THE HOME OF HARVESTERS.

Thousands of Farmers Are at Work Today Cutting the Wheat.

Earlier morning, many farmers began the harvest work. The total number of men and horses engaged in the gathering of the big crop of this year would make an army large enough to secure the Boxes out from China. Quite a number have been at work for the past two weeks, but the harvest began generally on Monday and will continue for several weeks.

Thomas Thompson had his combine work on Sunday, and in company with E. H. Clarke, drove out to see the fields in good working order. It was steadily cutting and threshing and will not stop until the grain is all harvested.

For wheat has come in as yet the fields where threshing has been done, to show the yield. But, it has been frequently stated before this season, the quality is first-class and the yield is good. It is anticipated that this will hold good for the greater part of the county.

James Kirkland, however, of Milton county, who was in town today, stated that wheat has begun to arrive in the quantities there, and is of good quality. He had harvested nothing of the yield, but has been informed that the grain will all, or nearly all, grade No. 1.

TRADE IN THE ORIENT.

W. S. Byers Thinks Pacific Coast Will Retain the Business.

W. S. Byers thinks the Pacific coast will retain the bulk of the Oriental flour trade, regardless of the Chinese war. He has recently shipped large quantities to Hong Kong, and has not yet completed the business. He says that the flour trade is a very important one to the Chinese war, and the probable effects to be wrought upon the flour trade for which they now furnish so much of the wheat to the mills. The Oriental wheat trade, for several years, has been about as large as the capacity of the ships plying between the Pacific coast and the Oriental countries, and has not yet suffered any diminution.

At least, this is stated by Mr. Byers, owner of the Pendleton Roller Mills, and who exports immense quantities of flour to China and Japan. Mr. Byers says that he cannot notice any lessening in the demand for American flour in the Orient.

Mr. Byers, in talking of the war and the flour trade, presents a view that is not at all pessimistic. He says: "This war is reasonably certain in the end to operate to the benefit of the coast farmer. At this time, we are enjoying a very good demand in most of the seaboard cities of the Orient for our flour. The bulk of the trade, of course, is through Hong Kong, and since England owns that port to all intents and purposes, there is little danger that we will be cut off from our share in whatever trade is carried on."

Certainty of the Extension of Trade. "But, notwithstanding the waging of war or the quick coming of peace, it is quite certain that we will be able to extend our trade in the Orient. If a war occurs, then the people of those countries will have their attention diverted from the usual pursuits of agriculture, and the flour will continue to go there anyway."

Let it be understood that the flour now consumed in the Orient countries is used nearly all by the American and European residents who have gone there to live. But little is yet used by the natives. This being the case, it is necessary only that the seaports be kept open to insure the retention of the flour trade with but little decrease.

Then, in the event of the Chinese Empire being dismembered and the various powers taking each a portion, it is inevitable that our opportunities will be vastly more in that quarter of the globe, both in the flour trade, and also in all lines of commercial endeavor. We on the coast are situated so as to command the flour trade by being given an even chance with other countries, for we are nearest and distance is one of the determining elements in the problem, there is nowhere else when transportation enters into the question.

It is, after all, mostly a question of procuring steamship lines of enlarged capacity in order to expand the trade of this country in the Orient. If the transportation is made by additional lines, and millers and exporters are able to secure bottom space needed for the carrying of flour to those countries, our trade will expand of itself, war or no war."

Mr. Byers adds to the above statement that whenever wheat goes at fifty cents a bushel here on the coast it knocks out the Oriental flour trade. At fifty cents, the trade flourishes. Above that figure, it languishes.

Fossil was victorious in the June election, succeeding in winning out in the county seat. The fight was vigorous, and the people of Fossil are much elated over the winning. The county officers have quarters in buildings formerly used by business houses, and have not yet begun to construct the court house. This will be done in due time and the new county seat will have good homes for those who transact the business of the new county of Wheeler.

The election in Wheeler county was fought out along county seat lines, the vote for candidates being made use of for candidates favorable to the winner of the two towns that were rivals for county seat honors.

NEW NO FLIES ON MOLASSES. An Indian Bearing Title as Major Who Fell into a Barrel of Sweet Stuff. Visitors to the Umatilla reservation during the present celebration have been regaled with an amusing story of one Major Molasses, who, notwithstanding his comical name, is the most bluest blood of all, to paraphrase Shakespeare, Major Molasses is the hereditary chief of the Cayuses, being the son of the late Charles Bellman, and according to the most accurate genealogical authority in the country, Major Lee Moorhouse, is entitled to compel even Paul Showalter to bow down to him, and to receive his chiefdom. When it comes to chiefs, Major Molasses of the Cayuses can give Young Chief and Showaway cards and spades and whole decks of them, for that matter.

Major Molasses, having now reached an age when the molasses molash, though in the manner in which he received the unusual cognomen, it being thus: When he was a child, he was playing about the royal temple of his pater, the chief of all the Cayuses, and, as he played, he gazed near by a barrel of molasses, which had been bought by a friend of his mother. Being of a frolicsome nature, he managed to fall into the barrel, and when he was eliminated from the barrel, he was in a condition that deceived even flies, and the latter proceeded to light on him, coming in myriads, hundreds, thousands, millions. There were Cayuse flies, Walla Walla flies and Umatilla flies, and flies from all the country around.

The boy's real name was Francis Wilhelm, but the molasses molash fastened upon him the peculiar name he now bears, "Molasses," and when he grew up into a big, buck Indian, he received in addition the title of Major, and became "Major Molasses."

The major grows much excited nowadays when called by this name, and, today, when the designation was applied to him, he threatened to appeal to the government at Washington and have the offense punished. He says now that, as much as he has grown to be a big man, he is no more Major Molasses, but is Francis Wilhelm, and he doesn't want people to call him otherwise.
