USING COTTON AND SHODDY.

Eastern Manufacturers Not Wanting Wool in Large Quantities.

Wool buyers generally agree that the present status of the market in the east is scarcely one of promise of better prices for the clips of the country now for sale. Although the season started with excellent prices quoted, and although many sheepmen sold at those beginning quotations early in the trade, latterly has suffered a slump. For many days past the buyers have been reticent, and when expressing themselves, have said that they were not in the market for wools just now, and would await developments at their headquarters.

The market advances received here, and which are determining the present value of wool are that the big mills of the Atlantic coast are buying under a "hand to mouth" policy. None of the big mills are taking any considerable quantities of wool, and only a few of the smaller mills have done any extensive buying.

In explanation, come the market reviews saying that the dullness of the market is due to the manufacturers being compelled to use so large a proportion of cotton and shoddy in making the goods now called for by the market. This is distasteful alike to the wool men, the buyers, the manufacturers and the retailers, who prefer to make and sell the better quantities of pure wool goods. But, the use of cotton and shoddy seems to be necessary by reason of the lack of demand for the all-wool and the demand now very marked for the cheaper goods.

Many of the wool growers who some time ago withdrew their clips from the market are scratching their heads, and wondering whether they did not adopt a poorly paying policy when they refused the offers made for their wools. Sales are now few and far between, and all that are made are on a lower level than at any time this spring. It is said a clip or two was bought here this week on a basis of a trifle more than forty scoured at the Atlantic seaboard, and this is ten cents a pound lower than the former quotation.

An Eastern Market Review.

A recent review from Boston says: "The wool market still continues dull and unsatisfactory, although there has been a little more looking around by representatives of moderate sized mills, who have been carefully testing the market, but we have yet purchased only in a very limited way. The large consumers are still out of the market."

"What the wool trade desire is that honest goods will be wanted instead of cotton and shoddy mixtures, and they are inclined to believe that in the view of the drop which has occurred in the price of wool, there will be an enlarged use of the latter."

"Substitutes are being very largely used, and that consumers will use substitutes very freely when the price of wool reaches a certain point is being demonstrated every week. This our attention was called this week to a mill, which is fully employed on men's wear goods, including overcoating, which is using not over 15 per cent of wool, the remainder of the stock used in its goods consisting of cotton and shoddy. The people are still buying cheap stuff, and are wearing more shoddy and less wool."

SOME FAST RIDING.

Young Man Goes 16 Miles in Half an Hour to Get Parents' Consent to Marriage.

The record for fast riding was established this week at the court house, when a young man rode sixteen miles in half an hour, rested his horse for half an hour, and then rode back the sixteen miles in half an hour.

Charles H. Bronson came to the court house for a license for the Parrott, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C. W. Parrott, living sixteen miles from Pendleton. He was informed by Deputy Clerk Lambirth that, if the

young lady was under the legal age, he must have written consent from the parents before the license could be issued. He named for a moment, looked inquiringly at the deputy clerk as if to assure himself that the official was telling the truth, and, grabbing his hat, rushed from the room.

The clerk's official family devoted a few moments to discussing the incident, and assumed their labors with the records. In just one and one-half hours Mr. Bronson walked into the office, holding in his hand a slip of paper, whereon was written the consent of the parents and their signatures.

The clerk's face was aglow with astonishment, when he asserted that he had ridden the sixteen miles in half an hour, remained at the Parrott house for half an hour, and then ridden back to town in the same lapse of time. But there wasn't one of the force that had the courage to question the correctness of the statement.
