GENERAL NEWS.

The hot weather caused 70 deaths in
New York Wednesday, mostly among
the children of the poor.

Governor General Wood says no
more troops should be withdrawn from
Cuba, as they are still needed there.

Captain Charles F. Rowe, United
States army, retired, died at Elmira,
N. Y., Wednesday night, aged 70
years.

Governor Roosevelt states that the
expects to begin his campaign about
September 10, but the place of the
opening speech is not yet determined.

Torrid heat continues throughout
Europe. The mercury indicated 85
degrees in the shade Wednesday. The
hospitals are busy caring for victims of
heat prostration.

The will of Timothy B. Blackstone,
ex-president of the Chicago & Alton
railroad, who died May 26 has been
admitted to record in Chicago. It dis-
poses of an estate amounting to nearly
\$6,000,000.

The information comes from trust-
worthy sources in Cleveland, Ohio,
that a well-defined plan is in opera-
tion to freeze out the small firms of
plate and bar iron and steel who be-
gan business during the recent boom in
the iron market.

Republican members of congress
have agreed that an extra session of
congress is not necessary just now.
They argue that the administration
might be badly embarrassed by political
demagogues should war be declared
against China upon no firmer grounds
than those now known.

The chartering of the transports to
convey troops to China is causing
much stir in shipping circles in New
York and Europe. Cable advises that
that 15 German steamships now oper-
ating in the Atlantic trade have been
requisitioned as war transports and
supply-ships by the German empire.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

The Hessian fly is destroying wheat
in Northern Idaho.

The Chinese merchants of Portland
have passed resolutions condemning
the boxer movement in China.

Between now and January 1st the O.
R. & N. Co. will expend \$100,000 improv-
ing the road bed between The Dalles
and Cascade Locks.

Mrs. Lucy M. Neal, aged 63 years,
died at her home at Turner, Marion
county, a few days ago. She came to
Oregon forty years ago.

Elmer Hill, aged 28 years, of
Haines, Baker county, died Wednes-
day in a Portland hospital after an op-
eration for appendicitis.

Vernon Finlayson, aged 13 years, was
struck by a circular saw on the arm,
while working in a mill at Baker
City, and the arm split open. How-
ever, he will not lose it.

Portland is to make a determined
effort to have a fair and equitable
share of the government patronage
given to the coast in furnishing fodder
and supplies for the army in the
Orient.

At least 2,000,000 sacks of flour are
at Hong Kong that cannot be deliv-
ered in the interior, and a great quan-
tity of flour has gone forward since,
and that is also held up. Most of this
from Oregon.

Philip Coulter, a young man who
had been suffering from blood poison
for a few weeks died at Lebanon Tues-
day morning. The trouble originated
in a felon on one of his hands and it
is thought that in lancing it his blood
was poisoned.

Rev. J. S. Taylor is no longer a
bishop in the People's United Church
organization in Eastern Washington.
He was raised to the rank two months
ago but was relieved. Dr.
McInturf is senior bishop, and active
superintendent of the church.

In Harrison R. Kincaid's answer to
the suit of O. F. Knox for a recount
of votes cast for county judge of Lane
county, the defendant alleges that var-
ious students of the University of Ore-
gon voted for Knox, and asks that the
votes of several whom he names be
subtracted from Knox's total.

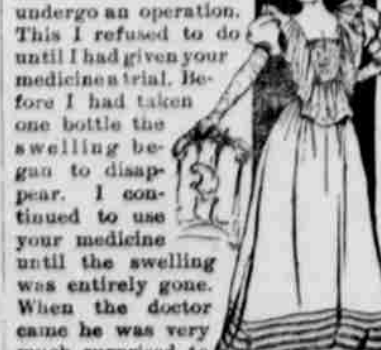
Speaker David B. Henderson, the

A MESSAGE FROM CONGER

It Is Supposed to Have Been Sent From
Pekin on the 18th.

IS WRITTEN IN DEPARTMENT CIPHER

It Came as Reply to Chinese Minister Wu's
Appeal to His Government to Send
News of Conger at Once.

Washington, July 20.--The following
information was given out at the state
department: "This morning the state
department received a telegram from
Consul Goodnow, at Shanghai, saying:
'The governor of Shanghai Tung informs
me that he received today a cipher
message from Minister Conger dated
the 18th.'"

A few minutes after the announce-
ment was made Minister Wu appeared
at the state department with a tele-
gram from Laotai Shang, saying:
'Your telegram was forwarded and I
send a reply from the Tung Li Ya-
men as follows: "Your telegram of the
18th day this moon (11th of July)
is received. The state department
telegram has been handed to Minister
Conger. Herewith is his reply.
Conger's cablegram was as follows:
'In British legation. Under continued
shot and shell from Chinese troops.
Quick relief only can prevent a general
massacre.'"

The message is not dated.
It is understood it was sent from
Pekin on the 18th. The reply was in
the state department cipher and it is
regarded by the state department as
genuine, inasmuch as forgeries seem
under the circumstances impossible.

A Cabinet Council.
Washington, July 20.--As soon as
Minister Conger's cablegram had been
translated a cabinet council was called.
No statement was given out after the
conference.

Shanghai Is Threatened.
New York, July 20.--A dispatch to
the Herald from London says: The
Daily Mail correspondent at Shanghai
telegraphs: The Boxer menace is
hourly approaching nearer. Shanghai
city and the foreign settlement are full
of suspicious characters and the na-
tive quarters a continually increasing
number of armed Chinese are arriving
from the north. The troops in Woo
Sung forts are being reinforced daily
and a number of new guns have been
placed in position.

Little Faith in London.
London, July 20.--Minister Conger's
message to the state department at
Washington is not regarded here as
justifying over much optimism but is
generally accepted as a further Chi-
nese attempt at mystification. Some
think the fact that the message is un-
dated and the similarity of its con-
tent to Sir Robert Hart's message of June
24, suggests that it was sent off about
the same time but was intercepted by
the Chinese and is now forwarded in
answer to Minister Wu's appeal for
news.

The President Gratified.
Canton, O., July 20.--When the
state department's statement of Con-
ger's message reached President Mc-
Kinley he was visibly gratified. Those
near the president have known for days
past that he never has given up hope
that Conger is still alive.

Looking the Stable Door.
Washington, July 20.--Secretary
Long today sent the following cable-
gram to Admiral Remey: "Conger
telegraphs he is under fire in the Brit-
ish legation at Pekin. Use and urge
every means possible for immediate re-
lief."

Chinese Hiding the Truth.
London, July 20.--The Chinese as-
sertions that the members of the for-
eign legations are still safe have been
so often repeated that they are again
beginning to raise hopes in some
quarters.

According to the Daily Telegraph's
St. Petersburg correspondent, however,
the Russian government is already in
possession of definite news that all for-
eigners in Pekin were massacred July 6.

The Japanese charge the Russian sol-
diers with appalling barbarity toward
the Chinese. They declare that the
Pei Ho is full of corpses of women
and children, and that the Russians
loaded 3000 boys on a junk and then
burned them.

The Shanghai correspondent of the
Daily Express says:
"Intense indignation is felt here at
the honors in Hong Kong that have
been accorded to Li Hung Chang, who
in looked upon in Shanghai as the or-
ganizer of the whole fiendish anti-for-
eign plot."

A Merchant's Horrible Story.
A Chinese merchant who has just
arrived at Shanghai from Pekin gives
horrible details of the massacre. He
says he saw European women hauled
into the street by shrieking boxers,
who stripped them and hacked them to
pieces. Their discovered limbs were
tossed to the crowd and carried off
with howls of triumph. Some were
already dead, having been shot by
foreign civilians. He says he saw
Chinese soldiers carrying bodies of
white children aloft on their spears,
while their companions shot at the
bodies.

Wants France to Mediate.
Paris, July 20.--The Chinese min-
ister at Paris has transmitted to Presi-
dent Loubet a telegram from the em-
peror of China, dispatched by the
governor of Shan Tung, July 19, asking
the mediation of France with the pow-
ers. The telegram makes no allusion
to the foreign ministers at Pekin.

Good News, If True.
Washington, July 20.--The state de-
partment has received a dispatch from
Consul Foster, dated July 20, in
which he communicates the following
message from the governor of Shan
Tung: "I have just received the defi-
nite information that the various min-
isters at Pekin are well and the Chi-
nese officials are devising measures for
their rescue and protection."

Castle Craig Hotel Burns.
San Francisco, July 20.--Word has
been received here that the hotel at
Castle Craig, Shasta county, was burned
this morning. All guests escaped with
their baggage.

DROWNED IN THE YUKON.

Thirty Persons are Reported to Have
Lost Their Lives in June.

Seattle, July 20.--Thirty people are
reported to have been drowned in the
Yukon between its mouth and Anvik
during the month of June. The news
was brought down by J. C. Chambers,
who has arrived here on the Sequoia
from Nome. Chambers learned the
names of only two of the dead. They
were "Shorty" Powell and a man
named Armstrong.

ELECTION IN CUBA.

The Time Agreed Upon Between Presi-
dent McKinley and General Wood.

Washington, July 20.--It is under-
stood that President McKinley and
General Wood have agreed on
September 15 as the time for holding
the election in Cuba, for delegates to
the constitutional convention, to be
called for formulating the constitution
for an independent government of
Cuba.

Automobile Gun.

Chicago, July 20.--A piece of
"horseless" artillery, otherwise a
Colt's rapid fire gun, mounted on an
automobile of special construction,
has started on an experimental trip
from Fort Sheridan to Washington.
The vehicle is driven by gasoline. An
endeavor will be made to demonstrate
that the invention is practicable for
use in actual warfare.

Hurry Troops Forward.

St. Paul, July 20.--The war depart-
ment has been in communication with
General Wade in command of the
department of the Dakotas to hurry
the First cavalry troop to Seattle not
later than July 26, and to sail from
that port not later than the 28th. A
large shipment of horses for this reg-
iment left for Seattle today.

Fire at McMinville.

McMinville, Or., July 20.--Fire
this morning started in Hibi's bicycle
shop, spread rapidly to the adjoining
buildings, eleven of which were more
or less damaged before the flames were
gotten under control. The total loss
is about \$7000.

Judge Edgerton Dead.

Akron, O., July 20.--Hon. Sidney
Edgerton, aged 82, died here yester-
day. He was the first justice of the
supreme court of Idaho and the first
governor of Montana, having been ap-
pointed by President Lincoln. He was
twice elected congressman from this
district.

FIRE AT THE HUNT RANCH.

Reported to Have Been Incendiary and
to Have Destroyed Several Thousand
Bushels of Wheat.

It is reported that at the G. W.
Hunt ranch near Echo several thou-
sand bushels of wheat were consumed
Thursday morning or Wednesday
night, grain being in the stack from
the header.

It is also the belief that the fire was
of incendiary origin, although it is not
known who is suspected of the crime.
The field is so located as to preclude
the belief that sparks from the O. R.
& N. engines could have caused the
fire, and it is known that it was not
set by threshing engines.

No insurance was carried on the
grain, so that the loss will be total to
the owners of the ranch. The Oregon
Land and Improvement company owns
the ranch, Mr. Hunt being the man-
ager.

A fire in the stubble of James An-
derson's farm on Tutuilla creek a day
or two ago burned a stack of straw and
a dozen or so sacks of grain. Fortu-
nately, it was extinguished before loss
was great.

TO TALK TROOP FAIR TONIGHT.

Energetic Work to be Mapped Out Which
Will Give Us a Week's Carnival.

Tonight, at eight o'clock, at the
council rooms, a meeting will be held
for the purpose of proposing definitely
and arranging for a street fair and
carnival to be held in Pendleton during
the latter part of September. The
meeting is to be attended generally by
business men, and all who take an in-
terest in the city's welfare. Let it be
well attended.

Plans have been unofficially dis-
cussed for sometime past, and senti-
ment is crystallizing in favor of pre-
paring for the event. In fact, it is almost
an assured fact, already, although no
definite decision has been made. But,
judging from the opinions expressed in
the stores and on the streets, it may
safely be assumed that Pendleton will
give the fair, and make it a success.

As to the latter proposition, the suc-
cess of the enterprise, it is going to be
a success, if undertaken. Everyone
who has been approached is in favor of
doing it right, or not doing it at all.
And the announcement of actual be-
ginning of plans for the event, may be
taken as assurance that the fair and
carnival will be creditable to the town.

Various features of the fair are to
be discussed tonight, therefore all
should attend who desire to see it start
off with enthusiasm and prospects for
high success. Let everyone come out,
and crowd the council chambers.

Governor Steunenberg makes some

FRED DUBOIS IS VICTORIOUS

The Democratic Convention at Pocatello
Favors Him For Senator.

LAST NIGHT'S VOTE RECONSIDERED

Instructs Conference Committee to Consider
Senatorship One of the Offices to be
Apportioned Under Agreement.

Pocatello, Idaho, July 20.--The dem-
ocratic state convention, this morning
reconsidered the vote by which it last
night voted against the nomination of
senator. The vote on reconsideration
was 125 to 120. The substitute for the
original substitute was then adopted.
This instructs the conference commit-
tee to consider the senatorship as one
of the offices to be apportioned, but
does not make any declaration on the
subject of the nomination. The result
is a complete victory for Fred Dubois
and there is little doubt that he
will be nominated for senator.

The Work of Last Night.
Pocatello, Idaho, July 20.--The
three silver conventions spent all day
yesterday waiting for their commit-
tees. The conference committees came
to a deadlock on the question of the
nomination of a United States senator.
They finally referred the matter to
their respective conventions, the silver
republicans declaring that there should
be no apportion of the offices until it
was decided that a senator should be
nominated and that that office should
be apportioned in the division of
the offices. The populists and silver
republicans at once passed resolu-
tions favoring the nomination of a sen-
ator.

The matter came into the democratic
convention at 8 o'clock last night and
the project was defeated by a vote of
125 to 121. The vote disposed of Du-
bois' chances according to the opinion
of political leaders last night.

The instant the vote was announced
the demand was made from Bingham
for a recount, the claim being made
that the totals did not correspond with
the figures. Unanimous consent was
lacking to grant the recount.

Beckham Nominated.
Lexington, Ky., July 20.--Governor
Beckham was nominated by the demo-
cratic state convention for govern-
or, by acclamation.

Middle of the Roaders.
Grand Island, Neb., July 20.--Over
400 delegates are present to attend
the middle-of-the-road populist state
convention to be held here.
