GENERAL NEWS.

The 30th annual meeting of the National Lodge of Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks opened at Atlantic City, Tuesday.

Jacob Field, a New York broker, is credited with having wagered \$20,000 to \$5,000 that McKinley would beat Bryan in the November election.

It is reported from Chinese sources that the foreigners at Peking have taken possession of the prince's palace, opposite and commanding the British Legation, and that the native Christians have been installed therein.

The death is announced at Hamilton, Ontario, of Dr. Charles F. McDonald, aged 71 years. While connected with the postoffice department in Washington, the postal money order system was organized through his efforts.

The yellow fever situation at Queneas, Cuba, has probably reached an end, there not being any new cases reported in over 10 days when Major-General Ducker was stricken with the disease. He is a noted yellow fever expert and his case is the only serious one at present.

Ada Arlington, at West Superior, Wisconsin, shot and killed her former lover, John Resburg. She then carried him into her house, crossed his hands on his breast, placed nickels on his eyes and sat up all night with the dead body. She gave herself up. She states that the man was intoxicated and tried to break into her house.

The commissioner of pensions announces that 105,567 certificates for pensions were issued by the bureau during the fiscal year which closed June 30 or 15,000 more than were issued during the year 1899. They were divided as follows: 40,637 were original issues, 35 were restorations, and 10,578 were for increases, re-ratings, accrued and additional.

Francis Truth, who advertised himself as a "Divine Healer," appeared in the United States circuit court in Boston, withdrew previous plea of not guilty, pleaded guilty, and was fined \$500 which he paid. He pleaded guilty to seven indictments accusing him of using the mails to further a scheme to defraud which involved his divine healer.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

The Hendley warehouse at Baker City was burglarized Tuesday night. Goods were stolen but in what quantity can only be guessed at.

Spokane dog fanciers are raising a purse to be offered as a reward for the arrest of the persons who have recently poisoned a number of valuable dogs.

Job Hatfield, of Inman, Poulson & Co.'s sawmill, a well-known resident of Portland died at Pismo Robles, Cal., Sunday. He went to California some time ago to benefit his health.

Wyatt Karp, well known in the Inland Empire, was killed at Wilcox, Arizona, being shot through the heart by a cowboy named Boyett, a few days ago, the shooting being the result of an old feud.

Mrs. Blanchet, formerly chaplain of St. Vincent's hospital, Portland, who recently received the title Monsignor while he was traveling in Europe, has returned to Portland, where he will make his permanent residence.

Agnes and Metha, the 14 and 11-year-old daughters of Herman Mollenkott, were taken on the Fourth from their home near Cour d'Alone. A warrant has been issued out charging Gus Johnson with kidnapping them, and also with rape.

The supreme court sitting at Salem has decided that the land purchased in Grande Ronde valley for branch asylum purposes actually belongs to the state. Some persons attempted to get possession of the land and rob the state of it on technical grounds.

Elmer Abby, aged 13 years, son of William Abby, of Oregon City, fell from a tree on the Fourth and fractured his arm at Baker City. Amputation was necessary and this was done. Blood poisoning set in and death resulted Tuesday in the Baker City hospital.

Early Sunday morning fire was discovered at the stable of a field belonging to S. W. Smith, a farmer residing near Eureka Junction. Before the flames could be checked the entire yield of a 40 acre tract was consumed. The loss is estimated at \$1,000 without insurance.

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NO CONCERT OF ACTION

International Forces Handicapped Because of Lack of It.

SITUATION AT TIEN TSIN CRITICAL

Chinese Still Aggressive and the "Good News" From Chinese Sources Not Believed; Germans Burn Tsung Li Yamen.

Tien Tsing, July 4.—Operations of the international forces are dangerously handicapped and the safety of the city is imperiled by the lack of organization and the want of one commander to control all the forces. The ranking officer of each nationality has absolute jurisdiction over the operations of his government's troops. The questions of policy are discussed daily at the international conferences, which have not the power to enforce the wishes of the majority.

The British officer described the situation as chaotic. He said: "We have wasted many days in politeness and it is time we did something. There is no disagreement among the several commanders, but in the absence of a definite head, several of them are disposed to follow their own methods and they simply abstain from the operations which are contrary to those methods."

Chinese Still Aggressive.

London, July 1.—The admiralty has received the following from Vice-Admiral Seymour: "Tien Tsing, July 7.—The Chinese continue fighting. They are extending their lines along the Lu Tai An canal to the northeast and are appearing in greater force west of the city. Ten thousand troops are now here. More are required, but the Russian and Japanese are expected."

The Situation Critical.

London, July 12.—The character of today's news only tends to confirm the views of the pessimists in London concerning the fate of the international colony at Peking. The latest news from Tien Tsing intensifies the general alarm. The lack of cohesion and the consequent failure to make any headway, render the situation here as very critical.

Prince Tuan Insane.

A telegram from Che Foo says it is reported on good authority that Prince Tuan has become insane. The Germans have withdrawn some of their troops from Taku to protect Tien Tsing. The women and children from New Chwang have arrived at Che Foo.

Burned Tsung Li Yamen.

Washington, July 12.—A belated cablegram received this morning, via Siberia, supposed to be from Admiral Kempf, is as follows: "Taku, July 2.—A runner from Peking reports that the German troops burned Tsung Li Yamen. The Chinese moved their field guns on the wall, commanding the legations. Chinese subjects were advised to leave the legation. The runner heard heavy firing in Peking after leaving the city."

A French View.

Paris, July 12.—The Temps announces it is in a position to affirm that no European telegram has been received from Peking since that of Sir Robert Hart on June 24, declaring the situation to be desperate. The paper says: "If it is true the legations are safe they could communicate with Europe. If they cannot, it is because the Chinese have joggled the dates and a massacre took place as announced on June 30, or July 1."

A Letter From Peking.

Shanghai, July 12.—It is reported that Chinese merchants here have received a letter from Peking, dated June 30, saying the legations were demolished and all foreigners killed. It is announced that 30,000 Russians are marching on Peking.

Maine Sails for China.

London, July 12.—The American hospital ship Maine, which has been placed at the disposal of the Chinese government by the ladies of the executive committee, sailed from this port today for China.

The Japanese Troops.

Yokohama, July 12.—Japan will send nearly 50,000 troops to China. The press here asserts that a large measure of the responsibility for the Chinese trouble rests upon Russia and Germany because of their arbitrary action in China.

It is About Time.

Chicago, July 12.—A special to the Tribune from Washington says: Secretary Hay has demanded of the Chinese government that the state department be put in communication with Minister Ceng, at Peking, without further delay. The demand was made upon the Chinese minister in Washington. Secretary Hay has grown impatient at the delay in hearing from authentic sources the truth about conditions in Peking, especially in regard to Minister Ceng.

LONGEST LINE OF RAILWAY.

The General Agent of the Chicago and Northwestern in Pendleton.

A. G. Barker, general agent of the Chicago and Northwestern Railway company, "the pioneer line west and northwest of Chicago," is at the Hotel Pendleton today. Mr. Barker says he is greatly surprised at the growth of Pendleton and the improvement in the town, since his last visit two years ago.

The Chicago and Northwestern opened up for traffic on June 17th a new line from Belle Plaine, Iowa, to Mason City; also its new Fox Lake branch. The length of this new line is 195 miles, which added to the road's mileage gives it a total of 8402.85 miles, the largest mileage of any road in the world.

General Agent Barker maintains an office in Portland, where he resides.

BOTTOM OF THE SHEEP MARKET.

Chicago Buyer Says Well Informed Men are Looking For That Bottom and Not Finding It.

Harry S. Knox, a sheep buyer well known here, as the representative of Swift & Co., the Chicago packers, has been in Chicago at the exposition, and has returned home. He writes to E.

T. Wade Regarding the sheep market as he has found it, saying:

"Regarding the sheep market, I will say that the bottom has dropped out, and has gone out of sight. We cannot find it. A man from Ellensburg, Wash., came here with about 1000 head, and got only \$4.15 a hundred for them. They were worth and weighed 80 pounds. That would net him about \$2.75, so that you can see that he will not make a fortune on the shipment. I bought 600 western ewes, all yearlings, for 4½ cents a pound, that weighed 80 pounds each. That would make them worth more than \$4 a head in Oregon. It is apparent that feeders will not come out so well as they usually do."

No Speeches By McKinley.

Canton, July 12.—The campaign of 1900 in Canton will not be a duplicate of the campaign of 1896. It is not the present intention of President McKinley to make speeches to the delegations who may visit Canton during the summer and fall even if he should remain here all the time. The president will be so much occupied with public business that he will have but little time to devote to the campaign.

Five Sailors Sentenced.

Victoria, B. C., July 12.—Five Filipino sailors, of the bark Ethel, have been sentenced to death at Perth, West Australia, for murdering the captain and the officers of that vessel. M. Royce, formerly the lieutenant of Aguinaldo, was the one who started the mutiny.

The Strike Caused It.

St. Louis, July 12.—Adam H. Fuchs, one of the leading milliners here, has executed chattel deeds of trust for the benefit of creditors. His liabilities are \$484,000 but assets have not been inventoried. Fuchs says the street car strike so injured his business that he had to protect his creditors.

Oregon Boys Honored.

Washington, July 12.—Among the cadets for West Point, appointed under the increase provided by recent legislation, were Kendall Fellows, of Spokane, Leo P. Quinn, of Spokane, Arthur W. Lane, of Portland, Henry R. Adair, of Astoria.

Bankers' Convention at Tacoma.

Tacoma, Wash., July 12.—The state bankers' convention met this afternoon. The organization was perfected and the reports were read today.

Duel at Paris.

Paris, July 12.—M. Lases, the nationalist deputy, fought a duel with swords today with a newspaper man, M. Gierultrich. Lases was wounded in the right arm.

Street Cars Collide.

Springfield, Ohio, July 12.—Two cars collided on the electric road here last night. Probably 20 persons were injured, many fatally.

Heat in London.

London, July 12.—Exceptional heat here is causing numerous sunstrokes and prostrations.

CHICAGO MARKET.

Reported by L. L. Ray & Co., Chicago Board of Trade and New York Stock Exchange Brokers.

July 12.—The wheat market was lower today, mainly on the report of the "Pacific Current," which indicates estimates of crop of 550,000,000 wheat for this country against the government estimate of 400,000,000. Liverpool closed ½¢ lower, 6-3 5/8.

Chicago opened a full cent lower, at 3-3/4 to 3-7/8, and after selling up to 3-1/4, became weak and closed at 3-3/8. Corn was steady, closing same as yesterday.

THE DAWSON CITY STOCK MARKET.

Teams Were Worth \$1000 on June 24th, and May 14 to 18 Cents a Pound.

W. F. Matlock received today a letter written at Dawson City on June 24 by Frank R. Wishart, a Canadian well known in Mr. Matlock's office. Mr. Wishart states that at that time horses and mules were selling well, a team being worth \$1000 with plenty of buyers. Hay brought 14 to 18 cents a pound. Oats were selling for 10 to 11 cents a pound.

The reason why such high prices were prevalent so late in the season was that the steamers were hung up on sandbars below Dawson City, on account of the low water of the Yukon river. Several steamers bound for Cape Nome were on the bars, and waiting for higher water to float them so they could reach the stampeding ground.

The John C. Barr and the Hannah were two of the steamers that were hung up on the bars. On board were 600 Someries disgusted with life, or that variety of life, life on a sandbar in the upper Yukon river.

Mr. Wishart says the steamer Florence S. returned from the Koyukuk river and the passengers report the tribes as bona fide, also the strike in the Tanana. Also it is said that good quartz ledges have been located on Indian river, and a stampede was then in progress to get other ground in proximity.

M'KINLEY AND ROOSEVELT

WERE NOTIFIED TODAY

They Were Told in a Formal Manner That They are Candidates.

FUSIONISTS AT LINCOLN CAN'T AGREE

Populists Desire Most of the State Offices in Nebraska and Will Not Make Any Compromise in the Matter.

Canton, July 12.—Senator Lodge and the members of the notification committee, with Chairman Hanna and the members of the national committee, here arrived at 11 o'clock this morning and were escorted to the home of President McKinley. Senator Lodge, in the presence of a vast multitude, officially notified President McKinley that he was the unanimous choice of the republican national convention for president. The speech of Senator Lodge and the response of President McKinley were listened to with the closest attention by the many prominent republicans present as well as the large crowd assembled.

Governor Roosevelt Informed.

Oyster Bay, N. Y., July 12.—Governor Theodore Roosevelt was today officially notified of his nomination for the vice-presidency, at his country home at Sagamore.

Fusionists Cannot Agree.

Lincoln, Neb., July 12.—Daylight found the three fusion state conventions still in session here. The question hinged on whether the democrats would yield from their position, demanding two places on the state ticket, together with all electors for president and vice-president. All efforts to bring about a surrender were howled down.

The conference committees reported an agreement to give the silver republicans, the lieutenant governor; the democrats treasurer and commissioner of lands; and the populists the rest of the ticket. This was acceptable to the democrats. The populist convention, however, refused to give two places to the democrats.

An Agreement Reached.

An agreement was reported to the populist convention on presidential electors, giving four to the populists, three to the democrats and one to the silver republicans. Committeeman Harrington, delegated by the populists to treat with the democrats and the silver republicans, reported their concurrence in the proposed division of state officers and presidential electors. Gov. Poyner was unanimously renominated.

Samuel W. Fletcher of McCoy, Polk county, has been sued at Hillsboro for \$8,000 damages by the son of Mrs. Anna Hatch, who died under some time since in Forest Grove. It is alleged that Fletcher administered poison or otherwise caused the death of Mrs. Hatch.
