APPROPRIATE WATER.
Power Concern Will Proceed to Put in the Plant.
The Adams Light & Power company, of Adams, Joseph France and Effie Adams, today filed notice of the application of water from the south end of the Walla Walla river, within the county of Umatilla. The company proposes to dam 10,000 miners' inches of water (the miner's measurement under the law is 1.5 cubic feet per minute, or a flow of water of 15,000 cubic feet per minute) and to use the water for the purpose of generating electrical power, for lighting and for irrigating purposes. The point at which it is proposed to construct the dam is at the mouth of the south fork of the Walla Walla river intersects the north line of section 25, township 5 north, range 30 east, on the e/4 sec 1/4 of section 25, known as the lands of the Hillier. The course of the dam and pipeline is to be in a north-south direction. The size of the dam is to be two round "barrel" dams each 48 inches in diameter. The company has, so it is stated, succeeded in procuring sufficient water to insure the construction of the plant. It has been several months since the corporation was formed. In its interim, engineers' estimates have been secured, and the incorporators assure their backers that the enterprise will be a success.

County Clerk Burroughs, Retires. Makes a Semi-Annual Statement.
Ben S. FROM HOTEL LOBBIES.
Guests of the Day at the Pendleton Hotel of Interesting Personality.
Bartlett Sinclair, Idaho governor or Steunenberg's right hand man, arrived on the evening train from the north, and departed this morning for Boise. Mr. Sinclair is secretary of state under the now somewhat famous governor of Idaho, and was appointed by the governor to proceed to the Coeur d'Alene administration while matters were being adjusted. He remained there for several months, and was the Pooh Bah of that region so long as martial law was enforced and things were getting down to a peace basis. Mr. Sinclair is the representative of the governor got into national politics, and all were all reviewed before the congressional committee of investigation, when Salter and Lantz tried to manufacture capital from the policies which

were enforced by the Idaho officials. It is estimated that the yield will be about 25 bushels to the acre, of good No. 1 wheat. He was also through other regions of the state of Washington, and finds practically the same conditions prevalent everywhere. Harvest is beginning in good earnest over there, says Col. Savage.
