GENERAL NEWS.

Charles H. Duell, commissioner of patents, is being groomed as the republican candidate for governor of New York.

Up to Monday 146 bodies had been recovered from the water and the burned vessels of the Hoboken, New York, dock fire which occurred ten days ago.

Sixteen hundred men were thrown out of employment Saturday by the banking of five furnaces operated by the Lackawanna Iron & Steel company at Scranton, Penn.

Rev. T. DeWitt Talmage preached in the Immanuel Church at Stockholm, Sunday, to an immense congregation. Dr. Talmage's sermon was rendered into Swedish by an interpreter.

Exports of gold and silver from New York to all countries for last week aggregated \$799,585 of silver bars and coin and \$2,240 gold. The imports of specie were \$15,057 gold, and \$29,897 silver.

A young woman in Rochester, N. Y., has brought suit for \$15,000 damages against a commercial concern for unwarranted use of her photograph. She wanted the picture of her face going over the country on bags of flour, and decided that it would require that amount of money to repair the injury to her "right of privacy."

PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

Imports of dry goods and merchandise at the port of New York last week were valued at \$5,496,207.

Thomas S. Gale, aged 60 years, of Portland, died Sunday night at Spokane where he had gone to visit friends.

The Brunswick saloon, the New York clothing house and the St. Paul lodging house in Portland were destroyed by fire Sunday morning.

Frank Lahrman, who shot his companion at S. Lupton, Baker county, was received at the penitentiary Sunday on a 15-year sentence for manslaughter.

Roy D. Gage, aged 19 years, of Company C, Third regiment, was drowned at Salem Sunday. He went swimming in the Willamette and was taken with cramps.

Mrs. Dumars, wife of William Dumars, manager of the Western Union Telegraph Co., at Portland, died of cancer Sunday, after an operation at a Portland hospital.

James Blair lost a foot in trying to jump onto a moving car on the ferry boat at Kalama, Wash., on Sunday. His foot was crushed off by the wheel of the car.

Alex Klesay, a pioneer of Wasco county, died a few days ago at Astoria, aged 71 years. He came to Oregon 25 years ago. He leaves seven children and four brothers.

Mrs. Sarah J. Veasey died at her home at Enterprise, Wallawa county, a few days ago, aged 66 years. Deceased came to Oregon with her parents in 1853, and was united in marriage with T. Veasey in 1860 at Jefferson, Marion county.

A horse buyer, on the lookout for animals to sell to the government, is in Wallawa county. He says the horses must be of any solid color, 5 to 7 years old, stand 14 hands 3 inches to 15 hands and 2 inches, weight 950 to 1050 pounds and be well broke to saddle. He will pay \$40 per head for all horses accepted.

Flem Wilson, of Prairie creek, Wallawa county, was attacked by a stallion, the horse catching the man with his teeth in the arm, dragging him around the corral until the hold tore loose, tearing off the biceps muscle and completely crushing the bone. He was also badly bitten about the head. Internal injuries caused his death.

SHE HAS RESUMED THE REINS OF GOVERNMENT

The Dowager Empress Appears to Have as Many Lives as a Cat.

THE NEWS FROM CHINESE SOURCES

Japan is Preparing to Start the Advance of Troops to Pekin as Early as This Week.

Washington, July 10.—Goodnow, United States consul, at Shanghai, states that, according to Governor Shan Tung, the Pekin legations were standing July 5th and the outlaws were dispersing. Consul Goodnow adds that the statement does not obtain general credence.

The Empress Alive Again.

London, July 10.—The Chinese official sources furnish another surprise today, in announcing that the dowager empress who has been reported dead, poisoned, and hopelessly mad, has resumed the reins of power.

The telegram of Sheng, an administrator of telegraphs, to the Chinese minister at Washington, appears to fit in with the dispatch from Shanghai, received this morning, with reference to the alleged directions given by the dowager empress, relative to the protection of foreigners. At the same time the people ask, why, if legations are protected, the ministers are not permitted to communicate with the outer world?

According to the legation of Japan here, the Japanese have no means share in the general opinion that the advance on Pekin must be indefinitely delayed. The officials assert that the Japanese have no intention of halting at Taku or Tien Tsin, but propose to advance on Pekin during the present week. Their military authorities express the opinion that 20,000 of their troops, in addition to the international forces already available, will suffice to force an entry into the Chinese capital.

The State Department Blatant.

Washington, July 10.—The state department has made public the identical note recently delivered to the powers as declining the position of the United States respecting the Chinese troubles. It embodies the views to which this government has adhered from the beginning of the present troubles and which the different powers have taken into favorable consideration. The announcement of the president at the start, that we did not consider ourselves at war with China and that all our efforts would be directed toward localizing the disturbances in the province of Chih Li and keeping them from spreading throughout the empire, by enlisting the aid of peace the power of the viceroys of central and southern China, has apparently been adopted by all the other powers. No answer from the different powers was expected to the circular but it is understood that it has been everywhere favorably received.

Sail From Manila Friday.

Washington, July 10.—General MacArthur cables from Manila that the Fourteenth Infantry and the Fifth artillery will leave Friday for Taku.

The Situation at Tien Tsin

Shanghai, July 10.—The Chinese shelled the foreign settlements of Tien Tsin July 8. The casualties were three companies of Japanese infantry, a mountain battery and a body of Russians, engaged the Chinese artillery with little effect. The Japanese casualties were an officer and two men killed and twenty men wounded. The casualties of the other forces were not known. The Chinese in the vicinity of Tien Tsin have been reinforced by several thousand of General Ma's and General Song's troops. Vice Admiral Alexioff has arrived here and is expected to assume command. The allied forces now number about 10,000 men.

Difficult to Get News.

Phanghai, July 10.—It is difficult to get news here, as the consuls are dependent upon Sheng, the administrator of telegraphs, for Pekin news. It is supposed he will do his best to assist foreigners. A large number of roadies are enlisting at present. The Chinese officials have turned their attention to the defense of Yang Tse and have guaranteed to protect foreigners at Yang Tse ports, provided the foreigners established here remain quiet. Sheng's proposal to form a Chinese volunteer corps has been rejected.

CONTEST FOR COUNTY TREASURERSHIP.

Case is Before Circuit Court—Question of Service of Notice by Sheriff. The Peabler-Yates county treasurer's contest is now before the circuit court. It came up this morning, when Judge W. R. Ellis, at ten o'clock this morning, convened the circuit court of Oregon for Umatilla county it being his first time for presiding since the election of June 4.

Several equity matters were taken up, and then the attorneys having all arrived, Judge Ellis took up the contest case involving the county treasurer's office, wherein Geo D. Peabler, democratic candidate, contests the office with S. K. Yates, Yates being the republican candidate, and shown on the face of the returns to have a plurality of seven votes.

A. D. Stillman, who with W. M. Pierce is counsel for Peabler, made an opening statement, informing the court of the nature of the matter at issue. The notice of contest which had been filed had alleged that Peabler received 1410 votes and Yates 1279, leaving Peabler 138 votes plurality, whereas the canvassing board gave Yates seven plurality, and that in Reservation and Mountain precincts persons voted who were not legally entitled so to do.

Mr. Stillman prepared a motion that the sheriff's return of service be amended so as to read that he had served a complete and correct copy of the notice of contest. The first return made by the sheriff had inadvertently omitted the words saying "a complete and correct copy of the within notice."

He asked the court to allow the motion.

Col. Raley, with C. H. Carter, and Judge Balleray counsel for Yates, op-

posed the motion. He contended that, the original service of notice of contest being admittedly insufficient, the matter could be remedied only by serving a new notice return contest and the sheriff making thereon correct return. Only by such manner of procedure could the court acquire jurisdiction over the subject matter in controversy.

Mr. Carter also argued the motion for the contestee. Notice of contest had been served on Mrs. Yates, wife of contestee, and the return said he so served Mrs. Yates with the notice after making diligent search, and failing to discover the whereabouts of the contestee, Mr. Yates himself. Mr. Carter, as Col. Raley had previously done, contended that the return should have said of whom he inquired and where he searched and why he failed to discover the whereabouts of the contestee.

Mr. Stillman closed for the contestee, asking the court if, because of an officer of the court having made an inadvertent error in service, by an act of contestee, and the return said he so served Mrs. Yates with the notice after making diligent search, and failing to discover the whereabouts of the contestee, Mr. Yates himself. Mr. Carter, as Col. Raley had previously done, contended that the return should have said of whom he inquired and where he searched and why he failed to discover the whereabouts of the contestee.

Shaw, treasurer; J. J. Kaufman, marshal; H. H. Crampton, street commissioner; S. S. Blandford, city attorney; E. S. Clark, surveyor; W. L. Gladman, assessor; E. D. Reynolds, clerk; W. E. Russell, health officer; P. D. Bentley, sexton; William Glasford, justice.

There was no opposition to Mayor Betz, nor to Shaw, for treasurer; Blandford for attorney; Reynolds, for clerk; Gladman, for assessor; Clark, for surveyor and there was little interest in the election. In all these were less than 900 votes polled.

BOERS EVACUATE.

The English Report the Country Around Senekal Free From Them.

Senekal, Orange River Colony, July 10.—The reconnaissance yesterday resulted in the discovery that the Boers had evacuated all the positions around Senekal. The British commanders express the opinion that the retirement of the Boers foreshadows a speedy end of the war in that section of the country.

Boer Delegates in Paris.

Paris, July 10.—The Boer delegates, accompanied by Dr. Leyds, today paid a visit to M. Delcasse, the minister of foreign affairs.

City Marshal Killed.

Glencoe, O. T., July 10.—The information has been received here that the city marshal was killed and three desperadoes mortally wounded in a battle east of this city today. The marshal was endeavoring to arrest the outlaws when he met his death.

Renounced His Faith.

Chicago, July 10.—A special to the News from Rockford, Ill., says: George Jacob Schweinfurth, claimed by his followers to be the true messiah and the son of God, has renounced the faith and will leave the "heavenly" city.

National League Republican Clubs.

St. Paul, July 10.—Secretary Stone, of the National League of Republican clubs, has received assurance of the attendance of so many clubs that it will be one of the largest conventions ever held. Governor Roosevelt will be present.

Fitzsimmons and Rubin.

New York, July 10.—Fitzsimmons and Rubin have signed articles for a contest on August 10th, and Fitzsimmons and Sharkey are to fight on Aug. 25.

Jones to Direct Campaign.

Chicago, July 10.—Senator J. K. Jones, chairman of the national democratic committee, arrived here today and will remain to direct the campaign.

France in China.

Paris, July 10.—The chamber of deputies and the senate voted an additional 14,500,000 francs for carrying on France's operations in China.

National Educational Association.

Charleston, July 10.—The National Educational association met here today, with nearly 2,000 delegates present.

DEMOCRATIC FORCES PLOT AND PLAN

Meeting at Lincoln Today Under Auspices of the Populists.

PLANS OF CAMPAIGN FORMULATED

Bryan Will Not Tour the Country as in 1896; But Will Visit the Big Centres From Time to Time.

Lincoln, Neb., July 10.—The meeting here this afternoon, under the auspices of the populists, was largely attended. The program included speeches by Webster Davis, Davis of Texas, and others. Bryan and Stevenson were present. This evening a mass meeting of democrats is to be held. Charles A. Towne, James B. Weaver, and Congressman Shafroth, of Colorado will be the speakers.

Democratic Campaign Plans.

Lincoln, Neb., July 10.—Plans for the democratic national campaign of 1900 were practically agreed upon at a protracted conference between leaders of the party, which began here yesterday. The plan includes the appointment of a campaign committee as agreed upon between the representatives of the democratic, silver republican and populist parties at Kansas City. This committee will include members of all three parties and perhaps also democrats not members of the national committee, but who are prominent in the councils of the party. This committee will, it is said, have charge in a measure of the practical working of the campaign and will work for fusion on state and congressional tickets wherever possible. The press and executive committee, it is expected, will, with one or two exceptions, be the same as last year. The personnel of all committees was left in the hands of the local leaders. The question of national headquarters was also left in his hands. It was stated that Chicago would probably be selected.

Committee Johnson of Kansas stated after the meeting that the understanding existed that Bryan will tour the country as he did in 1896, but will make trips from time to time to the larger centers of population, remaining in Lincoln a great deal of the time.

FIRE THREATENS SHEEP.

It is Raging on Bull Mountain near Billings, Mont.

Billings, Mont., July 10.—A serious fire is raging on Bull mountain, along Railroad creek and in the vicinity of Pompey's Pillar, on the north side of the Yellowstone river, and is sweeping the range like tinder. Vast flocks of sheep are in great danger.

CAUSED HIS SON'S ARREST.

Boy Says the Warrant Was Wrongfully Sworn to by the Father.

Sheriff Blakely returned to town Monday evening with a 17-year-old boy in custody, the warrant reading for "Hurtle Wade," and the boy alleging that that is not his name, but that it is "Virgil Wade." The charge is that young Wade stole five horses from his father's ranch at the Big Bend of the McKay creek, and took them away. He himself admits that he took the horses, but claims that he owned all or a part of them, and that the horses are in his pasture five miles north from Helix. He was found by the sheriff at Helix, and is now in jail here. He has not yet had a hearing. Young Wade asked the officers if a father had a right to take away from a boy a horse or anything else that the boy had earned at honest toil. This question indicated that the boy would claim that the horses or part of them belong to him, and that he worked to earn them.

The father has once before caused his son to be arrested. Mr. Wade has not yet arrived in town from his McKay creek ranch.
