It is not supposed that she knows just what this particular kind of evolution is, but she knows that nor Indian buck on the reservation, or any who come from other reserves to visit, can compare with her own dear, sweet, love of a dancer, with whom the others are not in it for a brief, fleeting minute.

One of the tales that came in from the reservation was one to the effect that half a dozen Indian young men are engaged in a desperate contest for the hand of the fairest, most spirited maiden on the Umatilla reserve.

The story goes in this wise: White Fawn, daughter of Little Elk, granddaughter of Ya-te-ne-ow-it, is reputed to be the most beautiful Indian maiden on the North Pacific coast and that means that she is the best looking young Indian girl on the globe, for they don't find them any better looking than our own Umatilla reservation girls.

She is of olive hue rather than the muddy cast so common among the Indians. She is coquetical, and plays the part of the heart of the young gallants of the tribes with ruthless gallantry.

She has had many suitors, and just now half a dozen of the bluebloods are asking her for her hand, both of them for that matter. Her suitors are white people, have been out of the tribes, aristocratic fellows, who boast a splendid lineage, running along a line fairly glowing with the blood of countless warriors slain.

White Fawn, being besieged thus so warmly, and being pressed for a decision like a base ball umpire who has the racket waving "judgment" summoned all the young aspirants for the honor of having White Fawn decide his case and perform other menial tasks for him, and announced:

She would saddle her swiftest cayuse, mount the same, run him just so fast as his speed would allow, which ever of the suitors first caught her would win her hand.

For a week past, the young bloods of the reserve have been training their fastest horses, and getting into form to win that prize, White Fawn, and the white people have been watching patiently for the race to begin, which is to be for the hand of the prettiest girl of Indian parentage on the Pacific coast.

Several boys from Pendleton have gone to the reservation to visit the Indian camp, and have troubled the occupants of the tepees, by firing crackers and otherwise disturbing the Indians, there gathered. The boys would do well to remember that there is a force of Indian police under the command of Captain Sompkin, known as one of the bravest men in the west, and that, if he is ordered to arrest anyone, he always obeys. Arrested by Indian police, one has to be taken to Portland for trial, for the case would come up in the federal court. Altogether it is advisable for all boys to avoid troubling the Indians, for the police will take their cases in hand if further disturbance occurs.
