MIDDLE WEST WILL HAVE WHEAT.

Recent Rains Saved Portion of the Drouth Stricken Crop.

Serious trouble is expected by the Oregon Railway & Navigation company at Tekoa, Eastern Washington. White section hands, many of them married men, have worked for the company for years, and who have homes at Tekoa, were laid off and their places taken by Japanese.

J. W. Dixon, of Milton, has petitioned the United States court in Portland for the benefit of the bankruptcy act and the matter has been referred to Robert Fitzgerald, of Pendleton. Dixon's assets are a span of horses and \$15 in money, the latter in the hands of the justice of the peace at Milton. His liabilities amount to \$60.83.

The county court has advertised for bids for furnishing wood, bids to be received up to 9 a. m., on September 5. The wood is to be red fir, cut from green timber between December 1st, 1899, and March 15th, 1900, and to be delivered by December 1st, 1900; 95 cords to be delivered at the county court house and 45 cords to be delivered at the county hospital in Pendleton, Oregon. A bond in the sum of \$1000 will be required for the faithful performance of said contract. The right is reserved to reject any and all bids.

PEOPLE WHO ARE HERE FOR A DAY.

L. L. Tallman, the Walla Walla druggist, who formerly was with Tallman & Company here, and has for several years been engaged in business in the Garden City, came over to Pendleton Tuesday evening. Mr. Tallman says of the crop of that county that which is said here by those who are posted on the conditions. "The yield will not be phenomenal," he said. Mr. Tallman, "but the quality is uniformly No. 1. There will be more good wheat than has ever been raised in any one year previously in Walla Walla county. Business is good in our town, the merchants making no complaint, no matter what line they may be handling. The fruit crop is excellent. Nearly every variety has yielded a bumper crop, and all are at least good. Farmers and orchardists will do well this year in our part of the state. We are concerned only for the price of wheat, which is undoubtedly good, and may be unusually high."

First Lieutenant M. E. Thornton, second in command of Troop B, of the Oregon National Guard, has 47 men of the company here today, en route from Salem, where they were in camp, at Camp Street, Capt. T. K. Muir remained in Portland. The men had a very fair time in Salem, and a better time in Portland, so they stated. They stopped in the latter city for a couple of days, the horses of the troop having gone on to Sumpter two days ago.

Assistant Secretary Himes, of the Oregon Historical Society, came back to town, to await the clearing of the track after the wreck. He had started to Baker City, where he was to spend the day to securing some additional members of the society. Mr. Himes has also today exhibited some specimens of fossils found 200 miles from the sea, at an altitude of 4000 feet, south from here in the mountains, which are undoubtedly of sea origin, but not yet classified. Geologists will pass on them later.
