DISEASED HORSES THREATEN OTHERS. Deputy State Veterinarian Thompson Receives Information From Athena. Thomas Thompson, deputy state veterinarian for this county, received the following letter from prominent citizens of Athena, which appeals to the officials to take action to prevent the further spread of mange. They say: Athena, Or., July 19.—We must call your attention to the Indian ponies that are running at large in the lanes north from Athena, rotten with the mange. Will you kindly attend to the matter at once, as it is jeopardizing our work horses. Please let us hear from you. (Signed) W. J. WILKINSON, R. J. BODDY, THOS. P. PAGE, MOSES TAYLOR.

Mr. Thompson stated to the East Oregonian that no funds are available to prosecute the work required properly to handle the mangy horses of the county, and that he is willing, and, indeed, anxious to take hold of it and do what is requested. He himself has work horses that are endangered by the mangy animals now running at large, carrying the disease all over the county, and threatening general prevalence of the disease. He cannot act without funds. It costs money to attend to the matter. Federal Government Must Act.

Sometime ago, Mr. Thompson and Governor (then in Portland) and held before him the problem as to how to effect the desired result. The governor communicated with the Indian department at Washington, requesting that it be taken up, and vigorously handled. The state officials have no authority to go upon the reservation and kill diseased horses. This must be done through the Indian department, and it is the understanding in Pendleton that the agent now has authority to cause the killing of Indian ponies and all other diseased horses found on the reservation. But, unless this authority is vigorously used, there is now no power whereby the matter may be attended to, so far as concerns the Umatilla reservation.

Even although the state officials were furnished with money with which to do the work, the reservation parties and other horses would still be a menace and constant source of mange disease for the horses of other parts of the county. It needs attention, and attention at once, both by the state and Indian department of the federal government, and immense losses will be sustained by the farmers of the county during the coming year unless proper attention be paid to it. It is but fair to Deputy Thompson, however, to state that he is unable to do anything without money furnished by the state to do the work of killing the diseased ponies and horses which are running at large in various parts of the county.
