GENERAL NEWS.

Colonel C. O. B. Cowardin, editor-
in-chief of the Richmond Dispatch,
died Thursday from typhoid fever, aged
48 years.

A special to the Times-Herald from
Dubuque, Iowa, says: Speaker D. B.
Henderson, wife and daughter left
there in a private car for Yellowstone
Park and the Pacific coast, going via
St. Paul.

At the request of the Philippine
commission, through the secretary of
war, F. M. Higgins, chairman of the
central board of examiners of the
United States Civil Service commis-
sion, has been assigned to duty in the
Philippines. This assignment is made
to establish civil service examinations
to test the fitness of the applicants in
the transfer of the Philippine govern-
ment from the military to a civil basis.

Word has been received in London of
the arrival at the mouth of the Zam-
bezi of the material for the memorial
to Dr. David Livingstone, the cele-
brated African missionary and ex-
plorer. The monument, which will
consist of a handsome obelisk, twenty
feet in height, and surrounded by a
cross, will stand on the spot where
formerly stood the tree, at the foot of
which Livingstone's heart was buried
by his faithful native followers, in
1873.

One of the American exhibits which
is attracting tremendous crowds in
Paris is a large octagonal refrigerator
shown in the agricultural building.
Europe has never suspected the use
of American make of refrigerators. In
Paris meet is killed from day to day,
and it is impossible to preserve eggs and
butter. Therefore the great American
ice-box excites much wonder. It is
constructed of plate glass on all sides,
and all kinds of food are artistically
displayed.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

Captain James Marston died sudden-
ly at his home in Portland on the 3d.

The population of Boise City, as will
be shown by the census, is about 8,000.
Ed Reiser, a young man from Port-
land, is under arrest at Salem for for-
giving Governor Geer's name to a check.

Mayor Dufer, of The Dalles, seems to
have a conflict "on" with the
common council, as it has rejected his
nominations for recorder and marshal.

The Baker City council has awarded
the contract for improvement of the
city water works to H. C. Conlan, of
Spokane, their bid of \$87,791.50 being
the lowest.

Owing to the state of his health Prof.
Cameron has positively decline the
presidency of the Drain Normal school
to which he was elected. The board is
now considering several other names.

Edward E. Cushman, of Tacoma,
has been tendered the appointment of
Assistant United States attorney for
the district of Washington, to succeed
Colonel Charles E. Claypool, who
resigned.

D. E. Wykoop, a timber buyer from
Traverse City, Mich., recently sent to
a laundry in Salem a bundle of cloth-
ing in which \$210 in greenbacks was
wrapped. He missed the money soon
after and recovered it.

John J. Reed, a resident of Portland,
Or., and a barber by trade, met his
death in Seattle, in a terrible hand-to-
and conflict, which resulted in the
deceased having his clothing literally
cut from his body. The apparent motive
for the crime was robbery.

The receipts of the postoffice of The
Dalles are sufficient to entitle the city
to free delivery, and the common
council has instructed the mayor and
recorder to "present a proper mem-
orial to the postal department asking
that the same be established."

THE HORRIBLE REPORT TRUE

All Foreign Ministers, Their Wives, Child-
ren and Servants Slaughtered
by Chinese in Peking.

LAST MESSAGE FROM MINISTER CONGER

Prince Tuan Put 4,000 Chinese to the Sword for Petitioning
to Control the Orgie of Blood—The
Powers Will Hasten Action.

London, July 7.—"The massacre of
all foreign ministers as well as the
women and children and guards at
Peking, after 18 days of hopeless
resistance," says a dispatch
from Shanghai, dated July 6th.

"When ammunition and food were
exhausted," continues the dispatch,
"the Chinese fiends closed in upon the
legations and butchered all who re-
mained alive. Afterwards they set fire
to the legation buildings in which the
remains of the victims were consumed
in one horrible holocaust."

Another Shanghai dispatch states
that the officer in charge of several de-
partments at Shanghai and vicinity,
admits that no legations exist in Pe-
king, and no foreigners have been left
alive.

Prince Tuan had four thousand
Chinese butchered, it is said, for dar-
ing to petition to control the orgie of
blood.

Last Words From Conger.
A dispatch from Taku says: The last
message from Conger, the United
States minister to Peking, brought to
Taku by runners, reads as follows:
"We are besieged. Provisions becoming
exhausted and the situation is
desperate. The relief force should ad-
vance."

There is Still Some Hope.
London, July 7.—Jardine, Mathews
& Co., of Shanghai, telegraphed their
London house as follows: "The
British legation was standing July
2nd. There are reassuring reports re-
garding the lives of Europeans."

Legations Standing on July 3.
Washington, July 7.—A cablegram
from Consul General Goodnow, at
Shanghai, says: The legations were
standing on the third instant. The
Boxers seemed disposed to adopt the
starvation method of bringing the
foreigners into their clutches.

Reports Probably Premature.
Washington, July 7.—A dispatch
from Consul General Goodnow, dated
this morning, has revived the hope
that the legations, at least,
some of them, are still alive in
Peking. If the only thing they have to
face is starvation the officials believe
there is ground for hope that the
horrible stories from Shanghai, of
nameless crimes and massacres, are
least premature. One certain effect
of Goodnow's dispatch will be to cause
the officials here, and, without doubt,
of the European government too, to re-
double their exertions to push forward
a relief force to Peking. The main hope
for speedy action still lies with Japan,
but Japan is not expected to make the
campaign single handed. The Inter-
national forces at Taku and Tien Tsin
will co-operate to the utmost with the
Japanese in the movement on Peking.

More American Troops for China.
Washington, July 7.—Orders were
issued by the war department this
afternoon to dispatch 6254 regular
troops to the Philippines with the
view of the utilization of them in
China, if found necessary. These
troops are intended to relieve the vol-
unteers in the Philippines and will
only be diverted to China in the event
that circumstances demand it.

Russia Will Co-operate With Japan.
London, July 7.—The Russian gov-
ernment announces that it will give
Japan a free hand to apply a military
force in China. The terms of their
consent are summarized in the sub-
joined dispatch from St. Petersburg,
under date of July 6:
"Upon inquiry from the Japanese
cabinet regarding the dispatch of
Japanese troops at China to render
aid to the foreigners in Peking, the
Russian government declared, June
27th, that it left the Japanese govern-
ment full liberty of action in this
connection, as the Tokyo cabinet expressed
its readiness to act in full agreement
with the other powers."

It is in consequence of this, no
doubt, that Japan is preparing to en-
tark 20,000 troops. The political con-
siderations that were thought to have
been influencing the action of the
powers are thus laid aside for the
moment, at least by the governments
supposed to have the clearest purpose
respecting China's future.

Native Christians Slaughtered.
The details of further horrors in
Peking are gathered by correspondents
at Shanghai from Chinese sources, es-
pecially of the slaughter in Chinese
and Tartar cities of thousands of native
Christians so that the capital reeks
with carnage. A ruthless thirst for
blood is spreading in all the northern
provinces, and wherever there are
native Christians, the scenes enacted
in the capital are spreading in minia-
ture. From these provinces nothing
further comes regarding the legation
forces, except the repetition that they
are all dead.

The Che Foo correspondent of the
Express, telegraphing Thursday, says
that there is no longer any doubt that
disaster had overtaken a Russian force
of 3000 that left Tien Tsin for Peking
June 11. As nothing has been heard
from them for 24 days it is assumed
that they have been overwhelmed.

Dynamiter Goes to Prison.
Boise, Idaho, July 7.—The supreme
court has affirmed judgment against
Paul Corcoran, the "Coeur d'Alene
dynamiter. Corcoran was convicted of

murder in the second degree at Wallace
for killing James Cheyne, who lost his
life in the Wardner riot, April 29,
1899, and was sentenced to 17 years im-
prisonment.

THE SOUTH AFRICAN WAR.
General Paget Moving into the Heart of
the Enemy's Country.
London, July 7.—Gen. Paget is mov-
ing toward the heart of the country
held by Dewet. Lord Roberts tele-
graphed the war office under date of
Pretoria, July 6, as follows:
"Paget engaged the enemy July 3
successfully at Penzancefontein. He
drove them out of a very strong posi-
tion across the Broekfontein, where he
was bivouacked for the night. He fol-
lowed up the enemy on the afternoon
of July 4."

His reports that all the Transvaal
officials except the treasurer general,
who has gone to Vrede, are at Bethle-
hem, which has been proclaimed the
capital. Stoen himself is reported to
have taken flight to the moun-
tains. Buller reports the line to
Heidelberg restored, thus completing
every communication between Pretoria
and Natal.

Governor Allen Arrives.
New York, July 7.—The auxiliary
cruiser Mayflower, with C. H. Allen,
governor of Porto Rico, on board,
arrived here today from San Juan.

Republican Headquarters.
Cleveland, July 7.—Senator Hanna
said today that he would go to New
York and open national headquarters
in that city about July 25th.

AFTER THE CONVENTION.
THE SILVER REPUBLICANS AND POPU-
LISTS ARE SATISFIED.
Lincoln, Neb., July 7.—The tide of
democrats has turned from Kansas
City to Lincoln and Bryan expects
many visitors during the next few
days. The influx began today, when
the Montana delegation stopped be-
tween trains. Other delegations are
expected during this afternoon. Bryan
does not expect to be able to give out
any part of his campaign plans for
several days.

Populists in Good Humor.
Kansas City, July 7.—Fusion be-
tween the democratic and populist
parties on the presidential ticket has
been decided upon by the populist
national committee. Unless the present
plans are changed, however, the demo-
cratic vice-presidential candidate can
not be endorsed, whether or not Towne
decides to withdraw, as this, it is
feared, would result in a large defection
to the middle of the road popu-
lists. Charles A. Towne will leave
this afternoon and stop at Lincoln at
the invitation of Bryan.

Cannot Talk Now.
Kansas City, Mo., July 7.—C. A.
Towne when asked today if he would
withdraw, as the populist vice-presi-
dential nominee, in order that Steven-
son's name could be substituted, is
quoted as saying: "I cannot say any-
thing just now. I'll make an an-
nouncement in a few days."

HOT WEATHER EAST.
Highest July Record in New York and
Many Prostrations.
New York, July 7.—At noon today
the thermometer registered 90 degrees
in the shade, the highest July record.
A dozen heat prostrations are reported.

Chicago, July 7.—Four deaths from
heat are reported here today.

Roosevelt Coming West.
Cleveland, O., July 7.—After a con-
ference with Senator Mark Hanna, Gov-
ernor Roosevelt said: "I have been
confering with the senator about the
itinerary that we shall follow this

fall. It has been determined that if
possible I shall visit all the Rocky
Mountain states."

Arkansas Republicans.
Little Rock, Ark., July 7.—The re-
publican state convention nominated
H. I. Rammel, of Little Rock, for gov-
ernor, and decided to leave the re-
mainder of the state ticket blank.

Athletes Meet.
London, July 7.—The annual meet-
ing of the Amateur Athletic Associa-
tion commenced here this afternoon.
About fifty American athletes were
present.

WHEAT GOOD AS IN 1898.
Ogle Brothers Think Quality Will Equal
That of the Great Year.

Ben and Tom Ogle are in town today
and are quite enthusiastic over the
prospects for a fine crop of wheat.
They think it will be as good in qual-
ity this year as it was in 1898, when so
much of the wheat graded No. 1.

They had been out to inspect their
wheat lands near town and were
pleased with the prospects. The
weather has been just what was wanted
to cause the grain to fill out and make
a good plump berry.

"We find," said they, "that is is
true, as claimed, that there are only
two grains to the bush on the average,
and that therefore the yield must come
somewhat short of the phenomenal
turnouts of some former years. But
the yield will be large enough, and
when we speak of it being short we do
not mean that it is short of average,
but mean simply that it is less than in
years when it was phenomenal."

"The crop is going to be a first-class
one in all respects, and everyone who
has grain this year should be all
right."
