PUGET SOUND WAREHOUSE COMPANY. Has Bought Many Houses—F. W. Hendley is Agent at Pendleton.

The Puget Sound Warehouse company, of which F. W. Hendley is agent at Pendleton, has bought all the warehouses which formerly were controlled by the Kershaw Grain company, and has also bought a large number of houses along the railroad lines in Washington.

The formation of the company is thus spoken of by the Tacoma Ledger, which will interest farmers in this county: "Some months ago the Ledger printed an item to the effect that Ralph B. Smith manager of the Puget Sound Mill company, had been buying up warehouses in the eastern part of the state, purchasing several formerly operated by the Kershaw grain company, of Tacoma, but as the deals had not all been completed at that time, Mr. Smith was reluctant to give out any information regarding the plans of himself and associates."

"Later the Puget Sound Warehouse company was organized, and as the plans have now been perfected, the details of the company's plans and the facilities they will have for handling grain are now made public for the first time. The new company has a capital stock of \$100,000, and the headquarters will be in Tacoma. An office will be opened, probably in the California block, and the company will go out after all the business there is in sight. While full details are not given out yet, it is safe to assume that the company will engage extensively in the grain exporting trade. They have the largest holdings of warehouses in the country in which they operate, and the establishment of headquarters in Tacoma unquestionably means that more wheat than ever will be exported from this port."

Who the Incorporators Are. "The incorporators and trustees are all well known men in the grain and flour trade of the Northwest, Ralph F. Smith being the president, Edward S. Shull jr., vice-president, Frank L. Shull secretary, and Theodore E. Wilcox and Charles E. Ladd additional trustees. E. Noeman, who has been chosen as manager, will have his headquarters in Tacoma, and all the business will be handled from this city."

The company has been organized in connection with the Northern Pacific Railway company and Washington & Columbia River railway and the Puget Sound Flouring Mills company, of this city. Its strength financially will make it an important factor in the grain trade of the Northwest.

Means More Wheat Here. "That the company is out for business is evidenced by the fact that they have secured and will operate about forty warehouses in the Washington & Columbia River railway and twenty to thirty on the Northern Pacific railway. This will mean many thousands of bushels of wheat coming to the port of Tacoma in addition to that of the past seasons, and will thus tend to strengthen the present friendly bonds between the farming lands of Washington, Oregon and Idaho on the one hand and Tacoma on the other."

"The fact that this company is organized in connection with the Puget Sound Flouring Mills company would indicate that wheat exporting may be taken up by some of the allied interests."

NEW COUNTY COURT. Denies Petition of Justice Fitzgerald for Office Paid for by the County. County Judge Hartman called the county court to order this morning, the holdover commissioner, T. P. Gilliland, and the new commissioner, Horace Walker, being present. The court got under way very soon after assembling, and before noon was transacting business just as though a new judge and commissioner had not taken office. Bills were passed upon, and numerous matters taken up.

Thos. Fitzgerald appeared before the court and made request for the county to furnish a court room and furniture for the use of his justice court, the same to be paid for by the county. The court denied the request. Justice Fitzgerald then stated that he would order the county clerk to issue the scrip, regardless of the court's orders. The matter may cause some legal litigation, unless an agreement is reached.
