ADDRESS TO DEMOCRATS

W. R. Hearst, president of the National Association of Democratic Clubs, has issued the following address: "To the Democratic Clubs and Associations of the United States: The time has come when all the democratic societies and all the patriotic bodies associated with them should ratify the nomination of W. J. Bryan for president and Adlai E. Stevenson for vice-president and to defend the republic against the corrupting spirit of imperialism. This is no ordinary year in American politics. Colonies have been established upon the American flag without the consent of the American people and in defiance of the constitution. The unlawful and brutal policy of President McKinley and his advisers, involving the abandonment of the principle of public equality on American soil, have been confirmed by the republican party in its national convention. The republican party, under its present leadership, is attempting to commit a hitlerite peaceful and just nation to a career of imperial adventure and conquest. Its conservatism has disappeared, and its main policy is dominated by a vulgar spirit of greed unknown on this continent until now."

"The republican party has become a party of revolution. It is attacking the irreproachable and time-approved political, industrial and social systems under which this republic has steadily grown in strength and glory, and has dishonored our flag and our national obligations before the civilized world. It has made subjects of the inhabitants of the American territories and has denied to them the wise guarantees of constitutional government. It is bent on the Declaration of Independence."

"The republican party is a promoter and agent of the new and terrible trust system, which seeks to destroy industrial and commercial competition in America—another revolutionary movement, hostile to free institutions. The humane and moral struggle for the emancipation of the neighboring republic of Cuba is victoriously ended two years ago, and yet our army occupies Cuban soil and the political favorites of the republican party plunder the helpless people of the island. A great army of modern and national government on the American continent, subjects and citizens can not long endure under the same flag. Monopoly takes away opportunity and hope from the masses of the people; it robs the young men of the nation of all chances to achieve their independence, and it insists upon them that they serve upon them; it converts small proprietors into hirelings, and it puts into the hands of a few men the absolute control of production and prices."

"Against the new and dangerous policies condemned alike by experience and justice—the democratic party is exerting its whole strength. Its candidates and its political platform represent the conservative spirit of the American institutions. They represent the nation for four years, and there will be less officialism and fuss and feathers in Washington life and more service from public servant to his country. At present the American people pay out millions annually that are simply wasted on high society and its followers, just because it has been the custom for years to allow Washington society to control the machinery of government to the needless waste of the time of the public servants and the people's money. When a plain, substantial Western man, with simple taste, sits in the presidential chair the calls of society will not count for so much, and better government at less expense will be possible."
