GENERAL NEWS.

People in Chicago are withdrawing patronage from Chinese laundries, truck farms and stores because of the troubles in China.

The war between the Yaguis Indians and the Mexicans has ended. The Indians have been scattered and broken up into small bands.

King Alexander of Serbia, has proclaimed his betrothal to Mme. Draga Maschin, a widow, who was formerly a lady-in-waiting to Queen Nathalie, the King's mother.

Tommy Ryan has signed articles to meet Jack Moffatt before the National Club of San Francisco, September 7, for a purse of \$5000. The contest will be for 20 rounds, at 155 pounds.

Natural gas has been discovered in Shelby township, near Pana, Ill. An Ohio oil operator has leased 5000 acres of land in the vicinity and will pipe the gas to St. Louis and intermediate points.

At Vera Cruz, the first patient has been treated with great success with the yellow fever serum by the young Brazilian experimenter, Dr. Bellingham. Other patients treated are progressing favorably. There is intense interest in the experiments.

John P. Roberts, of Shanghai, a civil engineer, who has spent 35 years in China, and who left Shanghai recently, passed through Chicago Sunday. He says, 30,000 drilled troops could march upon and take Peking without great trouble.

Eighteen members of the Fifth United States Infantry were buried near the barracks at Tien Tsin, Sunday. The regiment paraded. Chaplain Marvine officiated and the bodies were enclosed in grandeur's coffins, taken at Tien Tsin.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

The state of Oregon has paid during the past year \$78,982 for coyote scalps under the bounty law.

The 13-year-old son of Mrs. B. F. Johnson, of Portland, was drowned Sunday at Viento, on the Columbia river. He was in swimming.

Dan Goodman, of North Yakima, sold 41 sheep, Shropshire bucks, at \$25 a head, and 25 to James Fraser at \$10. He also sold 2000 lambs at \$2.40, the lambs averaging 77 pounds each.

Joe Greenwald, a sporting man, died at Seattle Sunday, from morphine taken with suicidal intent. His people are well-to-do Californians, living near Eureka.

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
