PARADE FOR THE FOURTH.

It Will Be Quite a Success, Says the Chairman of the Committee.

Jonh Hayley, jr., chairman of the day parade committee for the Fourth of July, has completed most of the details and announces the following characters to be represented by the young people:

Uncle Sam, Roy Bailey, Columbia, Ruby Whittemore, Goddess of Liberty, Mabel Nye, Goddess of War, Nell Cameron, Goddess of Plenty, Maude Jones, Goddess of Peace, Edith Eppie, Goddess of Justice, Leo Sheridan, And a number of little girls representing the states and territories and the new inland possessions of the United States.

Chairman Hayley has been assisted in the preparations by Mrs. R. G. Thompson, Mrs. T. C. Taylor and Mrs. J. A. Borne. The parade will be headed by Uncle Sam and Columbia, who will have a special carriage all to themselves, and the other characters will be on the liberty car.

Dr. F. W. Vincent, mayor of Pendleton, will act as president of the day, and will ride in a carriage with Senator Charles W. Fulton, orator of the day; Mrs. William Fitzgerald, who will read the Declaration of Independence; and the Rev. John Uren, pastor of the Thompson Street M. E. church, chaplain of the day, who will deliver the invocation.

The program at the Byers grove, where the literary exercises are to be held, will be:

Music by the band. Prayer by Rev. John Uren. Music by the band. Reading of the Declaration of Independence. Music by the band. Oration by Senator Fulton. Music by the band.

Rates for the Fourth. Messrs. F. F. Wamsley and Walter Adams, of the transportation committee, have considered their arrangements for the running of trains on the Fourth. The O. R. & N. will run a special train from Walla Walla to Pendleton, arriving here at nine o'clock, and departing for the return at 10:30 o'clock p.m. The W. & C. R. R. will run a special train into Pendleton, arriving here at nine o'clock, and returning at a convenient hour in the evening.

Rates will be one and one-third fare for the round trip, based upon three cent rates, which will become effective on the first of July.

The O. R. & N. trains from the west and east on the regular schedules now run at hours convenient so that people may come from all places along the line and both come and go the same day.

DEMOCRATIC DELEGATES TO GO. Special Car Prepared for the Party Which Leaves Portland Friday.

Col. James H. Raley, one of the delegates to the national democratic convention at Kansas City, left Wednesday evening for Portland, to attend to some law business for clients, and attempt to finish so as to go with the Oregon delegation which leaves Portland Friday. Regarding the trip of the Oregon delegation, the Portland Oregonian says:

"The Oregon delegates to the national democratic convention will vote for Colonel Jim Ham Lewis for vice-president. That is, their first vote will be cast that way, as a compliment to the Washington man. After that the vote belongs to the strongest man in the convention. Should David Bennett (Ill.) develop stamper strength and be elected to the place, then Colonel Jim Ham may not get a complimentary vote. In fact, if there are signs of a stampede in any direction and a nomination by acclamation, the vote of Oregon will likely be in the line, forgetting that Colonel Lewis is a neighbor."

The delegation goes instructed for Bryan, and will vote for him to a finish.

The Oregon democrats will go to Kansas City, in the Pullman car all to themselves. Of course, it will be shared with friends who are going from this section, and the silver republicans have arranged to go with them, but the car will be a Bryan car, and the man who does not get a berth in it will not be able to ride to Missouri with the Oregon delegation. The car will leave here Friday night, according to present plans, and there is room for only two or three now left. The route will be over the O. R. & N., Short Line, Rio Grande Western, Denver & Rio Grande and the Rock Island.

It is not yet known who of the silver republican delegates will go, but all who do will be made to feel at home.

Among the friends of the delegates who have taken berths in the sleeper are C. R. Thompson, of Astoria; William Pollock and H. H. H. Hill, of Baker City; Mr. and Mrs. H. H. Hill, of Prineville, will also probably be in the party.

Next to the vice-presidential contest, the thing that will interest the Oregonians most is the selection of a national committee man. At present Judge Townsend, of Polk county, fills that place, and he is said to be willing, even anxious, to fill it for another term, but there are others who want the place. M. A. Miller is said to be putting forth some lively efforts, and there are good democrats in Portland who predict that he will be the next national committee man from Oregon.

It is said that he already has some pledges, and that enough are in sight to pull him through. In addition to
