## WE ARE TO HAVE THE STREET FAIR

PENDLETON TO ENJOY A WEEK OF CARNIVAL, BEGINNING SEPTEMBER 18.

Citizens to Construct Auditorium of Several Thousand Seating Capacity. Interest in It is Growing.

Pendleton is to have a Street Fair and Harvest Carnival, beginning probably, almost surely, on September 18, although there is a remote possibility that the date may be slightly earlier or later.

An immense auditorium, to be called the "Coliseum," will be constructed, to seat several thousand people, to be used during the fair for entertainment purposes, and to be left standing permanently for big gatherings in the future.

There will be artistic booths all along the principal streets, arranged by the business houses, and decorated elaborately; attractive entertainments on the Coliseum for which a ten or fifteen cent admission fee will be charged; displays of fruits, grains, grasses, dairy products, wool, manufactured articles made here, livestock, and, in fact, anything tending to illustrate whence Umatilla, with \$7,000,000 of assessed value, produces each year that which sells for \$3,500,000 in gold.

It is the idea that all the people in town and country assemble, and meet in a manner befitting plain American citizens, mingling together in the various entertainments, devoting a week to enjoying over the bonities of the harvest, the liberal wool returns of the sheep men's labors, the fine yield of the orchards, the prosperity which has come to all.

The citizens, of all ages, all classes, all interests, are asked to lend their personal assistance. Multitudinous details are to be worked out. Many must be at work. If all contribute, the result will be a success.

#### Decided on Friday Evening.

Dr. C. J. Smith, temporary chairman, called the meeting to order, on Friday night, and called for the reading of the minutes of the previous informal meeting. Joseph Hoch moved and it was carried that the temporary organization be made permanent. Dr. Smith chairman, John E. Lathrop secretary.

The committee, which had been appointed to canvass the business men to ascertain sentiment relating to holding the fair, Tallman, Teutsch and Cohen, reported through Cohen, both thorough canvass of the city had been made, and only about half a dozen persons failed to lend enthusiastic endorsement to the plan.

The secretary read an article from The Boot and Shoe Recorder, on "Street Fairs and Their Management."

Remarks were made by several business men.

Mr. Teutsch urged that money alone was not sufficient for the business men to give. They must contribute personal interest and personal effort in carrying out the many details incident to conducting so extensive an affair.

C. E. Roosevelt advocated appointing a general committee to take charge of all arrangements, name sub-committees, etc. He had faith in the scheme being highly profitable both financially and in bringing the people together socially.

H. L. Hexter was in favor of the fair, "if it be made a good one, a credit to the city," to quote his words.

Leon Cohen, in order to obtain an expression of the sense of the meeting, moved the appointment of a general committee of ten, to be selected by Chairman Smith at his leisure, and asked that, in securing the vote, everyone present be called by name and the vote recorded by the secretary. The vote was unanimous, these voting, being all who were in the room:

Leon Cohen, C. E. Roosevelt, C. S. Jackson, Lee Teutsch, John Halley, Joe Ell, H. L. Hexter, Dr. R. B. Beattie, Robin Fletcher, H. J. Williams, T. F. Howard, Dan Nelson, Elbert Reid, J. A. Williams, Joseph Hoch, Mr. Koepen, Dean Tatom, James E. Krause, and Mr. President and Mr. Secretary.

Chairman Smith announced that he would appoint the general committee of ten the following day, and at once call a meeting to form plans.

#### CONTEST CASE MORE DEFINITE.

Peebler's Attorneys Make Specific Allegations as to Mistakes.

According to instructions made by Circuit Judge W. R. Ellis, the attorneys for G. D. Peebler, contestant, Stillman & Pierce, have filed notice of contest making it more definite, and setting forth the facts as alleged regarding the errors in connection with the county treasurer's election.

A summary of the facts alleged is: Votes actually cast for G. D. Peebler, 1410.

Official canvass of votes by Justice Parkes, Rosenberg, and Deputy County Clerk Lammertli, showed votes cast for Peebler, 1341; for Yates, 1348; plurality for Yates, 7.

Regarding the two precincts in which votes are alleged to have been wrongfully cast, the notice says: That in Reservation precinct, there were eight persons, six of whose names were not on the list of voters, unlawfully permitted to vote at said election, casting their ballots for S. K. Yates, the contestant.

Specific Errors in Each Precinct.

Errors are specified in each precinct, as follows, the first figures referring to the vote as claimed by Peebler, which in each precinct is followed by the return made by the canvassing board:

Alta precinct—31 votes for Peebler, 81 for Yates; canvass showed, 29 Peebler, 83 for Yates.

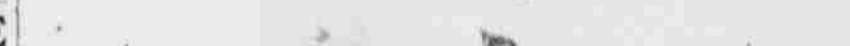
