H. J. STILLMAN IS FIRE CHIEF.

Succeeds Charles Greulich—New Bicycle Ordinance—Boys Trouble W. & C. R. R.
On Wednesday evening, the common council appointed H. J. Stillman, who has been first assistant, to succeed Charles Greulich as chief of the Pendleton fire department. Mr. Greulich, whose record was first class, resigned. Mr. Stillman's appointment is satisfactory in a high degree to all the business men.

A new bicycle ordinance was passed by the council. It provides a \$25 fine or imprisonment for not more than 12 days for any one who rides a bicycle on any sidewalk in the city. The new ordinance will take effect on Saturday.

Walter Adams, agent at Pendleton for the W. & C. R. R. Co., communicated with council regarding the boys hanging on trains. He says: "We are greatly annoyed by a gang of boys ranging in age from 9 to 16 years who are continually climbing on the cars and the engine while our trains are switching and running through the streets of Pendleton, and who, upon being put off by train men use abusive language and throw rocks at the train. I respectfully ask that your honorable body take the necessary steps to abate the nuisance."

The police committee will look into the matter and see that the boys no longer endanger their own lives and limbs and trouble the train men.

An ordinance will be drafted regulating the storage of gasoline in the city. The chiefs of the Seattle, Spokane and Tacoma fire departments will be communicated with regarding the sale of the city engine team, which it is desired to dispose of.

WHEATMEN LOOKING FOR FIFTY CENTS.
New Crop Market Will Soon be Organized and Values Indicated for 1900.

Pendleton, July 12.—The sprague in wheat of recent record at Chicago was not followed by a corresponding rise in wheat on the European continent, and as a result the cereal dropped back somewhat in quotable value in that market, and also on the Pacific coast.

Not many sales are taking place in this country, and the market has again resumed the condition existing here for some time, with the difference that there is a general feeling of confidence that, at least fifty cents will be the price here and at common points when the new crop market has been organized. Every reason exists for looking for this price, and some believe it will go higher. Wheat will soon be moving to the seaboard from here and other interior points, and it will not long before scattering beginning sales will indicate somewhat the coming value of the 1900 crop. All returns from the fields show excellent quality with fair yield.

Wool in Pendleton.
Pendleton, July 12.—The wool market in this place has been quiet during the past week, with no movement from grower to seller, and no present prospect for sale of any consequence.

The dullness of the market is attributable to the lack of disposition on the buyers' part to make any offers. They state that manufacturers in the east are not now buying, but are getting along with the small supply on hand as best they can. Cotton and shoddy are in great demand at the mills, and this lessens the demand for wool. Use of cotton and shoddy results from a demand by the trade for cheaper goods, and the wool suffers in consequence.

Wool in Boston.
Boston, July 12.—The wool market continues dull and there is absence of speculation. The nominal market here for fine medium and fine territory continues at about 50c to 52c; secured, with staple wools at 54c to 55c. Unwashed medium Missouri quarter combing, 24c to 25c.

Territory wools, secured basis—Montana and Wyoming, fine medium and fine, 17c to 18c; secured, 50c to 52c; staple, 50c. Utah, fine medium and staple, 16c to 17c; secured, 50c to 51c; staple, 54c to 55c. Idaho, fine medium and fine, 15c to 17c; secured, 50c to 51c; staple, 54c to 55c.

Australian, secured basis, spot prices—Combing, superfine, 82c to 87c; good, 80c to 82c.

Wool in San Francisco.
San Francisco, July 12.—Wool—Spring—Novada, 13c to 15c; Eastern Oregon, 10c to 15c; Valley Oregon, 10c to 20c. Fall—Northern mountain, 10c to 12c; mountain, lamb's, 8c to 10c; San Joaquin plains, 8c to 10c; Humboldt and Mendocino, 13c to 14c per pound.

Wool in Portland.
Portland, July 12.—Wool—Valley, 12c to 15c for coarse; 12c to 16c for best; Eastern Oregon, 10c to 15c; mountain, 25c per pound.

Skins and Hides.
