CLOPTON-FANNING CASE DECIDED.

Clopton Wins in the Road Question at Issue.

Deputy Clerk Lee Moorhouse, of the supreme court, today received from Salem opinions handed down by the justices in the following cases heard at the Pendleton term of the court:

C. O. Fanning et al., appellants, vs. J. M. Gilliland and F. B. Clopton, respondents, appeal from Umatilla county, J. H. Bailey and J. J. Balleray for appellants, J. A. Fee for respondents, opinion by Wolpert, C. J., judgment of lower court affirmed. It was a proceeding by writ of review to test the legality of the establishment by the county court of Umatilla county of a road of public easement across the lands of the plaintiffs. C. O. Fanning closed it up and refused to permit the petitioners to use it. Any inconsequential irregularities in the road proceedings are ignored on the ground that the purpose of the statute had been subserved.

Lulu P. Curry, respondent, vs. W. F. Butcher et al., appellants, appeal from Baker county, W. F. Butcher and T. H. Crawford for appellants, Dell Stuart for respondent, opinion by Bean, J., reversed and remanded.

Etoine Mendelson, appellant, vs. Louis Mendelson, respondent, appeal from Baker county, J. A. Fee for appellant, C. O. John for respondent, opinion by Moore, J., affirmed.

Clara A. Boyce, appellant, vs. H. A. Copper, respondent, appeal from Grant county, T. Williams for appellant, J. J. Balleray for respondent, opinion by Moore, J., modified.
