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### TO SEARCH FOR LOST MINES.

Gay and St. Dennis Leave Athena to Find Rich Placers Near Prineville. Athena, Or., June 29.—Forty three persons gathered on Main street today to bid Joe Gay and Jerry St. Dennis a fond good-bye, as they started on their prospecting trip in search of the Blue Bucket or Meeks' Lost Route placer gold mines. They will go via Pendleton to the country south of Prineville and will be out on their trip until about Aug. 1. Mr. Gay said he was confident he could find the mines, as he has many pointers to which others have not access. The famous mines said to have been found in 1847. An emigrant train in charge of Steve Meeks, brother of the still more famous Joseph Meeks, was crossing from Boise Ferry to the headwaters of the Willamette. When not more than five miles from where Prineville now is, these placers were discovered. In the outfit was a blue wooden bucket. One of the women of the party took the bucket, went to the placer grounds, and filled it with all the gold nuggets she could carry. Hence the name "Blue Bucket" mines. Both Mr. Gay and Mr. St. Dennis have had a great deal of experience in prospecting, and they are backed in their venture by many Athena persons who trust their judgment.

Scott's Company's Crops. Charles Campbell, of Vansycle, agent under Alex. Drysdale at Pendleton of the Scotch company, and H. Mortimer, also of Vansycle, were in Athena today getting repairs for the threshing machine outfit. Mr. Campbell stated that the company has 1120 acres of fall and spring wheat that will average 25 to 30 bushels to the acre. If the present favorable weather should continue for wheat to ripen, Mr. Campbell will commence threshing for the Scotch company on the first Monday after the Fourth of July. He further stated that some heading had already been done in this section, but not a great deal, although the wheat seemed to him to be farther along than the grain in the vicinity of Athena. Mr. Mortimer has 150 acres of spring wheat that he thinks will go something better than 20 bushels to the acre.

CATTLE DELIVERED AT ECHO. Stanfield and Dillon Both Sold to Sound Buyers—Warehouses to Be Moved. Echo, Or., June 30.—R. N. Stanfield made delivery on Saturday last of 25 head of beef cattle, the balance of the cattle contracted last fall to Miller and Zephan, of Seattle. Harry Stilton received the cattle at Echo, and went as far as Portland with them.

A. J. Dillon sold a carload of cattle to Brown West of Tacoma. Delivery was made Wednesday at Echo. It is expected that J. H. Kowitz and the Pacific Coast Elevator company will have to move their warehouses, in consequence of the new siding to be built by the O. R. & N. company at Echo. This new siding is necessitated by the immense amount of freight business the O. R. & N. company is doing. It sometimes occasions much delay when two long freights are passing, and at the same time allow the passenger train to pass.

Personal Mention. F. W. Hendley and wife of Pendleton spent Sunday in Echo. Mrs. J. H. Abel is very sick with rheumatism, serious enough to confine her to the bed. Mrs. R. Jones, who has been visiting her relatives at Albany and Salem for about a month, returned home Thursday morning. Charles Taylor is getting ready to go to Foley Springs for the summer. He will make the trip overland. It is hoped that he will be much benefited by the change, as the springs are noted for their health giving properties. Mrs. Thos. Smart and Miss Mamie Sullivan will leave in a day or two for Portland, staying until after the Fourth. Mr. Smart, who is still in the hospital, is reported to be slowly but surely gaining. He goes out a little, he expects in a month or two, to be able to resume his work for the O. R. & N. company. He has given that company faithful service for over 20 years. Thomas Brasfield returned Wednesday morning from a hurried trip to Shasta county, Calif. His mother is very sick, and his brother, Ollie, died recently. The doctor gave as the cause of his death, the bursting of a blood vessel, in consequence of a strain received in lifting a stone. Andy Cloghnan returned home a few mornings ago, smiling and happy. He was married at Tacoma, on the 4th of the month, to Edna Fields, of that city. Mrs. Cloghnan was, some four or five years ago, a resident of Echo. For the present, at least, they will make Echo their home.

PEEBLER CONTEST CASE. Case Will Be Heard by Judge Ellis on July 10. Formal notice of the contestant the office of treasurer of Umatilla county has been filed by Stillman & Pierce, attorneys for George D. Peebler, democratic candidate in the late election, against S. K. Yates, the republican nominee who, upon the face of the returns, was shown to have a plurality of seven over Yates. S. Yates has employed J. J. Bailera and Carter & Raley to defend the case. The contestant, Peebler, also filed a motion to set the day of hearing, and Judge Lowell named today, Saturday, as the day of hearing. Contestee on June 29 filed a motion to dismiss and quash the contest, for the reasons the notice and return were insufficient to give the court jurisdiction, of the person of the contestee or the subject matter of the contest; that the notice was not entitled to be filed with the clerk of the court; that the writ has no jurisdiction in this case. The motion has not been disposed of. In the notice of contest, the following is set forth, as allegations: That at the general election on June 4, 1930, there was a democratic candidate, 1419 votes, and that there were cast for S. K. Yates, (the republican candidate,) no more than 1279 votes; that there were therefore cast for Peebler 138 votes more than were cast for Yates or any other candidate. That the canvassing board, Justice Parker, Justice Rosenberg and the county clerk, made an abstract of the votes cast in the county, as returned

in the several precinct poll books, and found that 1346 votes were cast for Peebler and 1348 for Yates. In the notice of contest also it is alleged that in Mountain and Reservation precincts votes were cast by persons not legally qualified to vote, and some by persons who were not citizens of the United States. Judge Lowell has set the case for hearing in the circuit on the tenth of July, at which time W. R. Ellis, circuit judge elect, will have gone upon the bench. The case came up today on the motion to quash, but no action was taken, the case being left for the new judge.
