THE MUSTN'T EXPLODE BOMBS

There are to be allowed on Main and Court Streets. The mayor and marshal give official notice to today's East Oregonian that the public may be fired on Main and Court streets during the festivities at Pendleton on the Fourth of July celebration, and also that during the night on that day no firecrackers may be fired on either of those streets. Everyone remembers how a well known railroad man a year or two ago suffered the loss of an eye by the explosion of a bomb in connection with the celebration here, and several other changes have occurred, including runaway carriages. The observance of this rule is down by the officials will insure any more of these accidents which have in some instances resulted in serious injury.

Marshal Heathman announced today that he would cause the curfew bell to be rung at nine o'clock in the evening, instead of at the earlier hour at which it has been ringing of late. This gives the youngsters a little more time in which to play in the evening, without feeling the weight of the law's authority upon them, in the event they remain away from their homes or go out on the streets.

SALING SOLD HORSES.

Disposed of Them in St. Paul at a Big Sale.

Frank Salting has returned from St. Paul, where the Salting Brothers disposed of a large number of horses at good figures. Concerning the sale, the leader says:

"The Salting brothers were interested in three trainload shipments, one to Sioux City, and the other two to St. Paul, made by horse owners from Pasco, Washington. The first train consisted of 21 cars, containing 107 head; the second of 17 cars containing 400 head, and the third of 11 cars, containing 280 head. The horses, all of them unbroken animals fresh from the range, brought between \$15 and \$40 per head, netting fair returns for their owners. The freight cost was \$18 per car, and the feed bill en route was quite a heavy one, hay ranging in price from \$12 to \$20 per ton.

"The last sale attended by Frank Salting at St. Paul occurred June 7th. It was a big one, having been extensively advertised, and 117 carloads of horses, principally from Washington and Idaho ranges, were sold in one day at auction. In one hour 31 carloads were disposed of, and the man who wanted horses had no time to haggle over terms, or to examine the good and bad points of the animals. One carload would be turned loose at a time in a corral, and while the train was running about in front of the auctioneer would 'knock down' the whole bunch. The last trainload did not sell for very good advantage, on account of the poor crop outlook in the middle west, which made buyers cautious. Previous shipments, however, found ready sale at good prices. The market is now greatly overstocked.

"The Salting brothers disposed of nearly 500 head in the three shipments, most of them animals averaging about 1000 pounds in weight."

HARNEY VALLEY'S FINE WOOL CLIP.

Two Pendleton Young Men Return From That Country.

Elmer Gilliam and J. M. Kramer, two young men of this place, returned Saturday evening from Harney valley, where they have been at work in the sheep camps, shearing. They sheared 1000 mixed sheep for one of the sheepmen of that country, and took off fleeces that weighed as high as 19 pounds, while the average of the entire band was no less than 12 for all ages. This was in Harney valley, beyond Burns, towards the Stein's mountain. "That is a great sheep country," said Mr. Gilliam, "and it would be difficult to find one better under the sun. Sheepmen, in common with people of all classes, appear to be doing well, prosperity having struck them all alike."

The young men returned by train, via Ukiah, and made the long drive from Harney valley to Ukiah in three days, which as, all know, who have been over the roads between those points, is a rather good rate of traveling for a team without change.
