Leave.
All missionaries have been notified of their immediate peril through confidential runners. They are leaving Canton hurriedly and only a few are now here.

Commander McLean of the United States steamer Don Juan de Austria is the first here to protect the foreign interests.

Two Jesuit fathers and 100 native Christians have been murdered in the southern part of the province of Chi Li.

The victory at Peking trusts the Americans in this crisis. He says that they alone want no territory and he places himself largely, almost unreservedly in their hands. At an important conference today he reiterated this statement.

American Troops in China.
Washington, June 27.—General McArthur notified the adjutant general this morning of the departure of the ninth infantry for China. Despite the reports that at least three regiments would be placed at General Chaffee's command, Adjutant General Corbin asserts, in most positive terms, that the ninth infantry are the only American troops ordered to China so far, and that while the sixth cavalry may go in the event they are needed, the present orders only carry them as far as Nagasaki. It is expected that the transport Grant, with general Chaffee on board, will arrive at Nagasaki about July 29, which would insure her arrival at Taku by the first of August. The diplomatic representatives of foreign governments have received, as far as known, little news from their governments, with respect to the situation in China. The difficulty of obtaining accurate information in embarrassing to all governments.

BOERS ARE AGAIN ACTIVE

They Have Succeeded in Getting Through General Rundle's Lines.

RAILROAD LABORERS ARE PRISONERS

General Dewet is the Boer Genius of the Guerrilla Operation; The Whereabouts of Kruger.

London, June 27.—Telegrams from South Africa indicate renewed Boer activity in proportion with Lord Roberts' quiescence. News this morning supports the belief that the Boers have succeeded in piercing General Rundle's lines and have proceeded southward. It appears the failure of the British to properly guard the line of communications north of Kromstadt involved the disaster to the body of Basutos who were working on the railroad, of whom twenty were killed and 200 were made prisoners. This has had a decidedly bad effect on the natives.

Boer Guerrilla Tactics.
London, June 27.—The Boer commandoes in the eastern part of the Orange River colony appear to have been broken up by their leader into small parties that harass large columns of the British incessantly, cutting off scouts, sniping pickets, and making a show of force here and there. Commandant Christian Dewet, Gen. Steyn's principal leader, is the genius of these guerrilla operations. He is the hero on the Boer side in the last days of hostilities.

Lord Roberts' columns are steadily contracting the circle of their advance. Transvaal officials at Machadodorp by a correspondent of the Daily Express, asserted their intention to hold out to the last.

President Kruger will probably retire to Watervalbosch or Nelspruit. His physician thinks his condition of health will not allow him to go to the high veldt.

ILLINOIS DEMOCRATS.
They Meet at Springfield and Build a Platform.

Springfield, Ill., June 27.—The democratic state convention reconvened today. Their platform reaffirms the national platform of 1896; denounces the administration of McKinley. It takes public condemnation of the administrative policy, which denies to Cuba, Puerto Rico and the Philippine islands the principle of home rule and self government; denounces the currency law, which proposes to permanently establish the gold standard, and denounces trusts. The platform favors the election of United States Senators by a direct vote of the people and instructed the delegates to vote for W. J. Bryan for president.

PROHIBITIONISTS IN SESSION.
Nominations for President and Vice-President Occur Thursday.

Chicago, June 27.—The national convention of the prohibition party met here today. Chairman Oliver W. Stewart, of the national executive committee, called the convention to order. It is expected, tomorrow the nominations for president and vice-president will be made, when nearly one thousand delegates will be present.

A somewhat heated debate took place at the meeting of the committee on resolutions, relative to the instructions to be given the sub-committee on platform, the discussion being over a point of the single issue or a broad platform. The resolution finally was passed that the platform should have no plank that did not touch upon the liquor question.

Arkansas Democrats.
Little Rock, Ark., June 27.—The democratic state convention reconvened here today. The platform reaffirms the Chicago platform, declares for government construction of the Nicaragua canal, denounces trusts, condemns the policy of the republican administration in the Philippines and demands national legislation against trusts.
